It was also standard operating procedure for all the Teams - Home Evaluations, Intake, Health Care and Placement - and for our Membership and Social Media Managers. What a terrific group we have!

We have some new Team Members, too. Darlene Kaminski has joined Connie McCabe as one of our regular transporters. Darlene is now concentrating on Eastside transports and Connie on the West side. Occasionally, Darlene's husband, Rick Stephens, "goes along for the ride." Cindy Tigges and Robin Mish help with transports occasionally, too. With 104 dogs coming in last year, there were more transports needed than usual, and we thank all transporters for their help! Speaking of transports... Connie Mc-Cabe, Fred Prose and Christine Spiel drove to California to pick up 6 purebred Goldens from a breeder who was downsizing her business. The trip took two days: out to CA on Sunday, October 15; stayed overnight in a motel; drove back to AZ on Monday, October 16. The Placement Team said goodbye to Joni Cipollone, who had served as that Team's manager for over 3 years. At our Board of Directors meeting in early October, the Board accepted Adam Cardinal's resignation as Director of Information Management. He has agreed to continue to provide input on matters of information management, not as a Board member, but as a Team Manager. We eliminated the position from the Board and replaced it with Director of Health Care – we welcome Liz Tataseo as our new Director on the Board. As most of you know, we live in a highly technical world. While the ready access to information and communication can be a blessing, it also can be a nightmare when things go awry. Unfortunately, AGR is not immune to this. If you haven't already heard, our public Facebook page was seemingly hacked in late November. No, the hack did NOT affect the private group Facebook page - I know many of you are members of that group. It is controlled by our Admins, especially our Social Media moderator Kathy Blue, who personally reviews and checks any person applying to the group before admitting them. The public page is the one that is displayed to any Facebook user that searches on "Arizona Golden Rescue". As she has in the past, in late November, Kathy Blue posted a typical ad seeking donations to AGR for Giving Tuesday. The original ad specified we were seeking up to \$5,000; however, after our page was hacked, that amount was falsely increased to \$50,000, then a second ad (with a different photo) was listed seeking another \$50,000, and finally a THIRD ad was posted seeking \$60,000!

To make a very long story short, Kathy Blue and I spent countless hours on the phone discussing possibilities, along with calls to PayPal Giving Fund (Facebook/Meta outsourced all non-profit donations administration to PPGF in late 2023), trying to find who the donations were coming from and possibly identify the hackers...to no avail. The hackers immediately removed Kathy Blue as an Admin and severely restricted my personal Admin capabilities. Attempts to contact Facebook about this were fruitless, as there is no phone number nor real person available. Rather, all we could do was submit complaints/requests which did nothing more than give us canned artificial intelligence responses telling us we were not authorized to get such information as we were not the Financial Admins. I also contacted ABC15 "Let Joe Know", and I have also already submitted fraud reports to both the FTC (Federal Trade Commission) and the FBI (Federal Bureau of Investigation) Internet Crime Complaint Center. So far, no resolution has come from any of these contacts.

We are aware of some of the actual legitimate donations to this Giving Tuesday fundraiser. However, I have spoken with at least two people whose bank accounts were fraudulently debited for various increasing amounts for this supposed fundraiser for AGR. In those cases, any false debits must be reported to the donor's personal bank so they can dispute and reverse the charges. As of this writing, AGR has received the suspicious amount of \$30,000+ in donations to this Giving Tuesday fundraiser, but we believe much of this is likely fraudulent. We have made the decision to

set aside these funds in a protected bank account for potential reversal. PayPal Giving Fund has not yet fully reconciled the funds and supposed donations, nor have I received any responses from the FTC or the FBI, so this story is not over yet. If you made a legitimate PayPal donation on Facebook to *AGR* on November 28, 2024 in honor of Giving Tuesday, please contact me or Deb Orwig and let us know how much so that we know that at least that money was real. If you did not intend to make a donation on Facebook that day, but one shows up on your bank statement, please contact your bank and report it as fraud.

With all the above in mind, I believe it prudent to mention some best practices regarding financial cybersecurity in general. Many of the tips below were gleaned from my former career in Finance & Credit with a major Fortune 200 corporation. Hackers and those desiring to scam money out of the general public have increased multifold in recent years. I URGE you to take the time to examine these below and put them into practice to avoid being scammed yourself.

## Financial Cybersecurity Best Practices

### E-Mail:

- a. Do **NOT** click links within e-mails if you do not recognize the sender!
- b. Do NOT open file attachments from any unknown sender!
- c. DO click on the e-mail sender's name to display the send er's actual email address; if it is from something like a Gmail or Hotmail or Yahoo account, it is likely to be JUNK and not from the actual company they claim to be.
- d. DO watch for e-mails where the institution name is slightly misspelled (such as Ammazon, ChaceBank, etc.) Misspelled names are a tip-off that this is a fraudulent entity.
- e. Do **NOT** click on links within e-mails from supposed businesses claiming there was a suspicious purchase or your account is being suspended; instead go directly to their website and verify your status or call them.
- f. DO sign up for "informed delivery" via USPS.com to get a daily e-mail of what is coming in your regular postal delivery.

Internet & Websites:

- a. Do **NOT** use any public Wi-Fi for any financial transactions, such as checking your bank account, making pay ments, transmitting credit card info, etc. Public Wi-Fi is easily hacked; instead, use your private home Wi-Fi, or cellular, or a VPN virtual private network.
- b. DO utilize 2-step verification (2SV) for extra security for financial website access, aka "2FA" – 2-factor authentication – makes it difficult for crooks to break into your private stuff
- c. DO make passwords unique! Do **NOT** use the same password for various websites. Use a combination of lettersnumbers-special characters.

- d. Do **NOT** give out your bank account number for any automatic debits (you would be exposing your banking to multiple institutions' potential hacking theft). It IS okay to pay bills online, but YOU push the money out by triggering the payment; do NOT let others debit your account.
- e. DO make use of Malwarebytes FREE anti-malware soft ware; run it periodically on your computer.
- f. Do NOT panic if you get a "computer virus alert"; this could be a "ransom-ware attack". Do NOT call the listed phone number or click on any link. Microsoft never pops up "warnings" like this. If such a box appears on a Windows screen, the safest defense is usually to reboot the computer, but NOT by mouse-selecting "shut down" or "restart", and NOT by holding the power switch in. Either method initiates a standard Windows shut-down sequence that can finalize installation of pending malware and put it in your Startup list. Instead, cut power to the computer at its source (power plug or surge protector). Then when you power back up, Windows may complain about the improper shutdown, but typically at this point allowing Windows to restart in Safe mode. Then, running your virus scanner will resolve the matter. If it does not, contact a reputable computer tech support service,.

## Credit Cards:

- a. Do **NOT** use debit cards (less fraud protection, no benefits, does not allow dispute of any false transaction)
- b. DO use a separate unique credit card for gas stations (gas stations are notorious for having the most stolen credit card transactions)
- c. Do **NOT** use the same credit card you use at any gas station for any automatic "autopayment" subscriptions (such as insurance, monthly charges for services, etc)
- d. DO shop around for the best credit card deals (websites such as Nerdwallet, Bankrate, CompareCards are all good for evaluating various credit cards and what best may suit your needs)
- e. DO check your credit reports every 4 months minimum (with different entity each time) using ONLY the website annualcreditreport.com. DO use an Apple or Google calendar for reminders to check these.
- f. DO initiate a credit "freeze" at all three credit reporting institutions (will need to setup a PIN code to temporarily lift the credit freeze, such as when applying for a new loan)
  - i. Experian 888-397-3742
  - ii. Transunion 888-909-8872
  - iii. Equifax 800-685-1111
- g. Do **NOT** sign credit cards; instead, write on back of card "Verify ID" which instructs seller to verify your driver's license or other ID
- h. DO check your credit card transactions at least weekly; report/dispute any unrecognized charges (if reported promptly, you are only liable for first \$50 if card is stolen)

Social Media:

- a. DO make your Facebook "friends list" completely private, not even visible to your other friends; this will generally stop hackers from targeting you, as what they're after is perpetuating their malware through your connected friends.
- b. Do **NOT** click on any "Look who died!" message or link anywhere. This is a common method of pushing malware onto your computer.
- c. Do **NOT** answer or partake in any popular "nametest" posts in your Facebook feed asking for your 1<sup>st</sup> grade teacher's name, or your old address, phone number, family names, etc. These are notorious for being used by hacker data-miners to "phish" for personal information on YOU for future hacking attempts.

### General:

- a. DO ignore any unsolicited phone calls, e-mails, or texts from unfamiliar phone numbers, especially if text messages link to an unfamiliar website or any request for money
- b. DO slow down and be cautious of urgent or unusual requests
- c. Do **NOT** share confidential information (login IDs, passwords, verification codes)
- d. DO ignore the habitual "car warranty offers" or pop-up ads offering free items.
- e. DO utilize alerts on all bank accounts and credit cards for notification of when transactions occur over some designated \$ amount.
- f. DO consider a security freeze via ChexSystems, which is the service most banks and financial institutions use to verify identity. This security freeze is designed to prevent approval of checking, savings, credit accounts, loans, or other services from being approved in your name without your consent (although this might delay timely approval of such, as you would need to temporarily "lift" the freeze if needed.)



