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Edítor's Assistant's Note



Hello, everyone. My name is **Mufasa** – you know, after the daddy lion in *The Lion King*. It's a good name 'cause I look regal and noble like he does. My mom, the editor of this newsletter, calls me **Fasa** (that's FAH-sah) most of the time, but when I hear **MuFASA** I know she means business! She says I'm "a work in progress," so my main job is going

to be passing along training and behavior tips so you can help your dog avoid getting into the same trouble I get into. My mentor was **Rocky**, but in late November, he went somewhere called the Rainbow Bridge. Mom says he is having so much fun there he won't be coming back, so I have to take over where he left off.

Mom and Dad started off just fostering me, so I will tell you a little about my foster experience. It was the pits. You see, I had heartworm when I was rescued by *Arizona Golden Rescue*. It is a really bad disease that is transmitted by mosquitoes from one dog to another. But you can keep your dog from getting it by giving him or her Heartgard® or Intercepter® every month and having a heartworm test done every year. Some people in Arizona believe that heartworm is so uncommon here that they shouldn't bother with this medication and testing. But I am living proof that isn't so. Had *AGR* not tested me for heartworm when I was rescued, no one would have known I had it because I had not developed any symptoms yet. By the time symptoms manifested, it might have been too late to save me. Oh, my goodness!

The treatment was not fun, but the alternative (eventual death because my heart was being strangled by the heartworms) would have been worse. I had to have two painful injections in my haunch 24 hours apart. During the 24 hours after each one, a vet tech had to take my temperature and monitor my blood pressure every hour so the vet could treat me right away if I started to crash. Fortunately, I didn't.

After the second treatment, my foster mom picked me up from the vet's and drove me to her house. I got sick in the car because I was so nervous. Yuk. When we got to the house, she took me outside on leash and I made a big dump out there. Then we went into the laundry room and I had to go into a big crate. The vet had told her I could not be allowed to get excited, so for the next month, all I saw was the laundry room, the crate, the back yard (on leash) and my foster mom and dad (and they basically ignored me). No other company. No toys. Bor...ing. Then one day she opened the laundry room door and in bounced FOUR other furkids who look

something like me. I got so excited I couldn't wait to get out of the crate, so I peed in there. Oops. Turns out that they are all great company, they all love to play with toys, and best of all, they all love to play with ME.

Not too long after I came out of isolation, Mom found out that **Rocky** had a mass in one lung. He had been coughing off and on all summer, so she had him tested for valley fever. When that test came back negative, the vet did a chest X-ray and saw the tumor. It was right about then that Mom and Dad decided I had to become a permanent member of the household. Foster failure #9 for the Orwigs: **Barley**, **Bruno**, **Rocky**, **Hayden**, **Kokomo**, **Ben**, **Troy**, **Ladybird** and **Mufasa**. What a lineup! We could have a great baseball team if all of them were still living with us.

One of the first things I heard – and I hear it multiple times every day - is "leave it." Mom says that is one of the most important commands a dog needs to learn, especially if the dog's owner has the intention of getting the dog certified to do therapy work. I now know that "leave it" means to drop whatever is in my mouth or not pick it up if I haven't already. I am not allowed to take toys out in the yard, because the first few times I did that I dropped them into this gigantic puddle that is always out there (Mom calls it a pool). That was fun - they made cool noises when they plopped into the puddle. But she told me that indoor toys are not pool toys and that in the summer when it is warm she promises she will let me play with the pool toys. So, now I drop the toys at the door before going outside. She tells me the next thing I have to learn is to put all my toys back in the toy bin. She says she is going to call Peter Wong to help her learn how to teach a dog to do that. Maybe by the time you read the May issue I will have learned that trick!



Where to start? There are so many people who deserve thanks and special mention for all they have done for *Arizona Golden Rescue* and for me, personally.

First, to all who have sent me messages of sympathy and to the many of you who made donations to *AGR* in memory of **Rocky**, thank you so much. **Rocky** was my shadow for 11 ½ years. In fact, he was the one who made me realize that if you have a Golden you can never even use the bathroom alone! The holiday season was difficult for me to get through without him, especially when we did the gift wrapping at the Happy Valley *Barnes & Noble* store. The staff there considered **Rocky** their store mascot, as he had done an after-school reading program with *Terramar*

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Elementary students twice a week in 2007-2008 and once a week every summer since. In fact, when I took him there the Tuesday before Thanksgiving just to confirm our holiday gift wrap schedule, the manager called an all-hands meeting at the Customer Service desk so all the staff members could say hello to him.

We have a new boy in our pack now, **Mufasa**. He is not a replacement for **Rocky** – no dog will ever replace **Rocky**, as he was unique – but our pack now feels complete again. **Mufasa**, with his puppy antics and I'm-going-to-smother-you-with-kisses personality, has done a lot to improve the atmosphere in our house. As you may have noticed, he has taken over **Rocky's** position as Editor's Assistant.

