Maura, Tessa and Goldie,


Lucy and Hannah,

#### Editor's Assistant's Note



My column is supposed to focus on behavior training. My mom says I am "a work in progress." I don't have any new behaviors of my own to tell you about, so I'm going to present some training tips that Peter Wong sent in. Although he has trained Goldens in the past, Peter's current training star is **Billie**, a very smart and energetic Border Collie. Peter and **Billie** often

come to our Meet-and-Greets and put on a little show. Last November, they came to our *Paws & Pasta Dinner* at *Little Bite of Italy* and impressed the crowd. You see, *Billie* is not just obedient, she does all kinds of tricks. In the last issue, I told you about learning to put my toys back in my toy box when my mom tells me to "get the toy and put it away." I thought that was a great trick until I saw *Billie* in action! Peter will scatter 8 or 10 different toys around and tell *Billie* to "get the bear" or "get the (whatever)" and go put it in the bucket. She picks up the <u>correct</u> toy and trots over to a bucket and drops it in. Or, Peter will just say "pick up your toys" and she will go get each one and then put it in the bucket. She will also drop a small basketball into a basketball net on command from Peter. In addition, she can do arithmetic and mail letters (see photos on p. 9)! She is amazing! And Peter is a fantastic trainer, so I suggest you read his training tips carefully.

## Distraction-proof Training By Peter Wong

A trained dog responds to your commands regardless of whatever distractions are present. A distraction is no reason to ignore commands. Training around and under distractions is very critical to produce a reliable working dog. A dog that only obeys at home is not reliable and cannot be considered trained. He must respond to commands outside his home environment. Following are some important distraction-proof training tips:

- (1) Once your dog is performing very well at home, start taking him to other sites: parking lots, parks, friends' homes, Meet-and-Greet events, schools, etc. and work him there.
- (2) Any time your dog ignores a command, quickly get him to respond and afterward immediately offer praise. This will demonstrate to him that a command cannot be ignored. Act quickly any time there is hesitation.
- (3) When working to get your dog used to distractions, include other dogs and people of all types and ages.
- (4) Be very generous with praise for correct behaviors. Every correct and quick response should result in a small tasty treat. Before you know it, you will always have his complete attention.



### Wags and Woofs

In March 2009 when Debbe Begley and I were discussing creating *Arizona Golden Rescue*, we agreed on most everything about how we wanted the Rescue to be organized. Both of us felt that what was of utmost importance was to always hold the dog as our #1 priority – the dog's health, the dog's well-being, and the best possible home for the dog. Fortunately, all our Board members and Team Managers have always had the same priority. The dog is the reason why we all work so hard and so passionately.

Those of you who are reading this newsletter include not only our members, but also all whose names and addresses we recorded who gave us any amount of a donation during the last three months of 2012. Many of you do not know much about *Arizona Golden Rescue*, but if you read through this entire newsletter you will learn a lot, perhaps enough to want to become a member or maybe just enough to want to support us somehow during 2013 because of the great work we do.

Most of our members know the story I am going to relate here, as each one who has an e-mail address was made aware of the situation I am going to describe. It is such a feel-good story that I want you to know about it even if you are not a current member, because it really says what needs to be said about who we are.

#### A Special Christmas Eve Present

On Christmas Eve Day at about 4 PM, when we had been buried in gift wrapping since 9 AM, we got a call on our WAGS line, our contact phone number. Fortunately, Gail Haywood answers our phone in person from 8 AM to 8 PM every single day; when she's not at home, calls are routed to her cell phone. Gail was at the gift wrapping event. The woman who called, Linda Arters, wanted to talk to me. She said she had known me years ago when I was a member of another rescue group. She told me a friend of hers, Kim Gauchet, who operates Born To Run (13811 S. Val Vista Dr., Gilbert), a dog boarding and day care facility, had a 6-year-old Golden, Rosie, boarding with her, and Rosie had developed bloat. Knowing time was of the essence, Kim rushed Rosie to the nearest animal emergency clinic. When she apprised the owners, who were out of state visiting the wife's terminally ill mother, that **Rosie** needed emergency surgery and that it would probably cost over \$5,000, the owners sadly said they could not afford the surgery, so Kim called Linda and asked her advice on what to do. Linda called AGR, and we agreed to take Rosie into our rescue program and have the necessary surgery done. Within 15 minutes, Teri Guilbault, our Director of Dog Care, had the whole thing worked out

with the emergency clinic and **Rosie** had the surgery. Without it, she would have died; with it, she had a good chance of surviving.