I recall when I retired from teaching and a new teacher was taking my place. As I introduced her to the staff she would be working with, we heard many teachers comment: "You have big shoes to fill!" Although I only take a size 8, I knew she was feeling apprehensive about fitting into a new position, especially as a first-year teacher! I also felt letting go of my position was difficult. I had established long-standing relationships with the staff and letting go and moving on was a challenge.

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Now, Jeanne Wegener and I have also had the challenge of filling some big shoes! Carolyn Brown, *AGR's* previous Director of Activities, had to step back due to health reasons. Carolyn has been very supportive as Jeanne and I figure out what the heck we are doing and how we got into such a big job that only one person had done before! As Co-Directors\*, we are also figuring out which part each of us plays in the whole picture. Jeanne is very savvy with dealing with Facebook and technology challenges. On the other hand, I am good at communicating with the volunteers. We are working together to provide our members with events that are fun and family-oriented, while promoting awareness to the public and raising funds for our Goldens and Golden mixes. Carolyn will continue to attend events and support us with future events. Jeanne and I appreciate all the help and guidance you have given us during this transition! Thank you, Carolyn!

We would also like to thank all the Board members for their guidance and direction: Deb Orwig, for her countless hours of encouragement and wealth of information; Debbie Ball, for her technology expertise; Connie McCabe, for her encouragement and confidence you have expressed to us. Thank you, ladies, for your support and welcoming us to the team!

There are many events coming up this spring, so check your calendars and come join us for the fun! Attending the events, meeting other *AGR* members and, very important, giving and getting love from all the dogs that join us! We hope to see new faces in the future, along with all the wonderful members who have attended events in the past!

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## Health Care for all Incoming Dogs

When we are out in public collecting donations, or doing major fundraising, we always say it is for the dogs! That money does go directly to vet costs to make sure each dog is as healthy as possible so they are ready to be happy and healthy in their forever homes. We are able to work with several great animal vet clinics/ hospitals that give us discounts, so we are able to pursue needed vetting for each dog.

Our veterinarians include *Four Legged Friends Animal Hospital* in Phoenix that has worked with us since the beginning; *Kennel Care* in Chandler that has cared for many of our dogs for 14 years; *Crosswinds Animal Clinic* in Gilbert that has serviced many of our dogs in the past few years; *Phoenix Mountain Animal Hospital* in Scottsdale; *Scottsdale Veterinary Clinic* and 24-hour ER in South Scottsdale; *Stetson Hills Animal Hospital* in North Glendale; *Complete Pet Animal Hospital* in Litchfield Park; and *Academy West Animal Hospital* that has given us the security of both boarding and vetting for emergency intakes. New to our list is *DC Ranch Animal Hospital* in Northeast Scottsdale.

We also have partnerships with many specialists: EyeCare for Animals; Arizona Oncology; Arizona Dental Specialists; Dermatology for Animals; VetMed ER and specialty center; Animal Medical & Surgical Center in Scottsdale, now open 24/7, and is a state-of-the-art ER and specialty hospital; Desert Veterinary Medical Specialists in Peoria; Integrative Veterinary Oncology in Phoenix; Pet Cancer Care Consulting; VCA Animal Referral and Emergency Center in Mesa; and VEG (Veterinary Emergency Group) in Chandler.

We also work with other specialists and ERs as needed, as well as many veterinary clinics around the state.

The basic vetting we do for each dog during the initial three-week foster period includes:

- health exam
- valley fever test (normally not done on a puppy under 3 months of age)
- flex4 tests for heart worm and tick fevers (normally not done on a puppy under 3 months of age); heartworm prevention provided for two months.
- rabies and distemper/parvo vaccinations if needed
- leptospirosis vaccination if needed (two-shot vaccine)

- bordetella vaccine
- spay or neuter (normally we recommend neutering and spaying at about 12 months)
- implantation of an AVID microchip
- fecal if indicated by history (we always test strays), by appearance of stool, or if dog is a puppy
- senior panel if 8 years of age or older
- ear infections, lumps, bumps, physical issues, and preexisting conditions will also be addressed

If warranted by the exam, dogs may be referred to a specialist for follow-up and treated for the condition. Follow-up exams and treatments needed for any ongoing illness and condition will be included for three months post-finalization of the adoption with a medical addendum.

In order to get the basic vetting done for each dog, two different avenues exist. If the dog comes from a shelter or is an emergency intake, or is not up to date on their vaccinations/vetting, the dog will, in the majority of those cases, go to one of our veterinarians first before being placed in their forever home or to a foster who will get the dog vetted. If the dog is already well-vetted on intake from a surrendering home, the dog will most likely be placed in their new home first and the new family will take the dog to one of our veterinarians through a regular appointment, at their convenience, within the first few days the dog is in their home.

Each animal hospital has a dedicated *AGR* volunteer who coordinates vetting between the family and the veterinarian and is available for follow-up and any questions the family may have about the health of their dog. As Director of Health Care, I am also available to do follow-up or answer questions regardless of the veterinarian being seen.

During our years in Rescue, we have helped bring dogs to the highest level of health that our vets and foster families who nurse a medical dog can bring them. We have, for our rescue dogs, done hip replacements, chemotherapy, intestinal/stomach surgery, epilepsy/seizure treatment, valley fever treatment, heartworm treatment, cardiology surgical/treatment, dental surgery/treatment, tumor removal, thyroid treatment and have addressed many, many other health needs.

We are well-compensated for all of this when our rescues get to their forever homes and live happy, healthy lives with their families.

## Gentle Paws Hospice Adoption Health Care

About once a year, we have a dog come in that is really in bad shape. Placement finds a terrific family or individual that will care for the dog but can't afford the ongoing cost of medications or treatment. The dog is put into our *GPHA* program, whereby the adopter gets charged only \$1 for the adoption and AGR pays for all medical expenses going forward.



## "It's all about the dogs"

We say that a lot, because that is why we are all part of this wonderful group. You would not be reading this if it were not for your love for the dogs. But as much as that is true, it takes a lot of hard work from a lot of people to keep this organization, and therefore the dogs, alive and thriving.

So, since this is the "Human Connection" column, in every issue I am going to continue to mention a few interesting facts and stories about some of the people you might know. Hopefully, you will learn something new about them and gain more insight into how they got here. I know there are a lot of people who just wanted to adopt a dog and have no interest in participating in *AGR* activities. I will respect the privacy of those who prefer not to be active and just concentrate on those who are, or have been, most active in the organization.

Hopefully, by now you will have noticed that many of our members have stayed to be part of the organization long after their first-year membership has expired. And, many times, even after the  $AGR \log(s)$  they have adopted have gone to the Bridge. There are many members who have never even adopted a dog from us and some who don't even have a dog at all! We are grateful to those who have continued to renew their memberships year after year and who contribute their time, money, and hearts to the group, whether or not they are interested in adopting a Golden.

Let me introduce you to the newest members of the *AGR* Placement team - one of the most important jobs in Rescue.

First, meet Peggy Andrews, who adopted *AGR* 23-020 Honey last spring.



In Peggy's words: I'm a native-born Arizonan, but I moved away when I was seven. I then moved back to Phoenix in 1997. I've been an RN for 50 years – 22 years as an Army nurse. I retired in 2017 after my husband passed away. I have had dogs most all my life; I rescued my first dog in Boston in 1972 and I had her for 12 years. At one point after returning to Arizona, I had three rescued dogs.

Then we got **Fiona**, a purebred Golden Retriever from a breeder, and she was the perfect dog for 12 years 4 months – the love of my

life. She hurt herself getting into the car and several weeks later she went to the Bridge. It took me  $1\frac{1}{2}$  years to finally feel like I could love another dog.

Last May, Connie contacted me about **Honey**, a seven-year-old Golden mix. **Honey** was born in Mexico and was probably a stray for the first two years of her life; eventually she found her way to Arizona and was rescued by a lady who had her for five years. Sadly, her owner was suffering from dementia and was going into memory care. Unfortunately, while her owner and her daughter were on the patio of the assisted living apartment, a rattlesnake was lurking, and **Honey** drew its attention; it struck and got **Honey** over her left eye. The daughter reacted quickly and got **Honey** to a vet so she could get the antivenin. The daughter later wanted to have her put down, but the vet refused and called Arizona Golden Rescue. **AGR** came to **Honey's** rescue and Connie fostered her through her recovery. All this time they didn't know if the snake bite had compromised her vision or the eyeball. Fortunately, she can see just fine and even had surgery to help close the eye lid.

Today, **Honey's** a wild and crazy girl who loves walks and having her butt and any other part of her body scratched. She is learning some of the basic commands – come, sit, wait, and out (which means stay out of the kitchen while I'm cooking). She is a work in progress, and I see a wonderful relationship for us. I really enjoy participating in our AGR fundraisers; the folks that volunteer for AGR are fun people, and I get to meet a lot of wonderful Goldens.

As part of the Placement team, I also do love finding the right homes for our dogs. It's so great when we hear that the adoptions are successful and how happy the new owners are. We know they will love their dogs and give them good homes. Sometimes it doesn't work out with the first family, but we keep trying until their forever home is a reality. Happy Times for us as well!

Next, meet Sharon Briggs, who adopted **23-053 Stella**, formerly **Storm**, this past summer.



Hi, I'm Sharon Briggs, a volunteer on the Placement team. I have lived with dogs all my life and fell in love with the Golden Retriever breed in college after spending time with a friend's family Golden – he was the smartest and most handsome fella I had ever met!