Kathy Blue has been doing Rescue Intake for about 12 years. She started with another group, then joined AGR when we formed in March 2009. Due to needing - and wanting - to spend more time with her 93-year-old dad who is not in the best of health, Kathy has had to resign from her Intake position. We will miss her experience and expertise with this most important job and thank her sincerely for her years of service to Rescue. Road to Rescue: Another Option To Help a Golden

In the short life of *AGR*, we have brought in several very senior dogs, as well as some Goldens that had significant medical conditions that could not be cured, but each dog could be given a good quality of life for as long as they had left with the proper care. Usually, a wonderful foster took care of these dogs and made sure they received their medication, correct food and made it to all their vet visits. They, of course, fell in love with their dogs, but the prohibitive cost of caring for the dogs was a major stumbling block to actually adopting.

In order to ensure that the dogs and their loving fosters did not have to be separated but could become "official", the Board instituted the Gentle Paws Hospice Adoption category (GPHA). Dogs 12 and over and/or with a severe, chronic medical condition could, if the foster wished, be adopted for \$1.00. *Arizona Golden Rescue* would be responsible for the medical care of the dog and the foster would continue to maintain daily care and ensure that the dog received his medication and vet visits. Each case would be decided by the Board. This adoption category would never preclude someone who had the resources from adopting a similar dog and caring for its medical needs, if they desired.

We have many adopters who have sought out senior dogs or dogs with chronic conditions and assumed those duties by taking care of all the dog's needs. They have been rewarded with much love and joyful kisses by their wonderful seniors. We can never thank them enough – they are wonderful angels. This GPHA category is strictly for the elderly and infirm dog or one in which the medical condition is going to mean a shorter life than expected and requires numerous vet visits for their care. We recently approved two dogs for this category: **Ricky**, a senior dog with mega colon, valley fever, thyroid problems and nodules on his spleen; and **Tatum**, a senior girl, 12+ years old, found as a stray and malnourished, with major fusion of spinal vertebrae and arthritis; she also came down with a urinary tract infection that hampered her recovery. Both dogs need daily medication and constant observation to make sure all is well.

We always have dogs that do not fall into this extreme category but do need a foster to tend to their needs for a short while or weeks or even months until a permanent family can be determined. It may be a very active senior or young pup who needs training or a dog we know nothing about but need to evaluate before we can place

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him. Help a dog and get lots of kisses and love by fostering. Who knows, you may end up being a foster failure like the rest of us and find "The Dog" you have always wanted – or "Dogs" as the case may be. Fill out the online application or reactivate your old application and join the Golden Foster Brigade.



AGR continued to grow and evolve last year, both in the number of dogs that we rescued and also by changes in the way we handled our information. We rescued 98 dogs in 2011, a 27% increase over the number of dogs we rescued in 2010, which was 77. I want to personally thank everyone involved in the rescue of these wonderful creatures. There are so many long hours that all our teams devote to rescuing these dogs and making sure they go to the right homes as healthy as they can be.

The way we handled information changed dramatically over this last year. One of the first things we did was transition from a standard phone line with voice mail capabilities only to a VOIP telephone line (Voice Over Internet Protocol). This not only saved us over \$40 per month, but also gave us more capabilities. We added "live" answering on the telephone with my wife, Gail, taking on the volunteer responsibilities of personally answering the phone from 8 AM till 8 PM seven days a week. One of the additional capabilities of our new phone service allows for a simultaneous call routing to Gail's cell phone so that she can answer calls when she is away from the house. Anyone who has seen her at Meet-and-Greets may have noticed her answering calls and sometimes even passing the calls over to other members who happen to be at the Meet-and-Greets.

We changed our website significantly, adding online applications and additional online payment methods. We also changed the way we display the Adoptable Dogs and Success Stories pages. We enlisted the services of RescueGroups.org to provide an interface to the major adoption portals on the web, while also providing us with unique content on our website.

One of the challenges in the information field that *AGR* has faced since its inception was a way to coordinate information that is needed to operate this rescue organization and to have all facets of the information interface smoothly. We have used Google-Docs for many reports for Intake and Placement, and we have had to manually update spreadsheets for contact information, membership rosters and other reports from home evaluations and health care, just to mention a few. We finally now have a workable database that is near completion, but very much usable at this time, to

merge almost all information needs that we have into one place.

More changes are coming in 2012. By the time you read this newsletter, we should have our new online Shopping Mall in operation. Just about any online shopping that you do now can be done through our new "e-Mall" interface with a percentage of everything you buy through our link going to *Arizona Golden Rescue*. The most interesting part of this is that it does <u>not</u> cost you any more to purchase anything using our link than you would pay if you went directly to the store's site without using our link. The reason retailers are willing to do this is that it brings more business to them, and the more they sell online the less overhead they pay to market their merchandise. Being a volunteer nonprofit organization means we are always trying to find new ways to raise funds for our dogs' care. This is a great way for you to support *AGR* financially without costing yourself any more money than you may already be spending.