The following 48 hours were critical, but **Rosie** made it through, and her prognosis was good. During that 48 hours, the Board discussed the situation the family was in. The husband had just returned from a tour of duty in Afghanistan. The wife's mother was terminally ill (she passed away on December 26<sup>th</sup>). The couple had lost their home to foreclosure and were renting a home whose owner allowed them to have a Golden. Where was the best home for **Rosie**? With her original owners, of course! So, in an unprecedented move whose circumstances are unlikely to be repeated any time soon, the Board voted to adopt **Rosie** back to her family and to charge them only \$1 for her adoption. They have not stopped thanking *AGR* since the day Teri Guilbault transported **Rosie** home. Teri said, *It was the best transport I have ever, ever done!* 

On December 27<sup>th</sup> when I sent out a message to our members about **Rosie** and the fact that the Board had voted to return her to her family, many comments, all positive, poured in, as did donations for the next seven days. Comments from some who sent in donations in **Rosie's** honor included:

Great decision (many said this)!

As a retired member with over 25 years of active reserve Navy, I'm glad to end this year on such a positive note knowing that **Rosie** has received the medical attention she needed and will get a chance to return to her family.

I think it's awesome that **AGR** was able to help this family stay together with their dog. Sometimes bad things happen to good people, and I wholly support the decision to help this dog and family.

Sending **Rosie** back to her home and parents was the right and best thing to do... thanks for doing what you guys do.

What a wonderful heartwarming story about **Rosie**. You should have put "tissue alert" in the subject line also. **AGR** does really rock!

Good job. The right decision at the right time of the year. **Arizona Golden Rescue** showed the Christmas spirit. They "walked the walk."

That is the most beautiful gesture I have seen all year. That is the kind of heart a rescuer should have and I applaud all of you for this.

From another military member: This is one of those feel-good, warm-and-fuzzy, makes-you-tingle-all-over stories that make all of the work we do all year worthwhile. Kudos and a big pat on the back to all involved; pretty darn good for a bunch of civilians – just kidding, the military could not have pulled this off! What a way to end the year!

Rosie's surgery and follow-up treatment were covered by monies

in the *Debbe Begley Memorial Fund*. Debbe, *AGR's* Cofounder, passed away from cancer in June 2010. At that time, *AGR* created a *Fund* in her memory that was designated to cover expenses over \$5,000 for a particular dog or for any dog that comes into Rescue with cancer or for other special needs circumstances. We have had several dedicated fundraisers for this special *Fund*: Gift wrapping at *Barnes & Noble* stores before Mother's Day and Father's Day, the 50/50 raffle at the *Fore! Paws Golf Tournament*, the *Bowl-a-Rama*, and the *Paws & Pasta Dinner*. Each year, monies raised at these and perhaps other events will be deposited in this *Fund*, so that in the future we may be able to help more families like **Rosie's**. Special thanks to all of you who sent in a donation in **Rosie's** honor (see p. 37). Donations to *Debbe's Fund* are welcome year round and are, of course, tax deductible.



Thanks to Liz Tataseo for organizing the gift wrapping helpers for the Arrowhead and Happy Valley *Barnes & Noble* stores and to Kathi Youhas for chairing the Happy Valley store when I was at the *Holiday Pet Festival* and Tempe Marketplace *Barnes & Noble*. Larry Jessup did a spectacular job calling all possible volunteers who live east of I-17, south of Anthem and north of Casa Grande to come out for the Tempe Marketplace gift wrapping – throughout our 9-hour stint there, we had a total of 83 volunteers and 47 dogs and we took in over \$2500 in donations, the most ever at a gift wrap event! That same day, we had an additional dozen volunteers and dogs for four hours at the Happy Valley *Barnes & Noble*! They also did incredibly well financially, over \$1000, as they were presented with a \$500 check just as they were packing up!

Connie McCabe did her usual fantastic job at the Arrowhead *PetSmart* chairing *Photos with Santa*. She had help with photography from Joy Slagowski and from quite a few Santa and Elf volunteers and dog wranglers (see article on pp. 32 - 35). Angela Palumbo and her daughter, Michelle, also did a great job handling *Photos with Santa* at the Tempe Marketplace *PetSmart* during the third weekend in December. They had Santa help from Dana Haywood, Jeff Sager and Barbara Brownlee, and elf and dog-wrangling help from several others (see pp. 35 - 36)! Thanks to all of you who came to any of the holiday events to help out!