*Our current dog is* **Stella Blue**, a black Goldendoodle, whom we adopted from AGR. She is 10 months old – a big girl and still growing.

She loves to carry her leash around to remind me it's time for a walk!

# The Financial Picture By Deb Orwig

I have some rather complicated finances for 2023 to report at the beginning of 2024.

First, in early September 2023, we rolled over for another 6 months the money that had accumulated in our 6-month CD. When it matures on March 3, 2024 it will have amassed \$101,656.66. Unless we need some of that money to pay for some unanticipated and extraordinary vet expenses, the CD will be rolled over again for another 6 months. At 4.5% interest, it's worth keeping it tied up, especially since we have a sizable amount in our regular checking account!

Due to the Facebook/PayPal fiasco that Debbie Ball mentioned in her column (pages 4-5), we had to switch our regular checking account to our Debbe Begley Memorial Fund account. Debbe's Fund was originally created in 2010 to pay for expenses that exceed \$5,000 for one dog or total expenses for a dog that comes into Rescue with cancer. We have kept this Fund viable by doing one dedicated fundraiser per year (*Dine Out With The Dogs* – see pages 31-33), plus several supporters have sent donations specifically for this Fund.

I transferred most of the balance in our regular checking account to Debbe's Fund account since this was already set up as a checking account. A minimal balance is now kept in our original checking account. If PayPal ever tries to dock us for the \$86+K that PayPal shows is a pending debit, we will fight it and maybe even have to go to court to avoid paying it. If we owe anything to Pay-Pal, it will be only the part of the \$30+K they deposited in our checking account as money that was donated to *AGR* on Giving Tuesday, November 28, 2023. I say only part because some of the donations in that \$30+K were legitimate. In the meantime, we will not be spending ANY of that \$30+K, as we are not sure right now how many of those "donations" were by those who hacked our PayPal Giving Fund account.

### Summer Fundraiser for Special Needs Dogs

In years past, I have always sent a separate mailing by first class US mail to all adopters. This year due to time constraints, I just included the information about our Special Needs Dogs and a plea for donations in the August/September issue of *The Golden Paw*. As you can see in the table at the right, we did not receive much more than \$550 in donations. Whereas for the three previous years, we averaged \$13,652 in donations. This year, I will go back to preparing letters to be sent separately from the newsletter!

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### **Event Expense**

We are charged \$50 for participation at each *PACC911* Adopta-thon. In order to be eligible for *PACC911* medical grants, we are obligated to attend at least three of their adopt-a-thons. It's OK, though, because we always bring home more than \$200 in merchandise sales and donations from each event. Another event expense we had was to buy two new pop-up tents because two of our old ones became unusable.

## **Merchandise Purchases**

Included the following: Sidekick leashes (which we sell for profit), regular leashes and collars (regular and martingale), and hats and shirts with embroidered *AGR* logo.



*Diamonds in the Ruff* are dogs on which *AGR* has had to spend at least \$2,000. In the third and fourth quarters combined for 2023, we had eight dogs that met this benchmark. Three of those were already mentioned in the August/September 2023 newsletter, so below we will discuss the other five qualifying dogs. Please consider donating to help with the expenses of a specific dog, or just earmark it for *Diamonds in the Ruff*. All donations are tax deductible to the extent allowed by law, of course, and will be acknowledged as such.



23-042 Kai is a 1-year-old unneutered male purebred Golden whose former owner surrendered him to *AGR* because they could not afford his necessary hip surgery. Kai received the standard initial vetting and was neutered in late June. He was initially fostered by Connie and Nick in Glendale and had a surgical consult in July. In late September, Kai under-

went a total hip replacement and has been recuperating under the watchful eyes of his adopters Julie and Garrett in Glendale. Expenses for **Kai** cost *AGR* **\$10,964** in 2023. He will need his other hip replaced sometime in 2024.

**23-048 Scout** is one of the Goldendoodle puppies whelped by **23-031 Ivy**, who was found to be pregnant after she came into Rescue. In early July, **Ivy** had 6 puppies (read about Mamadog and pups on pages 13-14). **Scout** was given his initial exam and vaccinations and placed with Laurie and Kevin in Gilbert. Before his adoption was finalized in late September, **Scout** was not eating much

for a few days, was vomiting and had a distended belly. After a trip to the ER vet where an ultrasound was done, a hole was discovered in **Scout's** stomach. On October 4<sup>th</sup>, **Scout** had emergency surgery to repair his stomach and gastrointestinal tract. **Scout's** expenses totaled **\$10,304**. He will need to be neutered at *AGR's* expense when he is of age.



**23-053** Storm/Stella is a female 4½-year-old Goldendoodle. She was surrendered as she had too much energy for the other dogs she lived with previously. Her initial vetting was done to bring her up-to-date on vaccines and various tests, and she was subsequently fostered and then placed with Sharon and Mike in Phoenix and renamed Stella. In early August, she was taken to *VetMed* for emergency evaluation of a



swollen ankle, and in September she underwent a CT scan and orthopedic exam. While nothing immediate was found, it was determined she has hip dysplasia and is on Adequan injections. Further evaluation will be done after she is spayed. Total expenses so far for **Stella** cost *AGR* **\$4,192**.



**23-070** Nora is a 3-year-old spayed female Goldendoodle who was surrendered by her former owners in early September after she had consumed another rock. Nora had a history of eating rocks and had a prior surgery in November 2022, but the owners were overwhelmed and could not afford another surgery. Enterotomy surgery was done

at *VetMed* on 9/7/23, followed a few weeks later by normal vetting at *Academy West* to bring her up-to-date on vaccines, cocci and heartworm testing. **Nora** was fostered by Connie and Nick to ensure she was carefully watched so as to avoid any further ingestion of things she should not have, as **Nora** can NOT tolerate any further surgery. Connie took **Nora** to *Dine Out With The Dogs* (see pages 31-33) where Michele and Mark of Scottsdale fell in love with her, subsequently applied, and adopted her, renaming her **Dora**. *AGR's* expenses for **Dora** in 2023 were **\$6,514**.

**23-098 Torrey** is a 3-year-old spayed female Golden Retriever who was surrendered by her former owners because they could not afford her medical care after she ingested a foreign object. **Torrey** had eaten a sock in the prior year and had surgery for that. Then, in December, she had ingested some other unknown object

which was causing severe obstruction. *AGR* took **Torrey** under our care and emergency surgery was done on December 1<sup>st</sup> at *Vet Emergency Group*. Later in December, **Torrey** required an emergency ultrasound, intestinal surgery with removal of several inches of infected tissue and hospitalization. **Torrey** is currently being carefully fostered by Sharon in Sun Lakes. As of this writing, **Torrey** 



is looking for her forever home with a family that will carefully watch her to ensure she does not ingest anything she should not have, as **Torrey** cannot endure any further surgeries. Total expenses so far for **Torrey** have cost *AGR* **\$24,106**.

## Pica and Coprophagia

If you've ever wondered why your beloved dog insists on chewing up socks, shoes, and bits of plastic, you're not alone. Dogs are constantly chowing down on rocks, soil, plants, poop and other things they shouldn't be eating. It's common for dogs to eat all sorts of odd things. This habit even officially has a name: **pica**.

One of the most concerning for many dog owners is when their dogs eat poop. This disgusting habit is known as **coprophagia**, and is a way that mothers keep their puppies clean and encourage them to defecate when they are small. Some puppies do the same thing, and for a few, the habit sticks and continues into adulthood. That may be why you occasionally find your dog munching on something we wouldn't consider touching with a 10-foot pole.

Many dogs also love the taste of feline poop - a regular delicacy in the canine world, apparently. Fortunately, coprophagia isn't usually dangerous for dogs. Nonetheless, it can expose your pet to unpleasant internal parasites. If you are concerned about what your dog has been eating, make sure you get your dog checked out.

4 Reasons Why Dogs Eat Things They Shouldn't

1. Upset Stomach

One of the most common reasons for dogs to start ingesting odd items is that they've got something in their system they don't like, and they're trying to purge it out. They usually use grass for this and tend to throw up not long after.

Dogs are known for picking up bits of odd food that they shouldn't be eating. Their systems are designed to cope with this sort of thing, but if it becomes a regular habit, get your dog checked out.

2. Behavioral Issues

Many dogs suffer from anxiety and other behavioral problems, and eating odd things can be a sign that this is kicking in. Your pet may simply be bored – especially if they are alone for long periods, or you have been out more often than usual.

To tackle this, try giving your pet some extra time and attention when you're at home. Reassure them and get them engaged with some new games to ensure their brain is working hard. This should help reduce the destructive behavior.

3. Exploration

Particularly in young dogs, eating something inedible is a result of the dog exploring its world. They chew as a means of understanding and engaging with things. If they do this a lot, they may end up ingesting things by accident, or because their chewing becomes a little too enthusiastic.

If your dog is a chewer, keep an eye on them and try to prevent them from reaching the stage where they ingest random items. It may already have passed that point, in which case you'll have to work on techniques to engage them in other activities, or to encourage them away from the chewing habit.

Make sure they have plenty of robust, safe toys they can chew on, and keep your things away from them if possible.

4. Hunger

Although this is unlikely if you're taking good care of your dog, eating random things can be a sign that they aren't getting enough to eat or that they're lacking a nutrient and trying to find it elsewhere. If you've recently put your dog on a diet, they might start eating random things, as they will feel hungry just as a human does and will want to fill their stomach.