GoodSearch is a *Yahoo*-powered search engine that donates a penny per search to American charities and schools designated by its users. If you select *Good-Search* as your default search engine, *AGR* will receive a penny every time you use it to search the In-

ternet. Please see the box on page 7 for instructions for setting up *GoodSearch* as your primary search engine.



GoodShop: You can shop at hundreds of major-name stores that have made agreements to provide donations to nonprofits by using *GoodShop*. Each store will list the percentage that they donate. You can also find coupons and discounts available by shopping online.

GoodDining: The *GoodDining* Program allows members to earn donations for *Arizona Golden Rescue* at thousands of participating restaurants, bars and clubs. It's an easy-to-use program that's totally discreet and allows members to earn donations coast-to-coast when they visit participating businesses.



Smart Betty: AGR will be partnering with a new service to the Phoenix area. *Smart Betty* offers amazing deals with discounts of as much as 50-90% off local, handpicked businesses. When you purchase an online deal

from *Smart Betty* through the AGR-eMall shopping page, *Smart Betty* will give 10% to *AGR*. It's social buying with a social conscience.

We will be using the power of social media such as Facebook to help raise support for *AGR*. I am in the process of creating a new domain name for our shopping adventures. It will have the simple name of **AGR-eMall.com** and will directly link to our shopping page. We will share this link on Facebook – hopefully many of you who use

Facebook will tell your Facebook friends to use our shopping link to help our cause. Imagine how many people we can reach out to if we go beyond our membership for this new venture. Hopefully, with this short web URL, people will be willing to try it.

In addition to these services we are adding other online stores:

Reading Glasses Galore has partnered with us to provide *AGR* with 10% of any purchase made through the link from our website.

Dog Mom's Bakery: Rescue is important to **Dog Mom's Bak**ery. This company wants to help animals in need and be able to offer you a way to help them, too. Their Rescue Rewards Program allows you to support **AGR** when you purchase their products through our link. **Dog Mom's Bakery** donates 20% of their monthly sales from our link to **AGR** when **AGR** supporters purchase their products.

Golden Paws Wine: There will be a link on our website to purchase our own "Golden Paws" branded wines. There will be six different wines available, and the labels will sport photos of *AGR*-rescued dogs!

Coming soon will be a storefront for our embroidered *AGR* clothing items. Included will be many of the items that many of you may have already seen or purchased. Polo shirts, sweatshirts, shopping bags and other items will be available online through our link with *Anchor Embroidery & Silkscreen*. In addition, we are working on possibly selling through the website *AGR* merchandise that you would normally purchase at *AGR* events.

We will also be putting the final touches on our Rainbow Bridge page. Dogs who have gone to the Rainbow Bridge will be posted in this area and owners of these dogs can submit a memorial story. There is no charge to post any dog that has gone to the Bridge, but if you wish to make a memorial donation in the dog's name it would be graciously accepted; there is a link available which will allow you to do that right from the Bridge page. We will also be including non-*AGR* dogs who belonged to AGR members. We are working on a type of membership for dogs so they can become honorary members of *AGR*.

As you can see, we have been really busy this past year and we welcome new volunteers to help out. Let's all work to make 2012 an even better year!

At right, you will read Katie's last column as a Board member. She has found the commitments of completing her medical residency too much (often has to work upwards of 90 hours a week) to allow her adequate time. Also, the distance between Phoenix and Oceanside would have precluded her attendance at many of our events even if she had the time to come, which she has not. We wish her the best, thank her for her service to AGR and hope she will visit when she can. The Board has appointed Connie McCabe to the Human Resources Director position.

Setting GoodSearch as your default search engine:

Enter the *Arizona Golden Rescue* website, www.arizonagoldenrescue.org, from your current browser. On the home page, click on the **GoodSearch.com** box. This will take you to the **GoodSearch** site. While there you will notice at the top of your web browser the opportunity to *Add GoodSearch* to your browser. Click on this box. After that, do the following depending on which browser you use:

Mozilla Firefox: to change the default search engine for the *Firefox* search bar, click the drop down arrow next to the search engine icon and select a search engine (you can see your current default search engine in bold). *Firefox* will remember your choice and use the selected search engine from now on (until you change it again).

Google Chrome:

1. Navigate: Settings (icon) \rightarrow Options and click "Manage" next to your "Default search engine"

2. Select your preferred search engine from the list and click "Make Default" button.

Internet Explorer: If you are using *Internet Explorer 8*, your default search engine is likely to be Bing. Here's how you can change that: In the search bar, there is a small arrow to the right of the search icon (magnifying glass). Click the arrow and then select "Manage search engines". Select the search provider that you'd like to set as default here. Click on 'Set as Default' button.