Tremendous thanks also go to Liz Tataseo for helping me with the end-of-the-year thank you letters. Between the two of us, we generated 317 letters – she prepared the ones for item donations, and I did the ones for monetary donations. Many of the letters listed multiple contributions. All letters were sent out on January 4th. Special thanks to all of you who donated something, especially during the holiday season – it was by far our best season ever financially, so we are comfortable going into 2013. The fundraising can never stop, though, so please try to support our upcoming events, especially our *Golden Paws Gambling Hall* Casino Event. It will be an afternoon of great fun on February 24th at *Villa La Paws Training Center* in Phoenix.

#### The Information Highway

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Happy New Year, *AGR*, and thank you to everyone who made this last year the huge success it was! We took in 146 dogs in 2012, up almost 50% over 2011, when we took in 98 dogs. Our Membership has also grown to over 500 members, up considerably over last year at this time. Without the help of so many of you, our fantastic 2012 would not have been possible.

The growth that we have experienced necessitated changes in the way we do things. We added more volunteers to our Intake Team, so we now have four people on a rotating basis, each taking one week at a time of intake responsibilities. Because of all the time and responsibilities this growth created, our Intake Manager Michele Wehry, who was also the Placement Manager and the only one doing placement, relinquished that position to Denny Myrick so that we could create a dedicated Placement Team. We are now in the process of training the Placement Team volunteers, so that they will operate similarly to the Intake team with a weekly rotation of people doing placement.

I attended my first Board Meeting two years ago. In January, I had been asked to consider taking on the responsibility of being the next Director of Information Management when our general meeting and election was held in March. I attended the February Board Meeting as a guest, as I was not officially in the position yet. One item that was brought up was that the database that was being developed should be ready in about two months for us to see our first looks at it. The database has come so far now that earlier this past year we moved over to it for all our record keeping of the members and our dogs. In just the past few months, some very

important changes have been made to the database, so that it now will help our newly-developed Placement Team match dogs and their forever homes a lot more easily. No longer do we have to search through paper applications and home evaluations and folders created to store information on prospective homes. Now, all the adoption applicants' profiles are loaded into the database, and then we enter information about a prospective dog and the database will create a list of matching profiles between dog and FWITA. This rebuild of the database is what made it possible to have a Placement Team and not just one person doing the placements.

The database has also changed the way a lot of other operations are done. Our home evaluators now enter their evaluations online, and I enter the information into the database. Very soon, the update will happen automatically. When the home evaluator fills out his/her report, it will automatically be transferred into the database. Adoption Applications will also automatically be transferred to the database when applicants fill out their applications online.

We have had a new build of our website in the works for almost a year now, but with all the time and effort that have been required to get the database in the form we need it to be so that the website and database can share information, it has been delayed. Hopefully now that the database is close to completion we will be able to use the time to finish up the new website, which should come soon.

Along with all the growth that we have experienced, there is the need for increased volunteer participation. We can always use more members on our Home Evaluation and Transport teams. We can also use members at our regular Meet-and-Greets to help get our message out to the public. It is a great time to get to meet the other members of our fine organization.

Health and Safety

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#### Hypothyroidism

We all know that as we mature, we tend to gain a few more pounds, our skin changes texture (did I mention wrinkles?), our hair tends to thin or just plain fall out, we tire a little more easily, are more sensitive to cold weather and we tend to get a little crabby. I hear they call that old age. When our beloved furkids start to get older and show these types of symptoms, we are concerned because that is usually a sign that something is amiss.

Hypothyroidism in dogs, or basically a sluggish or inactive thyroid, is not uncommon as dogs reach their middle or senior years, and can cause many problems in dogs, including those issues that I mentioned above. Untreated hypothyroidism can cause a lower quality of life for your dog, but the good news is that with the right medication, it is easy to treat. Hypothyroidism is normally a genetically-caused disease and is thought to be the most common genetic illness in dogs. This disease causes alterations in a dog's cellular metabolism and, as a result, affects the entire body. Interestingly enough, it can also be a contributing factor to seizures in dogs. But while there is a genetic predisposition for thyroid disorders such as this, environmental factors such as pollutants and allergies can also play a role.