Establish a good feeding routine with your dog and minimize their options to eat random things they find.

Although most dogs won't hurt themselves by eating sticks and grass, some household items can result in blockages and very expensive trips to vets. This is stressful for both dog and owner, and it can also be hard on the wallet.

If your dog regularly eats things they shouldn't, make sure you pick up small, easily swallowed items, and consider behavior training with an expert to reduce the habit. It might save you money in the long run!

If eating rocks is the habit, invest in a soft muzzle or OutFox Field Guard<sup>®</sup> and keep it on the dog when he/she is outdoors.

# MAGIC MOMENTS

Magic Moments... when a stray Golden Retriever or Golden mix is spotted in a shelter kennel and does a happy dance when taken out; when a neglected backyard dog is surrendered by its owner to a member of our Transport Team and is delivered to a foster family that shows the dog love, comfort, toys and good-quality food for, perhaps, the first time in the dog's life; and the most magical of all... when a rescued dog meets his or her forever family and we see the dog's excitement and the sparkle in the family's eyes. As rescuers, we are privileged to share in these Magic Moments. Below are stories of Arizona Golden Rescue's Magic Moments from August 26, 2023 through January 15, 2024. All adoptions finalized after January 15<sup>th</sup> will be in the next issue.



**23-008 Buddy** is a 3<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>-year-old Goldenddoodle. He was an intact male and was originally surrendered with **23-009 Sunny**, a 5-year-old not-spayed Goldendoodle. The dogs weren't particularly bonded, so we adopted them to different families. **Sunny** was placed fairly quickly (her story was in the August/ September 2023 issue), but **Buddy** had some problems at the first three fami-

lies he was placed with – he is a large, strong dog who was never properly trained – in his case, the fourth time was the charm. No vet records came with him, so we had to start the vaccine series and also had to have him neutered. His original owner described **Buddy** as smart, very sweet and a teddy bear. He likes to play fetch with rubber balls. He spent most of his time outside or crated for up to 6 hours. We found the best home for him with Dara and DeWitt in Chandler. When we spoke to him, DeWitt confirmed that **Buddy** needs a lot of exercise and loves to fetch a ball. He has a large backyard in which to run, and DeWitt occasionally takes him to the local dog park, too. He said: **Buddy** is doing great! He keeps avoiding the crate. **Buddy** and **Murphy** are doing well together. Very sweet – **Buddy** is making sure he attaches to each of us. He is sitting, enjoying petting, playing – doing everything he should be doing! He is a great dog. We are so glad Buddy has such a terrific family now!

**23-019 Tywin**, a 6-year-old Golden male, came into *AGR* on May 22, 2023. **Tywin** was acquired as a puppy by the owners. Since the husband recently left, the wife had been overwhelmed caring for her two small children under the age of 6 years and a dog. **Tywin** had started to act out by eliminating in the house and on the children's toys. Although he is described as fun-loving and energetic, he is very strong and



needs training. **Tywin** received the standard vetting with vaccines and tests for valley fever and heartworm. He tested positive for valley fever and is currently being treated with fluconazole. When he meets new people, **Tywin** is very excited, jumping up and hugging them. With love, patience and obedience training, Ty has become an important part of Jim and Holly's family in Phoenix. Holly notes in this message: Last year we lost our 12-year-old beloved Chocolate Lab, and our 3-year-old Golden Retriever Max was lonely and not very active at the time. We joined Arizona Golden Rescue and hoped for a good match for our family. We are so happy with our new Golden, six-year-old Tywin. He has become best buddies with Max. Tywin came to us as an overly-excited, sweet boy and has since become a beloved member of our family. He is the best dog and is always ready to give big hugs. He is known as a "social tornado," as he will spin around in excitement when meeting anyone on a walk (he controls himself better when he wears his harness on walks now). Tywin, lovingly known as Ty, is really great with our grandkids and can be so gentle around them. He can also steal and quickly swallow your napkin in a heartbeat, so we are very careful to not let this happen. He loves carrots and apples, and, of course, toys and balls – always has one in his mouth. Our house has dog toys and hair scattered everywhere keeping our Roomba busy, and we wouldn't have it any other way. Thank you for everything you do for golden families in Arizona!

**23-024 Bear**, a Golden mix, was found at a park in Central Phoenix. The finder tried to locate the owner by posting his photo on social media, putting up flyers, contacting the *AZ Humane Society* and *MCACC*. Maricopa County came out to scan **Bear** for a chip, but there was none. The finder was unable to keep **Bear** because he has a full-time job, and his 2-year-old female Springer Spaniel didn't



like him – when **Bear** used the doggie door to go outside, she prevented him from coming back through the door. He is described as sweet, very excitable, and strong. After coming into *AGR* on April 29, 2023, **Bear** received vetting, was given vaccines, treated for an ear infection, and was scheduled for neutering. Once he was neutered, **Bear** was taken to Lori, Jason and their two daughters in Gilbert. After welcoming **Bear** into their home, they have experienced a few challenges. He pulls on his leash while walking, likes to jump, and paws at them for attention. He is also reactive to unknown humans and dogs and will growl as a warning. Lori has been very patient with Bear, taking him to obedience classes and being consistent with his behavioral training. She has maintained frequent contact with AGR and sought out suggestions and recommendations for Bear's situation. She wanted to try Bear on behavioral medication, which AGR approved, and possibly hire a behaviorist. Lori has reported that Bear is so much calmer and happier on meds. She had her in-laws visit for 21/2 weeks and her mom for 2 weeks, and Bear did well with everyone. He still reacts when he sees other dogs on walks, but they try to time their walks when fewer dogs are out. She also redirects him and keeps walking to avoid a situation. She wants to work on improving his behavior, but at least they can go for walks now. The Sidekick leash they bought from AGR along with obedience classes, and lots of practice with treats, have been a real game changer! After working with him through some challenging situations, Lori and Jason decided to adopt Bear after 7 months!

**23-030 Harley** is a neutered 9-year-old Goldendoodle who came to AGR because the female owner had to go into assisted living – a very difficult surrender since **Harley** had been a family companion for 6 years. He had grown very close to her since the passing of her husband. Although he hasn't had much socialization with other dogs, he is described as loving, mellow and enjoys lots of atten-



tion. Harley briefly lived with two foster families before arriving at his forever home with Marlene and Jeff in Scottsdale. After being dropped off at his new home, Harley was a little "unsettled." After taking an evening walk, he seemed more comfortable and relaxed with his new family. That night there was a thunderstorm which didn't bother him at all. The next day he was waiting at the door when Marlene came home and gave her lots of kisses! Harley is now enjoying his new life with Marlene, Jeff and their three resident dogs! When a follow-up call was made by Joni, an AGR member, Marlene and Jeff said that they really love Harley. Marlene said he is wonderful and that he is not going anywhere. She did mention that they must be mindful about leaving food on the counter because he once ate an entire rib eye steak which was raw, and another time ate the entire banana bread that she had just taken out of the oven. Marlene was laughing when relating those stories. She thanked Joni for calling and also said thank you so much for giving them, Harley. Marlene also described life with Harley as follows: We are so happy we were able to include Harley (a gentle giant) into our family. He is such a sweet boy and gets along well with our other dogs, Wiener, Billie Jean and Aussie Heeler, Pal... He loves to go for walks, loves to play, bounces all over our yard, he lays his head in our laps for love rubs and eats EVERYTHING within his reach. Harley has certainly found his way into our hearts and his forever home!

**23-031 Ivy**, was a small, 11-month-old Goldendoodle when she was surrendered to *AGR* on May 24, 2023. The owner was going to medical school and did not have time for this little girl (or any of the several other dogs and puppies that were at the house). We were told **Ivy** was in heat at the time, but the resident  $1\frac{1}{2}$ -year old male Doodle must have mated with her before we got her, because she



looked like she might be pregnant. She had 6 puppies on July 5<sup>th</sup>. **Ivy** and the puppies were fostered by Audra and Brent in Wittmann. By the time the puppies were weaned at about 5 weeks, the family had adopted **Ivy** and had also decided to keep one of the puppies (**23-047 Hank**, now called **Jim**), as was their right to do



as fosters. **Ivy** was a good mommy, but to ensure she wouldn't ever have more puppies, we had her spayed in early September. She is doing well now – plays and plays with the puppy and basically ignores the resident pigs, goat and other dogs in the household.

23-043 Lolli was found wandering on the street near the Central Phoenix home of one of *AGR's* adopters. They could not keep this pretty girl due to going away on vacation the next day. We decided to take her to *Academy West Animal Hospital* and put her on a 6-day stray hold. We posted messages about her on several "found pet" websites, but no one ever contacted us. It was a con-



cern because the girl was lactating, so she had had puppies not long ago. Puppies were not found anywhere in the vicinity of where Lolli had been picked up (transporter drove around for a half hour looking for posted signs). Lolli(pop) was named by the kids in the finder's home. Judged to be about 3 years old, she was shy but loving around the humans. Joan and Keith in Scottsdale agreed to foster her, even though she was much younger than other dogs they'd fostered. At first, Lolli was depressed and anxious until she arrived at the fosters' home where she was introduced to the resident male Golden, Scooter. It was love at first sight. Lolli threw herself at him and they commenced to play and flirt immediately. Her whole attitude shifted then and Lolli, now called Eden, became a confident, curious girl. Once inside the house, she met the frail smaller dog, Sophie, and was very gentle. She found a toy and happily threw it around for a bit. That was not an issue for Scooter at all - no jealousy or toy issues. Connie has since talked to Joan and everything is going very well. The dogs are best of friends and

Eden is very comfortable and happy to be home.