People always ask me how I manage with three dogs and a job that involves me being at the hospital 80 hours a week. I frequently wonder that myself. Just this past month, I was on a rotation which required me to be at work at 0500, and work happened to be an hour drive away from my house. The first time my alarm went off at 0330 my dogs looked at me as if I had lost my mind. They were very happy to see me when I rolled in the door 14 hours later. I had this schedule for 6 weekes until January 19th, and I think **Ginger**, **Jake**, **Joe**, and I are going to have a party when I'm finished. Am I on drugs? The dogs think I am. Would I encourage anyone to choose this lifestyle? Certainly not. Would I choose a different lifestyle? Certainly not.

No, I don't walk the dogs before I leave for work; I walk them when I come home. Yes, I live in a house that's way too large for just one person, but I have a fenced yard and a dog door so the dogs aren't stuck inside all day. Yes, every once in awhile I come home and find I'm missing a textbook – part of it is stuck to **Joe's** nose, the rest is in the yard being chewed on by **Jake**, and **Ginger's** sitting on the couch with a smile on her face, but fortunately *Amazon.com* (which you can reach through our website's *Good-Shop* link) has good deals on textbooks.

I yell and throw a temper tantrum and stomp my feet; then I pick up all the little pieces of paper and take the dogs for a walk. Because it's not really their fault they got bored and got into mischief. I went away for a long time and did not provide them with enough entertainment prior to my departure. If I'm going to be gone that long, they need some type of entertainment and exercise, or else they'll find their own. There are days when I come home from work and all I want to do is die on my couch, but that's not really an option when three wet noses are poking me and want to play wrestle-mania 37. There are times when I really need to study and all I end up with is **Ginger**-slobber all over my textbook. And there are times like right now when I really need to finish this article because I have about 30 minutes of functioning brain time left before I fall into a post-call stupor and **Ginger** is attempting to help me type. In case you hadn't guessed, I'm using the backspace key a lot.

And then there are days when I come home from work, the day was even worse than usual, and there are still three wet noses who want to play wrestle-mania 37. Or, the rare occasions when I have days off and can take the dogs places – they don't know what to do with themselves since I've been home all day. Or, the really special occasions when we make the trip to Phoenix for *AGR* events and they get to see all their doggy friends and people friends and have their pictures taken and wear their special *AGR* vests and get lots of attention. **Ginger, Jake, Joe**, and I have a deal: they don't eat too many textbooks, we play wrestle-mania and go to Phoenix. And sometimes they get to sleep in the bed...they make great toe warmers.

What does any of this have to do with this quarter's volunteering theme? If you're thinking, can I foster? Do I really have time to foster? The answer is yes. Unless you really do work 80 hours a week, live by yourself, and can barely keep yourself alive, then I really wouldn't recommend it. Are two or three dogs much more challenging than just one? Not really. The adjustment from one to two is big, but after that, it's just one more head to pet, one more bowl to fill, one more cookie to give out. Many of our fosters do require some extra socialization and a little bit of obedience training, but we all know how well Goldens learn from each other and from positive feedback. Many of our fosters come with excellent manners and just need a place to stay prior to going to their forever home. If you can walk one well-behaved dog on a leash you can definitely walk two. When I'm really tired (or really lazy) I'll walk all three. While we look like something resembling a circus

act, it works for us and we haven't broken any bones yet.

So, definitely think about fostering as a volunteer job. Don't think about doctor school (that's another article). You may even be a foster failure and find your next family member!

Ticks

When you watch your dog, do you notice that he's constantly scratching or shaking his head or licking his paws? You probably think maybe it's just because there's some dry skin or allergies, but the itching and scratching could also be caused by a tick... or several. In the last few months, we've had a few of our wonderful rescues come in with ticks; recently one dog tested positive for tick fever and anaplasmosis, which is very uncommon here but is another form of tick fever.

In our area, the brown dog tick is very common. Both the above tick-borne diseases are curable if treated with the antibiotic doxy-cycline, but these diseases can make your dog sick with fever, lethargy, and other flu-like symptoms. Failure to treat a dog for theses diseases can cause death, so it's really important to keep a watchful eye out for these little critters.

If you have ticks around your home, you're already probably spraying or using something to get rid of them as they can and do multiply quickly. If you have found ticks on your dog or other animals, it's also a good idea to make sure they're tested regularly for tick fever. Using a flea and tick preventative such as Frontline® is really the best remedy, as it kills the fleas and ticks before they can breed and cause a problem.

Ticks can be relatively small or can end up being about the size of a lima bean if they've been feeding off your dog and are fully engorged, but they need to be removed and disposed of quickly and safely. If you're not sure what to do, the following is a quick and easy guide to help you:

- Grab the tick by the head or mouth parts right where they enter the skin. Do not grasp the tick by the body.
- Without jerking, pull firmly and steadily directly outward. Do not twist the tick as you are pulling.
- Petroleum jelly, a hot match, or alcohol will NOT cause the

tick to 'back out.' In fact, these irritants may cause the tick to deposit more disease-carrying saliva in the wound.

- After removing the tick, place it in a jar of alcohol to kill it. Ticks are NOT killed by flushing them down the toilet.
- Clean the bite wound with a disinfectant. If you want to, apply a small amount of triple antibiotic ointment.
- Wash your hands thoroughly.