A suggestion for helping to lower a dog's risk for seizures resulting from hypothyroidism is to make sure that your dog is in an environment as free of chemical pollutants as possible, as there are a number of chemicals that can cause seizure activity in dogs. Diet can also help. Dog foods should be as preservative-free as possible, as certain types of preservatives can also cause seizure activity. In addition, there has been discussion over the Internet about switching dogs over to a raw, organic diet to help control and lessen the likelihood of seizures, and that regular preventative vaccinations for your dog can also play a part in lessening seizures, as well.

If you suspect that your dog may have hypothyroidism, please talk to your veterinarian. He or she can run a Total T4 or an FT4, which are recommended blood tests to screen for this disease. As always, your veterinarian will best be able to determine a course of treatment. The initial testing to confirm this disease is normally the biggest expense that you would incur. Thyroid replacement medications such as Soloxine (levothyroxine) are a replacement for the hormone that the thyroid gland normally produces to regulate the body's energy and metabolism, and are not terribly expensive. Online pet pharmacies or retailers such as Costco offer medications at very reasonable prices; depending on the dosage, costs normally run in the \$10 - \$20 per month area. There will also be

regular retesting to ensure that your dog's thyroid level numbers are within normal ranges. Once a dog's thyroid level has been stabilized, then normally testing would occur every 6 - 12 months.

As *Arizona Golden Rescue's* Health Care Manager, my goal is to always ensure that all of our rescues, and your other furkids as well, get the best possible health care so that we can try to extend their lives as much as possible. As with any issue that you may run into with your dog, please always contact your veterinarian to confirm what may or may not need to be done, as he/she is always the best resource for your animal's health.

Editor's Note: Normally, I would not reprint an article from one of our newsletters any more often than once every other year. However, because of 12-146 Rosie, our last intake of 2012, the subject of bloat is foremost in people's minds. So, I am reprinting from our May 2012 issue a Health & Safety column written by Teri Guilbault, AGR's Health Care Manager, on that subject, so that you can review or learn anew about this life-threatening condition.

#### **Bloat**

Bloat is a very serious health risk for many dogs, yet many dog owners know very little about it. Research has shown that after cancer, it is the second leading killer of dogs. Golden Retrievers are high on the list for being susceptible to this condition. One of our beloved rescues, **11-076 Baxter**, went to the Bridge as an unfortunate casualty of this condition.

The technical name for bloat is "Gastric Dilatation-Volvulus" ("GDV"). Bloating of the stomach is often related to swallowed air (although food and fluid can also be present). It usually happens when there is an abnormal accumulation of air, fluid, and/ or foam in the stomach ("gastric dilatation"). Stress can be a significant contributing factor also. Bloat can occur with or without the stomach twisting. As the stomach swells, it may rotate 90° to 360°, twisting between its attachments at the esophagus and at the upper intestine. The twisting stomach traps air, food, and water in the stomach. The bloated stomach obstructs veins in the abdomen, leading to low blood pressure, shock, and damage to internal organs. The combined effect can quickly kill a dog. Be prepared! Know in advance what you would do if your dog bloated.

Typical symptoms often include some of the following. Unfortunately, from the onset of the first symptoms there is very little time to get immediate medical attention. Best rule of thumb for this, and any other medical condition, is: Know your dog and know when it is not acting right.

- Attempts to vomit that are unsuccessful.
- Dog does not act like its usual self, a very early warning sign and the only sign that almost always occurs.
- Significant anxiety and restlessness.
- Hunched up appearance.
- Lack of normal gurgling and digestive sounds in the tummy.
- Bloated abdomen that may feel tight.
- Pale or off color gums.
- Excessive drooling.
- Coughing.
- Foamy mucus around the mouth.
- Unproductive efforts to pass stool.
- Pacing and whining.
- Heavy or rapid panting, or shallow breathing.
- Unable to stand, or collapses.
- Accelerated heartbeat.

If you believe your dog is experiencing bloat, please get your dog to a veterinarian immediately! Bloat can kill in less than an hour, so time is of the essence. Call your vet to alert them you're on your way with a suspected bloat case. Better to be safe than sorry!