**23-046 Daytona** puppy. Nothing unusual to report with this male puppy, who was the first-born of **Ivy's** litter of 6. Typical puppy behavior – smart and vocal. He met the resident dogs without incident at Brittnie and Ryan's house in Surprise. While the transporter was going over paperwork –

*Your New Dog* manual and hitting the highlights of a *Puppy Tips* handout from Liz – the golf tournament was mentioned as our upcoming large fundraiser. The family perked up and said they would try to get up a foursome – they did, and we really appreciated their participation!



#### Nine weeks old

At the home, they have a really nice "dog room" with a huge bed and crate that can be gated off. After just a couple days, Brittnie said: *I probably am creating a monster but he slept with us last night and we got up and took him out throughout the night – he did great*. They changed his name to **Ted** and are enjoying watching him grow up.



23-047 Hank stayed with the foster family, Audra and Brian in Wittmann. As the foster, it was their right to choose to keep the mother dog, as well as one of the pups. By the time the pups were 2 months old, they were so cute and getting so big, the family just had to have one. Been there, done that myself with Ladybird's litter in 2005 (kept Troy and Mama Ladybird) and Faith's litter in 2016 (kept Vin). Hank has a new

name now: **Jim**. Mother **Ivy** plays with him constantly. **Jim** will be bigger than his mother once he is full grown. As with the other pups, we issued an addendum for the sterilization surgery when **Jim** is about a year old.

**23-048 Scout**, one of the three male puppies, was chosen by Laurie and Kevin in Gilbert, who had recently adopted **23-028 Snow**, now called **Lily**, from *AGR*. Lily was a little shy and they felt that getting her a puppy companion would help socialize her – it has. Seems there is always one or two pups in a littler born into Rescue that has some problems. **Scout**, whose



name is still Scout, is one in this litter. While playing in the yard,

**Scout** somehow found and ate a stick. The family reported they watch him closely when out in the yard because he likes to pick up whatever he can put in his mouth – typical puppy! Unfortunately, they must've briefly looked away one time. How did they know he had eaten something he shouldn't have? He became lethargic, didn't want to eat much and vomited – not like a puppy at all! The stick poked a hole in **Scout's** stomach, so stomach contents were contaminating the abdomen. Surgery was required, as were a course of antibiotics, pain meds and a drain. He recovered well. Now, his favorite game is playing takeaway with his ball and having **Lily** chase him. Good exercise!

23-049 Basil, now called Stella, was adopted by Sheryl in Glendale. In 2022, she had adopted one of Sophia's puppies (Whitman, now Bodie) from *AGR*. She had three other dogs but all were older dogs and none really wanted to play with Bodie. When Stella was delivered to the house, Bodie got very excited about having a new playmate, so



much so that Sheryl had to leash him until he calmed down. **Bodie** has learned not to overwhelm **Stella** with his enthusiasm and the two play a lot.



**23-050 Luna**, one of the three female puppies, was selected by Maureen and Kevin in Phoenix, whose family includes two kids and a cat. **Luna** loves everyone, although the cat made itself scarce. Not too long after going to the vet for a second DHPP vaccine and a micro-chip, **Luna** had a bout with diarrhea and vomiting. She may have picked up some kind of virus at the

vet, so they started her on an anti-viral medication and she was given an IV for nausea/diarrhea to replenish fluids. A blockage had been ruled out, as was parvo. She recovered well. The family said: *Luna is absolutely wonderful. We adore her! Luna is the greatest asset to our family!* 



Two weeks old

**23-051 Bristol** was adopted by Nicole and Chris and their children in Mesa. They changed her name to **Zoe**. The dog came to them with ear infections in both ears. Prednisone and Mometavet were prescribed; Nicole reported that the ears improved quickly after she started the meds and they have had no ear problems since. Ear infections are very common in Golden Retrievers, so we're not surprised that one of **Ivy's**

**23-052** Millie, now called Cookie (formerly 23-013), is a year-old female Golden mix. She was returned to Rescue due to behavior problems. She was originally rescued as a stray wandering in the desert area around Sun City in March 2023. Millie was placed on fluoxetine for her anxiety and fear. After being boarded for 2 months, Millie won the heart of Brandi in Phoenix. When she first arrived at her



new home, **Millie** was a little nervous but adjusted quickly after being given some nice chew treats and a squeaky rubber chicken! She likes exploring outside, running around, and chasing a ball, but not bringing it back or leaving it for a game of fetch. With patience, consistency, and attention from Brandi, **Millie** is flourishing in her new home. When a follow-up call was made to Brandi, she commented: *I've been calling her* "**Cookie**" since she's just so sweet! She's settled in with a routine and does really well the days I have to work at the office. She is definitely my little shadow though. She follows me everywhere, even room to room. She seems to be doing well with her meds, but I think she still has a lot of fear. Brandi is starting to take the dog out on short walks in the evening; **Cookie** was excited about the change in scenery and may be starting training classes soon. Happy new life, **Cookie**!



**23-053 Storm** is a sweet and friendly 4½-month-old female Goldendoodle. The owner had **Storm** for a week and discovered that her two-resident female chihuahuas were being mean and didn't want anything to do with her. After tripping over **Storm** twice, the owner found that her puppy energy was too much for her to handle. Since the breeder wouldn't take **Storm** back,

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she was surrendered to AGR for rehoming. Storm received the

standard vetting with vaccines and tests for valley fever and heartworm. She was given medication for a swollen ankle before going to her foster home with Diane and Todd in Phoenix. Her foster parents described Storm as super sweet, loving, and snuggly. She loved playing with their resident dogs but also played nicely by herself with her toys. After spending three weeks with her fosters, Storm moved into her new home with Sharon and Mike in Phoenix. Storm has continued seeing the vet for her ankle, which keeps swelling and causes her to limp. The vet also discovered that she has right hip dysplasia so is currently being treated with injections. Sharon and Mike are taking very good care of Storm with her ankle and hip issues and are very happy that she is a part of their family. They renamed her Stella. Sharon describes life as it is now: Stella is now a 70-pound, 10-month-old puppy. She definitely keeps us on our toes! We are so grateful to AGR for bringing Stella into our family. She is so smart and playful. Stella loves to play with toys, especially her squeaky pig, and she will climb right up in my lap if I let her! She is a very lovable dog, so even though she has her challenges (all common puppy issues, like chewing on things, and jumping/nipping when excited), we are happy to have her.

**23-054 Ivory** is a 1-year-old notspayed female Goldendoodle. The owner obtained **Ivory** from a friend in Texas and had a transport company bring her to Arizona. After having her for about 4 months, she realized she couldn't deal with **Ivory's** high energy level. The owner described **Ivory** as a sweet, friendly, and joyful dog that deserves a family who has pa-

She lived in an apartment and was surrendered because her owner recently had knee surgery and was unable to give her the attention and exercise she needs. She presents herself as shy when meeting new people but quickly warms up and is loving. Allisson needed our standard vet work with vaccines, tests for valley fever and heartworm, a spay, and removal of rear dew claws. Placement contacted



three families before they found fosters Teri and Jeff in Phoenix. After being transported to their house, Allisson met each of their 5 resident dogs with much enthusiasm. Once in the backyard, they proceeded to run and play. When she met their cat Autumn, Allisson was totally enamored with her. Living with Teri and Jeff for the first 10 days, Allisson made great strides with her housetraining and settled into a routine. After she had been spayed and returned home from the vet, Allisson's foster dad made the following comment: Well, we learned something today. We learned that we can't foster any dogs because they always stay! The pack missed her so much! Allisson won the hearts of her fosters and is being adopted by them! Teri sent us this message: We initially wanted just to foster Allisson, as this sweet girl came into Rescue but had not yet found her forever home. The plan was not to keep her, but plans change, and it seems in our home dogs that come in do not go out. Allisson immediately bonded with our girl Mila, - it was truly love at first sight for both. It took her a few days to learn to socialize with the rest of our pack of five, but once that happened we knew she was going to stay. She is a true love bug and has turned into a momma's girl. Draco has been with Dumbledore since he was 8 weeks old. Draco was a Pandemic puppy and did not socialize with other dogs besides his brother. He is standoffish with other dogs and will go crazy barking at another dog. So, the owner solved the problem by not taking him around other dogs. He takes a while to warm up to humans but when he does, he is a snuggle bug. Dumbledore is a very friendly, social boy. Both boys are big - weighing 100 pounds each. We placed them with Carole and Gregory in San Tan Valley. They have had pairs of Goldens several times but currently had no pets. They were thrilled to receive these two beautiful boys. The owner had lived in a small studio apartment, so when the boys were transported to their new home, they reveled in running around the big yard. Neither seemed interested in the pool, but Greg vowed he would get both

One quirky thing about Draco that the transporters noticed: he is definitely attracted to light and shadow movement - Deb could not get a really good photo of him outside because her phone kept picking up light spots and showing them on the ground – he was basically transfixed by the moving lights. Carole and Gregory have shortened the names to **Dumble** and **Dre** and just love their boys.