To remove an attached tick, use a pair of fine-tipped tweezers or special tick removal instruments. These devices allow one to remove the tick without squeezing the tick body. This is important, as you do not want to crush the tick and force harmful bacteria to leave the tick and enter your pet's bloodstream.

Once an embedded tick is manually removed, it is not uncommon for a welt and skin reaction to occur. A little hydrocortisone spray will help alleviate the irritation, but it may take a week or more for healing to take place. In some cases, the tick bite may permanently scar leaving a hairless area. This skin irritation is due to a reaction to tick saliva. Do not be worried about the tick head staying in; it rarely happens.

In 2011, the first American Hero Dog Award went to **Roselle**, a guide dog who led her blind master down 78 flights of stairs in the World Trade Center on September 11, 2001.

Magic Moments... when a stray Golden Retriever or Golden mix is spotted in a shelter kennel and does a happy dance when taken out; when a neglected backyard dog is surrendered by its owner to a member of our Transport Team and is delivered to a foster family that shows the dog love, comfort, toys and good-quality food for, perhaps, the first time in the dog's life; and the most magical of all... when a rescued dog meets his or her forever family and we see the dog's excitement and the sparkle in the family's eyes. As rescuers, we are privileged to share in these Magic Moments. Below are stories of Arizona Golden Rescue's Magic Moments from October 11, 2011 through January 15, 2012. All adoptions finalized after January 15th will be in the next issue.



10-065 Miss Mandy came back into Rescue when her first placement didn't work out. We were able to place her with Barbara in Tempe and they have become best friends. Barbara made her first acquaintance with *Arizona Golden Rescue* at one of our Meet-and-Greets at *PetSmart* in Tempe Marketplace. She was actually looking to adopt a

dog when she was introduced to **Mandy**. She went home, rushed in her Foster/FWITA application, and **Mandy** went to live with her shortly thereafter. **Mandy** and Barbara are now enjoying each other's company, obedience training and twice-daily walks. Barbara writes: As soon as I met **Mandy** at her foster mom's house, I knew she would be coming home with me. She's very happy in her new home, and she plans to stay in this one forever.

11-006 Chance is another one of our friends that came back to us when his initial placement didn't work out. This 4-year-old Golden mix needed some additional vetting upon his return and needed to actually receive his fluconazole for his valley fever. He spent quite some time with foster mom Pinky; she said he was a joy to have. After a wary start, he made friends with the resident dogs and Pinky's adult son. He's also



been able to stop the fluconazole, as his valley fever titer has come down significantly. In October, **Chance** went home with his new family, Mary and John in Green Valley. He still has a little nervousness on his walks and is cautious of strangers, but Mary and John are working on his manners. We wish them a happy life together and a great start to the New Year!



11-054 Buddy is a small, 6-year-old male who was rescued from the West-side *MCACCS* shelter. He spent some time at foster mom Beverly's house before going to his forever home with Barbara in Surprise. He met her two Shih-tzus, her cat, her horse, and a parrot that enjoys talking to every-one in its vicinity. After a rocky start during which **Buddy** recovered from

diarrhea, ear infections, and an ulcer in his eye, he has settled in quite well. For several months, he required eye ointment which Barbara diligently applied even when **Buddy** was ready to throw in the towel. **Buddy** is now enjoying his friends the Shih-tzus, and Barbara is considering getting him a Golden Retriever-sized companion. 11-062 Splash, now known as Trip, is a large, 4-year-old red Golden who now sports only three legs. His previous family surrendered him to *AGR* when they were unable to afford the treatment necessary for his valley fever. Most Goldens with valley fever require daily oral medication for several months to help treat this soil-born fungus. Unfortunately, **Trip's** case

was rather advanced – the fungus had invaded the bone in his right rear leg. As you may have read in the November 2011 newsletter's *Diamonds in the Ruff*, **Trip** had his leg amputated to improve his health and mobility. He was no longer using the leg, and the valley fever-infected bone was serving as a nidus for continued infection and pain. **Trip** is doing very well without his leg, though he's still taking fluconazole for the valley fever. He has made numerous visits to Meet-and-Greets and *Photos with Santa*. He has been adopted by his foster mom Liz. **Trip** now lives in a home full of Goldens and enjoys quality time with **Gonzo**, **Cooper**, **Sweetie**, and **Augie**. He likes to snuggle with mom, too, every once in awhile.