Here is a partial list of things that you can do to reduce the risk of bloat developing in your dog:

- Avoid highly stressful situations or try to minimize stress as much as possible.
- Do not exercise for at least an hour or longer before and especially after eating.
- Discourage rapid eating if your dog "inhales" his or her food, there are specialized bowls that you can purchase that are compartmentalized to make it harder to consume food as quickly.
- Feed two or three small meals a day versus just one large.
- Allow access to fresh water at all times except for one hour before or after a meal.
- When switching dog food, do it gradually over a period of weeks is suggested.
- Do not feed dry food exclusively, but if you do, avoid foods containing fat as one of the first four ingredients, avoid foods that contain citric acid, and select a food that includes rendered meat meal with bone product among the first four ingredients.
- Do not promote rapid or excessive drinking.
- Use of an elevated food bowl has been debated by many well-known veterinarians – some recommend only bowls that are elevated, and some say not to use them.

A couple of tips which are always a good rule of thumb:

- If your regular vet doesn't have 24-hour emergency service, know which nearby vet you would use keep the phone number handy.
- Always keep a product with simethicone on hand (Mylanta Gas [not regular Mylanta], Gas-X, etc.) in case your dog has gas. If you can reduce or slow the gas, you've probably bought yourself a little more time to get to a vet if your dog is bloating.

That's the way it seems to me when, in actuality, she just turned 8 ½ and passed the sixth anniversary of her certification. I still have yet to fathom how time could pass that quickly!

It means at least half of her life is behind her. Her career as a service dog is beginning to wind down. She has a little arthritis in her wrists and shoulders, her vision and depth perception aren't what they used to be, and she tires a little more easily now.

So is she finished working? By no means! I expect she'll let me know when she's ready to retire, but it's solely my responsibility to watch and listen to her, and pay close attention to make sure I don't ask of her anything she shouldn't be doing anymore.

**Sophie** has always been a great bracer; it was one of the first tasks she learned, to plant her feet firmly on the floor and stand like a stone statue anytime I touch her shoulders to either keep from stumbling or to get up off the floor. So when her veterinarian reported some minor arthritis, I modified **Sophie's** brace. Now I lean into her side and she painlessly leans back. Just a minor adjustment, but one I'm sure she appreciates every time she has to do it.

Instead of being annoyed with her for taking her time jumping into the van or onto the bath table, I'm patient as she takes her time to make sure of where she's jumping, since nuclear sclerosis equates to an aging human's need for reading glasses.

It was a difficult decision to stop flying her cross-country as we have done for the past five years. Curling up in a cramped airplane

for six hours puts too much stress on her physically and mentally and, while she'd do it without complaint, I've seen what she goes through, and it'd be wrong to put her through it anymore at her age.

For nearly seven years, **Sophie** has faithfully clung to my side, saved me countless times from injury, and made life so much safer and easier for me. Now, with a few modifications to her tasks, I can turn the table just a little and make her life a little more comfortable, as she so richly deserves.

# The Importance of Exercise By Peter Wong





gestation), the testicles start life in the abdominal cavity. They migrate to the scrotum and should be in place by birth. If they are not, doctors get a little concerned. Cryptorchid testicles do not function properly, as sperm require a cooler temperature to develop, which is why testicles are found on the outside of the body. Also, if left in the abdomen, they can become cancerous. Because his testicles were in his abdomen, Murphy's neuter surgery was a bit more complicated than a typical neuter. He did very well, though, and, after a short recovery period, he was ready to go home to his forever family with Melissa and Brian and their sons Jordan and Justin in Gilbert. After he healed from his neuter, Melissa noticed that Murphy was limping some. Murphy went back to the vet for an exam with Dr. Pullen at AMSC, who does most of AGR's orthopedic work. Imagine our surprise when we found out poor Murphy had an old fracture in his left femur that hadn't healed properly. The bone had healed with some rotation and angulation and was causing his patella to slide out of place. Murphy was going to need more surgery. While awaiting his knee surgery, Murphy developed a nasty tummy bug which resulted in another overnight trip to the vet, IV fluids, and lots of TLC. Fortunately no surgery this time! He has since recovered from both his tummy upset and his knee surgery and has returned to fairly normal activity. But oh, by the way, he started to have some ear irritation, so Melissa took him back to the vet and, when they cleaned out his ear, they found he had ruptured his ear drum! Poor Murphy! AGR because their original owner was no longer able to care for them. Both dogs were overweight, Missy (on right in photo) more so than Christy. Both dogs also had some eye problems; again Missy's were worse than Christy's. The dogs' eye issues stem from a condition called entropion, where the eyelid rolls inward and the lashes irritate the lining