23-059 Kronos (at right) age 5, and 23-060 Rhea (below), age 4, were surrendered as



a pair of very bonded purebred Goldens. Their owner was moving across country from California to the East Coast with three dogs and two kids when her RV broke down. She



could not find a place to stay that would accept three dogs. Despite her acknowledging that she

could no longer care for the dogs, it was a very emotional surrender. She described Kronos as friendly, sweet and a big goofball, who will shred stuffed toys, even the tough ones. Kronos loves to swim, jump on a trampoline and run. Kronos is more independent than Rhea -- she would be lost without him. Rhea is a Velcro dog. She is friendly, sweet and loves people. She loves small dog toys. She is not a fan of swimming. Favorite treat for Rhea is tomatoes; Kronos loves raw broccoli. The owner was kind enough to order and have sent to us a special bowl called a Slopper Stopper for Kronos and a couple of small toys for Rhea. Connie met the owner in front of her sister's home and then drove the pair to Academy West Animal Hospital. After vetting at Academy West, she drove them to Linda and Ron in Cave Creek. They have a large grassy back yard and a small play pool, which Kronos immediately jumped into. The dogs settled in well and have enjoyed running and playing in the big yard. They met the resident cat with no issues, just curiosity. Ron said he loves his doggies! He laughed and said he didn't realize that such big pups could be lap dogs. Not particularly a fan of Klingons, he has renamed Kronos (the name of the Klingons' home world) Rusty and kept Rhea's name.

Here is what Ron and Linda had to say about the pair: **Rusty** and **Rhea** have settled into their new brother-and-sister home perfectly! Both dogs were the highlights of the Christmas party with our guests. **Rusty** is a gentleman through and through. He never takes **Rhea's** treats even if he finishes before her and she sets hers down. When playing, if **Rhea** gets hold of the ball, he will simply stand near her until she is finished rolling around on it in the back yard. Sometimes we give them apples and peanut butter treats and he always waits for her to get hers first. That boy will chase a ball and drop it back in our laps for hours if our arms hold out that long. As we're out on long walks, he keeps an eye on her so she is safe. He seems to be unaware of his size because he loves to roll over in our laps.

**Rhea**, on the other hand, is a lady through and through. When she gets a treat, she'll walk around the house for five minutes with it in her mouth before eating it. She likes to sit on the end of the couch with her paws crossed and hanging over the side. After the recent fireworks on New Year's, she has really come out of her shell. I think she knows for sure now that she is safe in her new home. She likes to run around in circles outside. While she is getting more assertive with grabbing the ball, unlike **Rusty** who brings it back, **Rhea** is more interested in keep-away. As a big brother, **Rusty** tolerates this because he knows he'll get it back soon enough.

**23-061 Jazz** is a 7-month-old not neutered male Goldendoodle. His coloring is tan and brown. He is high energy, will chew anything he can get his mouth on, loves to play and get attention. Since he had not been around other dogs or cats, we placed him with Grace and Keith, a retired couple in Wickenburg who had no other pets. Grace has worked with a trainer before



and had already made contact about **Jazz**. After just about a week, Grace said: **Jazz** has settled in nicely. He slept in the dog bed in the bedroom. He has not attempted to chew anything except for the many chew toys that I have provided. He has met many of the neighbors and is very friendly to everyone. They have commented on how calm he is. He has been eating well. I left him with Keith while I ran errands. They bonded, but **Jazz** has definitely attached himself to me. That's good, since Keith is an avid golfer and not often at home during the day. By the time you read about **Jazz**, he will have been neutered. Grace loves her new companion, **Jazz**.

**23-062** Molly was already spayed when she came to us at age three. She is a Goldendoodle. Our intake report states that she is good with dogs her size, though she is a toy hoarder not crazy about sharing. She lives with two cats that love her. She loves to play fetch and go for walks. Even walks on a treadmill. Due to



an unforeseen family medical issue, the owners are moving to Carolina to help. The home has too much commotion going on with other dogs and small children to be a good home for **Molly**. Sometimes owners just do not tell us the whole story about a dog. In this case, when we first placed **Molly** in a home with another dog, we learned she does NOT get along

with at least some other dogs, and she did not like this one! We also found out she is a resource-guarder and does not like to share toys. So, we found a no-other-dog home for her with Andrea and Darrin in Mesa. She is happy; they are happy. They renamed her **Nava**, which means "lovely" in Hebrew. Darrin commented: *She is amazing* – *so well-behaved and obedient! She walks well on leash. Not at all bothered by the storm, has shown no interest in our pool and only mild interest in the house cats* (she previously lived with 2 cats). They paid *AGR* a very nice compliment: *We are so thankful for your whole organization. You have all been fantastic to work with*!

**23-063 Winnie** is a 2-year-old unaltered female purebred Golden girl. The surrendering owner took her from another family that was not giving her the care she needed. This owner, with a young child and one on the way, knew she could not keep **Winnie** but wanted to help find her a good home. In-laws (where the dog was staying) wanted to keep her but their three older cats



would not come out of the bedroom. Not fair to them. So, she called *AGR*. We had all her vaccines updated and were about to get her spayed but she went into heat, so the surgery had to wait a month. She came in with a wound on her leg, which has been treated, and an addendum issued for more vetting for three months, if needed. The resident dog, **Lola**, finally seems to have come to terms with having **Winnie** around – she barked and barked at first. The family related: *Winnie is everything we wanted. She is so chill!* Lola is still adjusting, but they both walk around following us. We took **Winnie** out for a short walk today -- she loved it. She seems very comfortable with us.

**23-064** Charlie is a stunning 4-yearold purebred Golden. One story we got was that he was from a military family that was moving and couldn't take him. However, the transporter got a different story about the husband being a disabled vet and the family was currently living with relatives. It took a week or so with Marty and Don in



Cave Creek before **Charlie** relaxed and indicated he was at home with them. They reported that he loves balls and to snuggle with Don on the couch. He still tries to jump up on people and seems to have issues with other dogs, especially if on a walk. The family intends to enroll him at *Partners Dog Training School* to get help with some behavior modification. They both love him very much.

23-065 June and 23-066 Johnny, 5-month-old Golden/Lab mixes,



were surrendered together. The owner had adopted **June** and her brother **Johnny** from a private owner and had them for  $2\frac{1}{2}$ months. Both dogs were chewing everything from furniture to anything they

could get in their mouths. The wife works full time, the husband is working more hours and they do not have time to train the puppies. **June** was described as reserved, sweet, passive and a princess; **Johnny** as active, playful, affectionate, and cuddlier than **June**. Both dogs were quite unsocialized, though, acting very frightened and shy when picked up for transport. They did not appear to be especially bonded, so we adopted them to different families.

June had a fairly easy time adjusting because her new family, Rebbekka and Dave in Gilbert, had an old dog, Emma, who has became best friends with June. Rebbekka reported that June has settled down some, although she still has a lot of puppy energy. *She is so much fun!* 



Johnny spent some time with one of our foster families before he was placed with a couple in Phoenix. They changed his name to **Waylon** and called him a "Hoot." However, after they officially adopted him, the behaviors that were amusing at first no longer were, so they asked to return him to *AGR*. We're sure you will read about his new forever home in the next issue.



**23-067 Matilda** is a 12-week-old female Goldendoodle. The owner is a breeder who has surrendered a dog to us before. She recently had a litter of 8 puppies and has found it difficult to sell these puppies – **Matilda** was the last one of this litter – and the owner has another pregnant 2-year-old. **Matilda** is described as very sweet, easy going and happy. As they have numerous times, Doodle-lovers Diane and Todd in Phoenix offered to foster Matilda. Their older resident Doodle, Sedona, who has been aloof to other Goldendoodles they've fostered, basically adopted this puppy, so she had to stay. The other resident Doodle, **Bentley**, also loves the puppy. Puppy Madie is now in doggy Heaven with one Doodle companion who plays with her all the time, and another who mothers her. Diane related: Madie came to us as foster #12 ... we had zero intentions of adopting another dog! But she bonded almost immediately with both our other Doodles. **Bentley** and **Madie** run and play and wrestle and chase but so kindly and gently. Sedona was completely disgusted with the other fosters and literally would just leave the room! But she and Madie cuddle and snuggle and sleep together all the time – so stinking adorable! We literally have not had one squabble, growl or issue between them. Bentley and Sedona chose Madie ... so now there are three!

**23-070** Nora is a 3-year-old spayed female Goldendoodle, who favors the Golden parent in appearance. She has a history of eating rocks and had to have surgery in November 2022 for a blockage. On Monday September 4, 2023, she started having the same symptoms as in 2022 – the owners took her to the ER



and the x-ray showed a blockage, which they assumed was a rock. With three kids under age 5 and the youngest in the NICU, the owners could not afford another surgery. Nora is a friendly, sweet, patient dog. She is good with kids, dogs (lived with a 2-year-old Labradoodle), and cats (lived with 2 cats) which she is curious about and likes to chase but never catches. She will chase every bird that flies into the yard but so far has not caught any. If Nora smells feathers, she will tear anything apart to get to the feathers (the owners found out their couch was stuffed with feathers when they came home and found she had destroyed the couch and feathers were everywhere). Nora is now enjoying life with Michele, Mark, their two resident dogs, Callan and Cassie, and their cat. All but the cat met her when her foster, Connie, brought her to Dine Out With The Dogs in October. The family all fell in love with Nora, submitted their application right away, and Connie did their home evaluation. Connie has been living with a rock-eater, Danny, for three years, so she gave them many tips on how to handle a dog like that - she especially warned them that even with an all-grass yard, rocks will work their way up to the surface, so they will need to do rock-patrol in the yard every few days or put a muzzle or OutFox mesh hood on the dog when she goes out to do her business. We are sure they will be diligent with Dora (her new name) and that she will have a long, happy life with them.