11-065 Goldie is a very sweet young girl who was found as a stray. When no one came forward to claim her, her finders contacted *AGR*. Before going to her forever home, Goldie took a detour to the vet. She had her teeth cleaned and bilateral ear infections treated. Her ear infections were so severe that both of her eardrums had perforated. She had her ear drums repaired and it appears



her hearing is normal. Initially, she showed some nervousness around other dogs but, after working with Teryl, our behaviorist, she is well behaved on walks with parents Romelle and Dick. She has settled in guite well with her new parents in Sun Lakes and enjoys meeting visitors to their home. They write: Goldie has been in 7th heaven ever since we picked her up. She is like Velcro to both of us. She now has about 5 toys that she moves around all day long. She especially loves her duckie (Real Bird Dog). She had a litter prior to being picked up, and I think these toys are her babies. She has learned to walk on a leash but was very apprehensive about other dogs. Tended to growl when she got too close. Now when she sees another dog she sits automatically and waits for a treat. She has even learned to sit and wait for a treat along the walk even if there aren't any other dogs. Very smart dog. She had ear surgery prior to her adoption and there isn't any problem with her hearing. She isn't a barker and she is the calmest Golden we have had. She just loves being very close to us. She is housetrained and sleeps through the night. She LOVES everyone who comes to visit her but doesn't jump up on them, just extends her paw. We can trust her with the run of the house when we are gone. This angel is such a blessing to us. Thank you.

11-066 Luke is a stunning 6-year-old male who came in when his original owners were moving to an apartment and were not able to take him. He had a beautiful face when he first joined AGR, but the rest of him needed a little work. Luke was significantly underweight – by about 20 pounds. He had uncorrected cryptorchidism – one of his testicles had not descended from his abdomen. This



was corrected when he was neutered. He required a dental and surgical removal of an epulis, which is an overgrowth of fibrous tissue on the gum line. These growths can occasionally be cancerous but, fortunately for Luke, his was benign. He also has cholesterol deposits on his left cornea which has reduced the vision in that eye. It doesn't appear to bother him though. Luke compensates well with his right eye and the remaining vision in his left. He is currently receiving eye drops which may help dissolve the deposits and, once he reaches his goal weight, he'll start on a low-fat diet to help prevent additional deposits from forming. Fortunately for Luke, he found his forever home on his way home from the vet. Foster mom Kathy decided on the drive home that Luke was destined to stay with her. After the recent loss of her Russ T, she felt the need to have another manly-man Golden in the house and Luke fit the bill. Kathy has shuttled him back and forth to his appointments, ensured he's gotten all his necessary medications, and provided him a nutritious diet of high calorie food to help him regain weight. He now enjoys being spoiled rotten by Kathy and is back to being the stunning dog he should be.



11-067 Sierra came in from the same home as Luke but, fortunately, did not have as many medical issues. She too needed to gain some weight. She also needed to work on her obedience, as she was not as well behaved as Luke. AGR was able to find a fantastic home for her as well. Sierra is living with June and Frank in Phoenix and has made herself right at home. She enjoys jumping in and out of

their pool to fetch her tennis ball and has made fast friends with everyone in the neighborhood. She also loves to have her long blond hair brushed. Thank you so much to all the volunteers who help rescue these gorgeous dogs! I can't imagine how anyone could give one up, but I'd like to thank them!

11-076 Bruno is a very mellow 11-year-old gentleman who came to us because his family was no longer able to care for him. He is quite spry for an older dog and able to leap into tall SUVs in a single bound. His coat is a glossy black and, while his tail feathers are mostly in, he's still growing the feathers on the backs of his legs. **Jackson** is the second dog rescued by **AGR** to have suffered from the very preventable parvo virus. Unfortunately, he was never vaccinated against it as a pup-



py and he must have contracted it during his stay at the shelter. It's highly contagious when dogs are kept in close contact. We discovered he had developed parvo while he was being boarded and were able to place him in isolation to prevent him from spreading the virus to any other dogs. We were also able to treat him before he became dehydrated or septic from bacteria moving from his intestine to his blood stream. Regrettably, he, like Tucker our other parvo puppy, developed intussusception, a telescoping of the intestine in upon itself. He required surgery and had approximately one foot of intestine removed. Jackson, also like Tucker, did very well after his surgery, started eating again, and is acting like a normal puppy. He did have some residual gut issues and had a battle with diarrhea, but that has resolved. After he was cleared by the vet, we were able to place him with Carol and Don in Flagstaff. They were immediately taken with him. He made fast friends with their resident Golden Sundance and a bulldog named Lucy that they were pet-sitting. Even their vet wanted to know if he could go home with Jackson! Jackson has flourished in his new home and his parents couldn't be more pleased. Carol writes: Jackson came into our lives the day after Thanksgiving and we've been thankful ever since. Jackson is an active one-yearold that has been through a lot in his short lifetime. He now lives in Flagstaff and there's a lot to explore and learn in this town! First, there were the horses! They are like pretty big dogs; but he knew instinctively not to chase them, or play behind their rear legs. He only really pays attention to them now when he's in front of their feeders and Jackson can jump up and they "nose" each other. Then there is the wildlife behind the glass doors: squirrels, birds, bunnies (his personal favorite!), mice and even cows for neighbors. He is SO interested in all the animals! Very alert, amazed and probably somewhat bewildered by all the action! Lastly, there's this white stuff that is so much fun to play in. At first he wasn't so sure he liked the cold on his paws, but it didn't take long to play wildly in the snow with his older brother. After a vet visit today and a good report on his health, Jackson is now 45.85 pounds (up ten pounds in a month!). He sits, stays, lies down, walks well on leash, plays fetch, "leave it", and usually comes (unless something of much more interest gets his attention). He's constantly making us laugh, and we're always amazed at what he'll find next to explore. Although Jackson is still a puppy and acts like one, he's never done any of the bad puppy things like chewing anything up. For that matter, he's never done anything wrong. He's sweet, obedient, gentle, feisty, strong and wonderful! Jackson is named after a Masai warrior that we met 15 years ago in Kenya. That Jackson was kind, gentle, fierce and unforgettable till this day. Our Jackson would make his namesake proud. We are so fortunate to now have both Jacksons in our lives.