of the eyelid and the eye itself. In severe cases, surgical correction is required. Fortunately for **Christy**, our veterinary eye specialist felt that her condition was secondary to allergies and recommended treatment for her allergies and reevaluation prior to deciding to operate. She has responded well to a change in diet and a short course of steroids. We are hoping she will continue to do well and be able

to avoid surgery. **Christy Love** is now enjoying life with new parents Mary and Mike in Surprise. She also shares her home with a canine sister named **Annie**. She has been renamed **K-Su** in honor of her parents' love of Kansas State University and has made herself quite at home. She and **Annie** worked out some small differences of opinion



and now they get along famously. Mom Mary writes: **K-Su** has been with us for three weeks and has settled in well with us and our other dog, **Annie**. **K-Su** sleeps with me and potties outside most of the time. She walks very well and plays at the park. Once in a while she gallops when she is catching up with **Annie**. **K-Su** is a lover, she loves to be petted. She lies at your feet when you are watching TV; she has to be near us. She sleeps so soundly, **Annie** can walk by her and she never wakes. **K-Su** came to us very well trained, she does not beg at the table when you are eating. She has met some of our neighbor dogs and loves them all. She is a very sociable dog with people and dogs. We love her and are so happy she came to live with us. **K-Su** is a wonderful pooch.



12-108 Missy was Christy Love's house-mate prior to coming into Rescue. She was grossly overweight at 131 pounds – her ideal weight would be somewhere between 65 and 75 pounds. She was about big enough for two dogs! She also had severe entropion of both eyes and bilateral hematomas in her ear canals. Goldens can be very prone to ear infections. If left untreated, the irritation causes constant

head shaking and scratching of the ears which can, in turn, cause a separation between the skin lining the ear and the cartilage or tissue making up the ear itself. Blood then collects between the two layers, forming a hematoma. This is very uncomfortable for the dog, causing her to shake and scratch even more, further exacerbating the problem. It also can cause severe scarring in the ear canal. The solution is to surgically drain the collected and clotted blood and, if possible, apply a pressure dressing to keep the layers of tissue together to prevent the blood from re-accumulating. Keeping a pressure dressing on a dog's ear is not the easiest thing, as you can imagine. Fortunately, Missy's surgeries for both her eyes and her ears were successful and she had a fairly uneventful recovery. To celebrate starting a new life, she has changed her name to Mia and is now working on her diet with new parents Tom and Diane in Phoenix. She sent us a letter to let us know how things are going with her new life: Hello everybody who has been a part of my life since Christy Love and I moved away from home. Diane and Tom came on a Sunday morning on November 11, 2012. I liked Deb's house and all my new-found friends and didn't know why they came to visit. After a short petting and walk they left. On Monday morning I got to ride in Deb's car, something I was really not sure about. What's a car ride anyway? Shortly after we arrived at a new house, there was Tom. I was glad to see him again. Soon after Deb left, Tom took me for a short walk and I liked it here so much I decided to stay until Deb came back to pick me up. Since Deb lost her way back, I have been really enjoying living with Diane and Tom and we all decided that I could continue my life living with them – they are both such wonderful people to me. I came at 2 ½ years old and my fighting weight was 125 lbs. I tried out as a lineman for the Pittsburgh Steelers but did not get signed. Tom, the training coach, said I was born to play free safety and need to get down to a new fighting weight of 65-75 lbs. You talk about rolling your eyes! Now my trainer and I walk 2 times per day. AM regimen 0.8 of a mile and evenings 0.5 miles. This trainer is so sneaky he now has me walking off leash, stopping at every corner and crossing on command, and I carry my own leash! She taught me house manners during their dinner time, grooms me and now has me retrieving a tennis ball that I run after. I finally have a spring in my step and I'm a puppy again. I am starting to realize what I missed out on being so heavy. I have been exposed to a whole new world and I know life couldn't be better. Know what's better then dog treats? Give up? Ice Cubes! I get 6-8 treats a day and love my Ice Treats. My head's in the freezer every time they open it. What more can a Golden want... a good home and soooooo much love and all the Ice Treats I want!