**23-071 Rufus** is a 10-or-12-year-old un-neutered Golden Retriever (owner wasn't sure of his age). The surrendering owner became



the guardian of **Rufus** when her mother passed away and no one could take him. Since she already had 4 dogs and 4 cats, she was unable to keep him. **Rufus** lived in an apartment all his life, so living in her house was an adjustment. **Rufus** knows the commands "sit" and "speak". He is described as goofy, friendly and very lovable. Adam loves the old dogs (has **14-013 Rhys**, now 11, and **21-051** 

Charley, now 12), so when Rufus became available, he jumped at the chance to add a third senior dog to his household in Peoria. Rufus is now up-to-date on all his vaccines, has been neutered and had a small mast cell tumor removed when we had a dental done. Surgeon got clean margins, so there are no cancer worries going forward. Adam commented: Rufus came to me after the passing of his previous owner. Upon first meeting this handsome boy, I questioned, "Are we sure he's a senior Golden"? He has grey on his face but is otherwise energetic, playful and very curious. I thought he might be experiencing grief, but I didn't see evidence of it. He had some house rules to learn but otherwise is an absolutely perfect boy. I wasn't aggressive on correcting his minor behaviors – knowing my other Goldens were teaching by example – so **Rufus** is still acclimating to his new home. A few weeks after this new addition, a sudden and unexpected departure - my partner died suddenly. I was devastated. Rufus, Charley and Rhys – my Golden heroes – were constantly by my side. Charley and Rhys were grieving my partner's passing also – they loved him deeply – but we came together as a family and supported each other. Rufus quickly moved into the core of my family – all of us understand loss and healing. We are growing together. So grateful to have Rhys and Charlie and now Rufus. I love my family.



**23-073 Indi** is a 3-year-old female Goldendoodle; she was not spayed. Her owner was evicted and is living in the car. **Indi** has never bitten but will growl and pull at large dogs. She will bark at strangers, then will warm up. She is playful, silly, loveable and loves attention. After vetting at *Academy West Animal Hospital*, she was placed as a foster with Howard and Gail in Scott-

sdale. Before the end of the 3-week "settling in" period we allow a foster family, they had decided to adopt her. The family commented that whoever had her before did a great job with her and she is very obedient. They demonstrated how she sat and stayed upon command. They feel very lucky to have gotten her. She is the lucky one, having gone from living in a car to a loving family with a yard. This was a great placement. She was finalized with an addendum for her spay because at the time of adoption she had just gone into heat – she was finally spayed in January 2024. **23-077 Bodhi** is a 15-month-old Goldendoodle. He was neutered and he has more of the Golden hair and does shed some. He has a sensitive stomach but with Purina Pro Plan for adult dogs he does not have any problems. He had been around dogs and was friendly with all the dogs he had met. The owner just moved to Arizona; **Bodhi** had not settled in and was barking a lot which the neighbors did not appreci-



ate. The owner was told to stop the barking or move. In addition, her boss said clients were complaining about the barking when she was on business calls so told her to get rid of the dog or lose her job. After some vetting, **Bodhi** was placed with Gina and Greg in Tucson; they have adopted from us before (**13-015 Dusty**, who had passed away). They came all the way to Glendale to pick up **Bodhi**. Connie spoke to them after they arrived back home and they said he goes out to do his business, loves toys, can reach the counter tops but they keep them clean. **Bodhi** explored and was happy for his big back yard. They also ordered food on the way down and family picked it up for them, so **Bodhi** is ready to eat. He's allowed on the furniture and already was up on the sofa. They are very happy with him even though they weren't expecting that big a boy. A month later they had changed his name to **Hogan** and were ready to adopt him.

## (next six dogs)

In mid-October, 2023, we were contacted by a Golden Retriever breeder in southern California who needed to downsize her business. Over the last 6 years, she had surrendered several dogs to AGR. Connie McCabe drove Nick's Expedition with 3 X-large crates and Fred Prose drove the Orwigs' mini-van with 2 X-large crates and a puppy crate; Christine Spiel went along for the ride and to help with the dogs. They left Sunday morning to pick up what we had been told would be 5 adult male Goldens and 3 puppy Goldens. They made good time going to the breeder's home in under 7 hours with a lunch stop and stayed overnight in a motel (thanks to all of the transporters for covering their trip expenses). FYI, do NOT complain about Arizona gas prices - on the Arizona side in Quartzsite, gas was \$3.89/gallon, but just down the road to Blythe in California it was \$5.89/gallon! They arrived at the breeder's by 8:30 AM on Monday. There were only three adult male dogs and two puppies scheduled to go. Right before the transport team got there, the breeder decided to send along the female littermate to the male puppy. Those were the only two without names, so Connie named them Ken and Barbie. They then had to wait while Barbie's information was collected into a folder. In the meantime, they tried to get pictures, but the dogs were all very frightened and not in the mood for photos. They were finally able to get the dogs loaded and on the road a little after 10 AM, which was really pushing it to get to Academy West

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Animal Hospital in Glendale before 5 PM. In fact, with only one quick pit stop for a restroom and another for gas and drive-thru food, plus two more for barf duty (thank you, Chris) they rolled in to AW at 4:30 PM and got the dogs unloaded – right on schedule. Speed limits – what are those? All but one of the dogs were quite young, ranging in age from 5-month-old Ruby to 7-month-olds Ken and Barbie, 18-month-old Elliot, 22-month-old Angus, and 7½-year-old Danny. All are really good-looking purebred Goldens. All the dogs needed all their shots. The three oldest dogs were tested for heartworm and valley fever. None of the six was sterilized before arriving in Arizona. Angus and Elliot were neutered in late October, Danny in November. The other three are too young for this surgery, so we issued an addendum with the adoption finalization to cover the cost when the dogs are about a year old.

**23-078 Ruby** was labeled by the breeder as "sweet, cuddly, responsive, exceptionally social, trains easy, house trained, knows "off," and "sit". This adorable puppy, now known as **Lovie**, was placed with Tracy and Gary in Scottsdale. When transported to their home, **Ruby** had a great time running and playing on the turf (she had been



confined to a kennel at the breeder's facility) and couldn't make up her mind which human to visit, as she kept going back and forth between them. Just a few days later, they brought **Lovie** in costume to *Dine Out With The Dogs* (see page 32). We hope to see them at many more of our events.



23-079 Angus was placed with Louise and John in Phoenix. At their home, Angus has two female Golden companions, Violet and Rose, the latter of which is an AGR adoptee. Louise reported: Angus is a perfect fit with our other two Goldens. They love him. He is smaller than Violet and Rose and they like that. Only one funny story, or hiccup, was when we went out to din-

ner and came home to find he had chewed up a corner of the sheet that we keep on our bed to protect the covers. We saw no evidence in the house but to be safe we took him to the emergency vet the next day. **Angus** checked out OK, no bloat or blockage. He ended up throwing it up a day later. Other than that he is perfect. When I go to work, all three dogs are left in the bedroom, and **Angus** is in a large x-pen. We kept his name and are very happy with him.

**23-080 Elliot** was placed with Debbie and her two resident Goldens, **Dillon** and **Levi**, in Surprise. She was not looking to adopt a third dog, but after one night of fostering, she changed his name to

Tyler, and just shortly after that she knew he would never be going to any other home. He had just been neutered before he was transported to her, so although all the dogs were introduced, she did not allow actual play among them for at least a week. Debbie related: *Tyler is doing very well, very calm and loving, thinks he is a lap dog; loves to play with Levi especially, rides well in the car, and did* 



VERY well at AGR gift-wrapping on 12/15 and 12/16. This boy is just a total love! He has a very unusual bark which sounds like a squeaker toy, and he pretty much ignores *Levi's* "trash talk."



23-081 Danny, the oldest of the California dog group, was placed with Katie in Scottsdale. She has two resident dogs, Bacon and Basil. Transporter Connie reported: Once at his new home, Danny was very curious and ran around the yard sniffing and peeing on everything. they even played a little. He pretty much ignored the little dog. Things were pretty hectic, as they were getting ready for a Halloween party that night. She is changing his name to **Butter**. **Bacon** is especially happy to have **Butter** as a new companion at home.