11-081 Toby, now **Benzo**, came to *AGR* from the *Arizona Humane Society*. Not only did **Benzo** need antibiotics for a dental infection, but he was in desperate need of the green bean diet. 

Diamonds in the Ruff By Deb Orwig

Diamonds in the Ruff are rescued dogs that require *AGR* to spend at least \$1000 on their health care. In our November issue, we featured **11-021 Buster**, **11-048 Trina**, **11-061 Maxx and 11-062 Splash.** To follow up... **Buster's** allergies are under better control now. **Trina** was brought to a couple of events during the holidays and she looks fabulous – you can now tell that she has some Golden in her! **Maxx** is recovering from his first hip replacement surgery and is scheduled to have the second hip done after February 1st. **Splash**, renamed **Trip**, is getting along just fine on three legs and has been to many Meet-and-Greets and gift wrapping events since his amputation healed. He always gets the sympathy donation once people realize he has only three legs!

Fortunately, there were only two dogs that had significant medical costs during the past quarter.

One-year-old **11-079 Magic**, now called **Jackson**, came to *AGR* from the county shelter where he had contracted the dreaded parvo virus. He was kept in isolation at *AMSC* and seemed to be doing well, but then he developed the complication of intussusception, a condition where the intestine telescopes in on itself. Surgery had to be done immediately or **Jackson** would have died. His total vet bill was over \$8100. His adopters, Carol and Don in Flagstaff, have already made a generous donation above and beyond **Jackson's** adoption fee. If anyone else would like to be a Diamond Donor for **Jackson**, we would gladly accept your support.

Four-year-old **12-008 Summer** came to us with the group from El Paso. She had a lump on her side that was about the size of the

last knuckle of your thumb. The vet didn't like the feel of it (hard, nonmovable). A needle aspirate biopsy came back inconclusive, so we had the lump removed. Fortunately, it was determined to be a benign irritable mass resulting from some kind of trauma to the area (like maybe someone had kicked her in her side). We will not have to worry now about **Summer** possibly having a cancerous tumor at her young age, but we will have to pay her vet bill of \$1775. If you would like to help us out with this bill, you will be listed as a Diamond Donor for **Summer** in our May newsletter.



From the Front of the Bus The "Southern Pawspitality" Group Transport **By Deb Orwig**



Dark and early at 5:30 AM on Friday, January 6, 2012, Teri Guilbault and I set off for El Paso. It was one of the most uneventful long-distance trips I have taken on behalf of or with dogs! The weather was perfect and traffic was generally light. My minivan was loaded with one huge crate and three smaller ones, as well as snacks and beverages for us. We were planning to bring back five dogs from *Golden Retriever Rescue of El Paso (GRREP)*. Their President, Connie Jimenez, had contacted us in mid-December to ask if we could take some of their rescued dogs, as they were overwhelmed with the number of Goldens that were coming into their program. We had quite a few approved applicants, so we agreed.

It took three weeks for our Placement Manager, Michele Wehry, and the rest of us to finalize all the details of the trip. At least, I thought they were finalized until I got a call from Michele about



8:30 AM when we were nearing the Arizona/New Mexico border. She asked if we could also bring back a 6^{th} dog (**Summer**). I told her we would if we could fit her into the big crate with two other dogs. Fortunately, we were able to do that, as the three girls who rode on the small side.

back to Phoenix in that crate were all on the small side.

We arrived at *Howl A Day Inn* in El Paso, which was conveniently located just over the Texas/New Mexico border about 20 miles south of Las Cruces, NM. At 12:15 PM when we arrived, Connie met us there with the owner of the kennel. All the dogs except for **Celina**, who had just



been spayed the day before, were out running around in the large kennel play yard with about 30 other dogs of all sorts, so we knew right away that all of them were dog friendly. Teri took care of the paper-



work for the transfer of dogs from *GRREP* to *AGR*, while I unfolded the crates and got them set up in the car with crate pads and water bowls. It was a tight fit, but we managed, although Teri and I drove back with the seats pulled all the way up and our knees under our chins!