# Diamonds in the Ruff By Deb Orwig

Diamonds in the Ruff are rescued dogs that require AGR to spend at least \$1000 on their health care. If you can help with the expenses of any of our Diamonds in the Ruff, your donation will be acknowledged in the Diamond Donors section of our May newsletter.

To update you on November's *Diamonds in the Ruff...* **12-112 Bailey**, a senior girl, was a horrible mess when she was surrendered. Unfortunately, despite the best efforts of our vet, we lost her – she developed multiple organ failure. Her wonderful foster, Jason, as well as Liz Tataseo and I, were with her when she was sent to the Bridge. Our sweet blind boy, **11-091 Keller**, whose adorable photo is our 2013 calendar's December feature photo, had his second elbow surgery and is doing well helping his dad, David, recuperate from shoulder surgery. **12-117 Buddy** is now totally clear of ticks and his fur is growing back in. You can read his adoption story on page 15. **12-119 Sadie** had her pups (see her story on pp. 15-16) and has been adopted; **12-120 Emma** has also been adopted. We thank Stacie and John DeMent for their very generous donation which covered all the vet expenses of **Sadie**, **Emma** and the two puppies **Sadie** whelped.



The fourth quarter of 2012 was a rough one for us. Not only did we lose 12-112 Bailey, we also lost 12-122 Bailey (photo at left). She was a senior girl who had never been spayed. When our vet did the spay, he found a golf-ball-sized tumor in her abdomen. Even though she was doing well post-surgery, they decided to keep her at the vet another night. Sadly, she passed

away during

that night. Our vet suspected that she had thrown a blood clot.

We also lost another senior, 12-131 Troy, who was rescued from the shelter. He came to us with a terrible infection in his leg that did not respond to powerful antibiotics and he went



downhill rapidly. His wonderful foster, Marcia, as well Dana Haywood representing the Board, and Jim Henkel, who had done the foster's home evaluation and the transport of **Troy** from the vet to the foster, were all with him when he was sent to the Bridge.

All three dogs that passed away, **12-112 Bailey**, **12-122 Bailey** and **12-131 Troy** were adopted under our *Gentle Paws Hospice Adoption* program by their caring fosters.



During the fourth quarter of 2012, we spent a considerable amount of money on two dogs that, fortunately, did survive and are now enjoying life with their adoptive families. One was 12-103 Murphy. You can read his story on page 12, All of the vet work that had to be done on Murphy has amounted to a total of over \$6550.

The other, 12-146 Rosie, was a Christmas present to AGR and to her original family, whom we allowed to adopt her back after we paid for the emergency surgery necessary to relieve bloat. We are waiting until she has completely healed from the surgery before we finalize her adoption, which is why her adoption story is not in this issue's Magic Moments section. However, I



related her dilemma in my column on pp. 3 - 4. Her emergency room care and follow-up at *AMSC* cost us \$4931. During the week following an e-mail message I sent out to our members on December 27th, the donations that poured into *AGR* in honor of **Rosie** to help with her medical bills amounted to \$4305! So, the *Debbe Begley Memorial Fund* was depleted by only a total of \$626! Our heartfelt thanks to all who donated toward **Rosie's** cause. Donors are listed on page 37. We will accept donations designated for the *Debbe Begley Memorial Fund* at any time during the year. Donations that were sent specifically for **Rosie** are greatly appreciated.


There is only one thing missing. They are not with their special person who loved them on Earth.

#### An Historic Day...

On December 4, 2012, AGR Member Dave Engelhardt, who is a veteran, passed along the following message from Jim Frost, Veteran, 981st Military Police Company (Sentry Dog): The U.S. Senate this afternoon passed the National Defense Authorization Act of 2013. Included in that Act was the Canine Members of the Armed Forces. This part of the bill makes a lot of changes to how the Military Canine is designated in the Military, how it is treated, and what it is eligible for upon retirement. There will be medical benefits available for those who adopt these dedicated animals that will not involve additional federal funds. Most importantly from my standpoint is the Military Canine will no longer be designated as "equipment" while on active duty serving this country, and will not be classified as "surplus equipment" upon retirement. They will be Canine VETERANS who have served this country with dedication, loyalty, and sacrifice. Thousands of military personnel... handlers, combat, combat support, and support came home from a conflict because these dogs saved their lives. This has been decades in the making. To all those who sent messages to our members of Congress to support this action, I thank you. I thank all of you for your support of any kind towards what so many of us have worked for and hoped for.