**23-082 Ken** was fostered by Fred and Jill for about a month. They really enjoyed fostering him but decided that with three resident Goldens, four is more than they want. **Ken** was not happy to go – he clearly knew something was up. Once at his new home with Heather in Phoenix, he immediately shifted into fourth gear and returned to his happy-go-lucky self. He



and resident dog **Porter** commenced playing and running around. Heather was cautioned many times about **Ken** picking up the stones and rocks. She assured Connie she would always be with him outside. Connie showed her the OutFox Field Guard<sup>®</sup> and some very nice mesh muzzles available from *Amazon*. When they went back in the house, he really became crazy and tore around the sofa, grabbing pillows and shaking them. As soon as Heather got one away, he grabbed another. Then there was the blanket! Connie was laughing so hard at the Keystone Cops comedy, she couldn't get pictures. They had to put him in the crate to proceed with the paperwork. He pretty much barked the whole time. Connie suggested that she move his crate next to her bed at night, as Fred had said he did not bark if the crate was by the bed. Heather

was uncomfortable with that suggestion and verified the next day that she left the crate in the other room – he barked for "only" 30 minutes before going to sleep. Connie emphasized no collar in the crate and suggested giving him a frozen Kong. Heather asked about training and a *Partners* group class was recommended. He is very active and is pretty strong-willed! **Porter** was eager to play and is a pretty active boy, too, for his age. **Ken** currently has an undescended testicle (which might come down where it belongs by the time he is old enough to be neutered). His adopter is very happy to have him and so is his new buddy, **Porter**.



**23-083 Barbie** was a last-minute, "take this one, too" decision by the breeder. She is a 7-month-old puppy whirlwind. When she was delivered to Faith and Deryl in Casa Grande, the resident dog, a 19-month-old Golden named **Betsy**, came out to greet her and there was an instant connection. The other resident dog, a 7-year-old Husky (**Beau**) did not show much in-

terest in **Barbie**, although now that she has been with the family for a while he is more active. The family was warned that Barbie might try to eat rocks in the back yard, but they assured us they would always go out with her and watch her. She and Betsy have become best friends and play a lot, which helps Barbie get rid of some of that "wild child" energy. Faith sent us this update a few days later: We have changed her name to Maisey. She is doing well. She acts like she has lived with us forever. She's very comfortable and gets along with the other two, and the cat has even accepted her. She has gone in the bedtime kennel easily the past few nights. She is in our room with the other two so she's able to see all of us and sleeps soundly all night. I have tried to get still pictures of them together but I think they all know what I'm doing and start playing. We are working on her eating and drinking like there is no tomorrow – the puzzle bowl and no-drip water dish have helped. She did figure out how to get the water bowl dismantled so she can "swim" in it with her face, so I am working on getting her to leave it. She seems to be very happy and healthy, and we are pleased to have her. About 6 weeks later, Joni talked with Faith about this little girl. Faith laughed and said they love her to pieces and she is a Hot Mess - has chewed numerous holes in their walls. Said she is like a stud finder, everywhere she chews is a stud. Maisey has brought them numerous nails, big rocks, chews their Sage bush and leaves the lower branches lying in the yard. She likes to dig holes in the yard too. Maisey was finalized with an addendum for her spay when she reaches 1 year of age.

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**23-087 Flash** is an 11-week-old male Golden Retriever, who was taken from a breeder situation in Flagstaff. The owner already had 3 dogs so could not keep him. He is just a puppy so not much is



known about him. He was reported to be calm, friendly, good with other dogs and already knew "sit". He was fostered by Rebecca and Dustin in Phoenix; they were charged with observing him and updating his personality profile. His chosen family, Elyce and Michael, live in Tucson and were kind enough to meet our transporter in Marana. **Flash** is a pretty typical

Golden puppy – likes to eat things he shouldn't, like rocks, so they added turf and are keeping a close eye on him when he is out playing in their yard. They said: *We're in this with him for life, no matter what. Yup, every day is a new experience...imagine that?* We issued an adoption addendum which will cover his neutering when he is about a year of age.

**23-089 Honey Bear** is a 6-year-old spayed female Golden Retriever. The owner has a 1-year-old and a 2-week-old baby. They also have a 10-year-old Lab that **Honey Bear** got along with fine. They contacted *AGR* about 3 months ago, and each time transport was arranged they changed their mind. Now they have surrendered as they are overwhelmed with the new



baby and some financial issues. **Honey Bear** is sweet, easy going, relaxed, but at times she can get dopey. She gets anxious if around more than two dogs at once. To determine how **Honey Bear** would do with a strange dog, we placed her with a family that was fostering another one of our dogs. She was a little apprehensive at first but was much better after a few days. No adoption addendum was issued because the adopters offered to cover her valley fever meds and retest. They changed her name to **Daisy** and are very happy adding her to the family.

23-090 Guero was originally a street dog in Guadalajara, Mexico. He was taken to the *Angeles del Valle* shelter there and advertised on the Internet. A contact in *Rescue A Golden of Arizona* (*RAG*) alerted us about this little Golden mix. *RAG* had arranged to have a purebred Golden transported here from Mexico and offered to bring *Guero* along. He was vetted in Mexi-



co, but because Maricopa County will not accept out-of-country vaccines, we had to have those redone. Cute and friendly with everyone is how this little 1-year-old, 16-lb boy has been described. Connie and Nick fostered him for a few days and he turned out to be one of their favorite fosters. He was placed with Brandi in Cave Creek; she recently adopted **23-052 Millie** (now **Cookie** –

see her story on page 15) from us and has some cats, so **Guero**, whom she renamed **Queso**, will have several animal companions. Connie commented: We are really going to miss this little guy. He was quite happy to be at Brandi's home – he and **Cookie** get along wonderfully. He saw the cats, though, and was a pain trying to catch them. Brandi is not worried; she has a great set-up and the cats will be safe. Brandi is a great mom and we couldn't ask for a better adopter. Update from Brandi: He is calming down around the cats finally! It's been so much fun. **Cookie** and **Queso** are getting along very well and love playing together. It's been pretty much non-stop. Once he shuts off for the day, he's a total love bug and curls up right on my lap.



**23-092 Bruno** is a one-year-old goldcolored Goldendoodle. He was found as a stray, but he was micro-chipped so the owner was located. The owner said he did not want the dog as he was getting deployed and wrote a note saying he was giving him to the finder. Finder could not keep him but was worried about his safety so took him but needed to surrender. She bought him a crate,

toys, food and had the vet give him shots and did a heartworm test. She had him just a couple days so does not know much about him except he is a friendly, peaceful, scared dog. He is scared to get in a car and will flatten himself to the ground but rides well once in the car. He also seems scared to be left alone and will cry if he doesn't see his human. He will see his new humans. Jamie and Bill in Wittmann, a lot, as they are both retired. At their home, Bruno, who has been renamed Theo, will have a menagerie for companionship: a 12<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>-year-old Labradoodle female, a 9-year-old Labradoodle male, 4 indoor cats, an African Grey Parrot, a horse and 3 goats! The couple became acquainted with AGR when their daughter's family fostered Ivy, who had 6 puppies. Jamie started him in obedience lessons within a couple days of his arrival. She reported: He is doing better with sit, down, and stay, but still really pulls on the leash – will get better I'm sure. Getting better with the kitties, too. Not doing bad for only 4 days with us, but is a little too rough for the older dogs. He loves toys and goes out to visit the livestock. He self-exercises in the big back area. Runs laps round and round then comes in and takes a nap wherever I am, which is right here as I write this.



**23-093** Lee Lou is a 9-month-old spayed female mostly-Golden mix, a beautiful red color. Her owner had been out of work for 8 months when he got a job offer in Oklahoma that would necessitate a lot of travel. Lee Lou has typical puppy energy, so he knew it would be in her best interest to be with a family that could exercise her.

She needed vaccine updates and tests for valley fever and heartworm. The right family makes all the difference, and Lee Lou was placed with the best possible family – a young, energetic couple, Haley and Kyle in Mesa. They have the time and interest in getting her properly trained. In addition to her humans being home a lot, Lee Lou now has the companionship of an elderly little Yorkie. The couple renamed her Penny and recently told us: Penny is the sweetest and goofiest dog we have ever met. She has never-ending energy and is so playful and loving. Our 13-year-old Yorkie, Bentley, has been so sad since his brother passed, and since getting Penny, he doesn't cry when we leave and you can tell he loves having Penny's company. Penny has filled a big hole in our hearts and we couldn't be more thankful she is now a part of our family.

**23-094 Chase**, a purebred Golden, was one year old in October 2022. He was originally surrendered to *The Fetch Foundation* that trains dogs for disabled police, firefighters, etc. as the family's son was allergic. After assessing **Chase**, it was determined he just did not have the focus or personality to be a service dog. He is rambunctious, playful, strong, and goofy. He has been updated on all



vaccines and was neutered on 11/21/2023. After transporting **Chase** to Chelsea in Scottsdale, Connie made these comments: **Chase** is a great dog! And lots of fun. There is a lot of **Danny** in him – full of mischief. The first thing he did was go through the box of toys and commence destroying. While Chelsea and I were going over paperwork at the table, he went into the next room and came back carrying a box of tissues and strutting proudly past us. It's a good thing she has a very minimalist setup! She seemed to like him a lot and is prepared for the job ahead. He is a smart boy, but she has a lot of experience and patience I think. She will have to get him past the mouthing stage – he is very bad about that. Chelsea has renamed the boy **Louie** and said he's doing well and adjusting to his new routine of hitting the trails each weekend! **Louie** is very loved!



**23-095 Rocky** is a 4-year-old neutered male Golden Doodle. He has an exuberant personality, is a happy boy and very affectionate. He loves to chase tennis balls. He needs a large yard to run in and an active family that hikes or runs and we found that for him with David and Linda in Sun City. They are working to curb **Rocky's** attentiongetting barking, and whatever they are

doing must be working, because David told us **Rocky** has settled down and he wouldn't give him up for anything! They are happy with this great boy! **Rocky** has an addendum for a valley fever retest and meds if needed.