We loaded everyone up and off we drove, stopping for gas in Lordsburg, NM, and at a rest stop just over the NM/AZ border. Only one of the girls was willing to pee – the rest just wanted to nose around, so we were there only about 15 minutes. At 7:45 PM, we pulled into Teryl Hall's driveway, horn beeping and headlights flashing. I'm sure the neighbors would have wondered what was going on had

and feeding them all. The families that had been chosen for these dogs were asked to be at Ter-



Cool Tips

Put a stop to smelly "pet toots": You couldn't resist when your furry friend begged for table scraps, but the rich food caused a bout of gas. To ease his (and your) discomfort, add a dollop of plain yogurt to his food. Yogurt's digestion-enhancing probiotics keep gas-producing gut bacteria in check, quickly reducing flatulence. The vet-advised dose: 1/4 tsp daily for cats and small dogs, 1 tsp for dogs 15-20 pounds and 1 Tbsp for larger dogs.

End itching with this laundry add-in: To eliminate funky "dog smell," you wash your pup's bedding more frequently, but the chemicals in fabric softeners can trigger allergy symptoms like itching and shedding. Stop the cycle by adding 1/2 cup of white vinegar to the rinse cycle when laundering blankets and beds. Vinegar's mild acetic acid is nonirritating to canine skin and will effectively neutralize odors in the wash.





Debbe Begley, AGR's Cofounder (with Deb Orwig), who passed away on June 18, 2011, would have loved the service and party we held in her memory on October 30, 2011. In fact, since the day was so perfect weatherwise, many of us thought she had something to do with it! Many thanks to Kathi Youhas for coordinating the ceremony at Resthaven Cemetery on Northern Ave in Glen-



dale. She honored Debbe's requests to the letter. Debbe's boss from the days she worked for National City Mortgage, William Judd, was the officiant. Debbe's brother, Jack Begley, spoke about their growing-up days in Glendale (yes, Debbe was an Arizona native). A good friend of Debbe's from many years ago, Barbara Warren, came and related some funny stories of their younger days. She brought with her a Chilly Willy stuffed toy that Debbe gave her. Debbe's son, Dan Diamond, who lives in Alaska, was there along with Debbe's half brother Bill Grissom and his wife, Darlene, from Texas and several other relatives. Deb Orwig related the story of how she and Debbe met, with Debbe running after her in a parking lot after a workshop on hiking with your dog that both had attended. Joyce: The light of this first candle represents our grief. The pain of our loss is intense, but it reminds us of the depth of our love for Debbe.

Connie: The light of this second candle represents our courage to confront our sorrow; to comfort each other; to change our lives.

Deb: This third candle is a light to all of our memories of Debbe. To the times we laughed, the times we cried, the times we were angry with each other, the silly things we did, the caring and the joy Debbe gave us.

Bob: This fourth candle is the light of our love. Day by day we give thanks for the gift her life brought to each of us. We will love her always. Arizona Golden Rescue members made up the majority of the crowd. As Debbe had wanted, everyone wore bright, happy colors – in fact, every color of the rainbow was represented by someone. 
Stress Relief at GCU **By Deb Orwig**

Cool Tip

Taming a "jumper": Training to break the jump-up-on-youwhen-you-come-in-the-door habit takes time. However, try this trick: take your dog to the door with a few favorite toys and play several quick rounds of indoor "fetch," tossing the objects away from the entrance. Repeat the game when someone comes to the door (keep a few toys by the back door, too, if you come in that way). Cool Tips

Outsmart a pill-wary pooch: Hiding pills inside a treat is *supposed* to get the dog to gobble them down. But some are able to eat the goodie, then spit the pill out! Try giving the pill-packed morsel while dangling another treat in front of the dog. Your pooch will be so eager to get to the second helping, he'll swallow the first without hesitation. Then you can feed him the second treat, confident that he's been successfully dosed.

Itchy spider or bug bite: If your dog gets bitten by a spider or insect that causes an itchy or irritated spot to form, try this itchand pain-soothing remedy. Soak a cotton ball in ammonia and use it to gently dab the bite, then rinse the spot with water. The alkaline ammonia will neutralize the primarily acidic spider-bite toxins. Voilá! BULK RATE MAIL

You will notice that your address label on the back cover contains the verbiage "OR CURRENT RESIDENT." The U.S. Postal Service now requires that verbiage on anything sent out by bulk rate mail. We qualify to use bulk rate mail because of our nonprofit status and because we send out more than 225 identical pieces of mail in each mailing. It is very cost effective for us to use bulk rate mail – the November issue of *The Golden Paw* cost about 33¢ each, as opposed to the \$1.68 it cost to send one copy by first class mail. However, there are some drawbacks to using bulk rate mail. First, sometimes copies do not get delivered at all (who knows why?), or they may take a week or more (especially to out-of-state recipients) to get to their destinations. Bulk rate mail is not forwarded, nor is it returned to the sender if the intended recipient no longer resides at the address on the label, which is why it is so important for you to notify us if you move.