#### American Kennel Club's Canine Good Citizen Becomes an Official AKC Title

New York, NY – In celebration of dogs with good manners at home and in the community, beginning January 1, 2013, passing the *AKC*®'s *Canine Good Citizen*® test can be recognized as an official *American Kennel Club*® title for all dogs.

Since the program began in 1989, the CGC® has been considered an "award." Dogs that passed the 10-step test received a certificate, but CGC was not listed on the dog's title record. Now as a result of frequent requests from dog owners and instructors, owners of dogs registered or listed with AKC will be able to use the CGC suffix after the dog's name and include  $Canine\ Good\ Citizen$  on their dog's official title record.

For dogs that pass the test on or after January 1, 2013, owners will be able to choose from two options on the *CGC* test form: *CGC* as a title or *CGC* certificate only.

Owners whose dogs earned the *CGC* award from January 1, 2001 onward may convert the award into a title (if the dog is registered with the *AKC*) by filling out and submitting this form.

To compete or earn any *AKC* titles, including the new *CGC* title, dogs must have an *AKC* number: an *AKC* registration number, a Purebred Alternative Listing (PAL) number or an *AKC* Canine PartnersSM number. If your dog doesn't already have an *AKC* number, go to the *AKC* website to learn how to obtain one.

The Canine Good Citizen program is a two-part program that stresses responsible pet ownership for owners and basic good manners for dogs. Many dog owners choose Canine Good Citizen training as the first step in training their dogs. The program lays the foundation for other AKC activities such as obedience, agility, tracking, and performance events and also serves to enhance the bond between owner and dog, making dogs a pleasure with which to live. Dogs whose owners desire to volunteer in therapy work with either Delta Society or Therapy Dogs International, Inc. must obtain a CGC title before becoming therapy-certified.

#### A Recipe for Treating Lick Granulomas

Mix 2 parts Bitter Apple with 1 part Icy Hot or Liquid Heat. The itch of a lick granuloma is sort of like phantom limb pain – it itches, but scratching and licking doesn't soothe it, so the dog just keeps going at it. It makes them so crazy that the Bitter Apple alone isn't enough to deter them. Using the combo above produces a deep tingle that makes it feel a little less irritated so that the Bitter Apple is enough to stop their licking. This works on 70-80% of lick granulomas. You may want to use a conepart of the time, too, until it settles down a bit. Lick granulomas occur most frequently when a dog is bored or stressed, so more activity/exercise is beneficial, too.





#### **BULK RATE MAIL**

Your address label on the back cover contains the verbiage "OR CURRENT RESIDENT." The U.S.P.S. now requires that verbiage on anything sent out by bulk rate mail. We qualify to use bulk rate mail because of our nonprofit status and because we send out more than 225 identical pieces of mail in each mailing. It is very cost effective for us to use bulk rate mail – the November issue of *The Golden Paw* cost about 33¢ each, as opposed to the \$1.50 it would cost to send one copy by first class mail. Sometimes, however, bulk rate copies do not get delivered at all, or they may take a week or more (especially to out-of-state recipients) to get to their destinations. **Bulk rate mail is not forwarded**, nor is it returned to us if you no longer live at the address on the label, which is why it is so important for you to notify us if you move.

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#### Cell Phone Recycling

**AGR** participates in a cell phone recycling program sponsored by **GRC Wireless Recycling** that will bring us some cash. They will pay us \$2 - \$10 for a regular phone and up to \$50 for a smartphone, Blackberry or the like. If you get a new phone, please save your old one and turn it over to us at any of our events or membership meetings. Thanks!

#### Collar Strangulation

Collar strangulation kills thousands of dogs a year. The most common fatality results from two household dogs playing – a tooth or a paw gets caught in the other dog's collar and it almost always kills the other dog, while the one who is caught tries to get free by twisting and turning thus tightening the collar. An *AGR* member recently almost lost one of her dogs when the one who got caught twisted the dog's collar almost strangling the other dog trying to get his paw out. If you have more than one dog, it's best not to keep collars on in the house or backyard. All *AGR* dogs are microchipped, so if they get out they can be found with a chip scan – they do not need a collar on unless they are being walked on leash.



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
