Edítor's Assístant's Note



My mom, the Editor, calls me a treasure and tells me that I'm worth more than my weight in gold – Aunt Connie figures that's almost 2 million dollars (read her column on page 6), but Mom says I'm really priceless! I know I'm a lucky dog, as I had heartworm when I was rescued by *AGR*. They had me treated for that awful disease and then placed me in my

current home to rehabilitate. After a month in isolation, I found <u>my</u> treasure – a great house to live in, three Golden companions, and love, love, love, even when I do something I shouldn't. Mom yells at me, but then she hugs me and says, "I know you didn't mean to do that, just don't do it again." Somehow the latter part of that message hasn't quite sunk in yet, especially if I see or smell something on the counter that I want. It can be a toy, some food, or just something that looks or smells interesting. So, up I go. "MuFASA – GET OFF!" is what I hear.

By now, I know what "off" means. I also know what "down" means, and it doesn't mean "off" even if I'm up on something I shouldn't be on. "Down" means to lie down on the floor or on the sofa or on the bed or in the car; "off means to get off whatever I'm on – the counter, the sofa, the bed, the window sill, a person. When Mom began to teach me not to jump up on people when they came into the house, she clipped a really short leash (called a traffic lead) to my collar and if I tried to jump up, she vanked me down and said, "No, OFF!" Because Mom does not use "down" to mean "off", I know exactly what she wants me to do, not that I always do it, but I am getting better. I now know that I have to sit in the hallway until the visitor gets all the way into the house and closes the front door. I'm still learning that I should just greet them politely after that and not jump up on them, but it's way too much fun to jump up - I like to look visitors in the eye and watch their funny reaction when I put my paws on their shoulders and try to slather their face with kisses.

Remember in the last issue I told you that Mom swore she was going to teach me to pick up all my toys and put them in the toy bin? I am learning to do this! Mom walks me over to a toy and says, "Fasa, get the toy." When I pick it up, she gets real excited and tells me I'm a good boy. Then she walks with me over to the toy bin and says, "Put it away." When I drop the toy into the bin, wow that really gets an excited reaction from her – sometimes she even gives me a treat to get me to let go of the toy, but only if it falls into the bin and not onto the floor next to the bin. My aim is getting better and better – I like those treats!

There was no cost or obligation to AGR for setting up our charity wine store. The amount of funds raised is based solely on our and our supporters' efforts to promote our charity wines. **Benefit Wines** has been wonderful

have sent us free marketing and support materials including suggestions for emails, banner ads, press releases and graphics to assist in marketing the wines. In addition, *Benefit Wines* has provided a secure, customized website URL and storefront with our organization's specific information and message. What is even better is that *Benefit Wines* handles all of the order processing,

product fulfillment and customer service, providing a completely stress-free fundraising tool.

Our fabulous graphic artist, Connie McCabe, designed unique pawshaped labels. In January, we invited AGR members who had adopted an AGR dog to sponsor their dog's photo on a wine label, similar to what we do for the centerfold of our calendar. At \$50 per photo, the 24 "paw-pad photos" have already raised \$1200! The labels make the bottles collector's items, as this will be the only time these particular 24 dogs are featured on the label – next year, we will have a different set of 24. Even if your dog is not among those shown on these labels, if you are a wine drinker, you will want to purchase at least one bottle because the labels are so attractive!

AGR will receive a donation from *Benefit Wines* for every purchase of our private label wines. The wines featured in this program include fine certified organic and vegan-friendly varietals imported from LaFortuna Vineyards in Lontue Valley, Chile (www.lafortuna.cl). The six wines offered as part of this all-inclusive program include Chardonnay, Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot, Sauvignon Blanc, Malbec and Pinot Noir. Malbec is a red varietal that is produced primarily in Argentina and is becoming more popular in the US as wine drinkers discover it.

The cost to purchasers for one bottle is \$19.99, \$78.95 for a sampler four-pack, and \$117.95 for a collector's six-pack. You can order any or all of these wines by clicking on our website's *AGR*-emall shopping link and then scroll down until you see the wine bottles. You can order directly from our website! Please enjoy these wines and drink responsibly!

Wags and Woofs

Since our incorporation three years ago on March 11, 2009, we have heard every reason imaginable for wanting to get rid of a Golden Retriever or Golden mix. Although we must accept the reason, those of us "in the trenches" of this organization still cannot understand why a Golden owner would not move heaven and earth to keep their dog, regardless of what life presents them.

What keeps us going – sometimes beyond the point of what we ever dreamed we could tolerate – is the knowledge that the home we worked so hard to find for a particular dog is the best possible place for that dog to be, both for the dog and for the new family. Our success rate is admirable – less than 2% of the dogs we have adopted out have been returned to Rescue.

We receive anywhere from two to ten adoption applications a week. In any one week, we may bring in no dogs, or one, or maybe as many as five (rarely). Do the math. Not everyone who applies to adopt is going to get a dog from us, even if they pass through the approval process with flying colors. Our job is, always has been, and always will be to find the best possible family for a specific dog. Notice I did not say "find the best dog for a specific family." Our number one priority is the dog. No matter how much a particular family wants a particular dog, if, in the judgment of our Placement Manager (who spends an inordinate amount of time poring over adoption applications, home evaluations and dog histories), that is not the right family for that dog, then the dog will not be placed there.

Just because a family has had Goldens in the past does not mean they are the best family for a specific one of our rescues. True, we are only human and we do occasionally make mistakes, as sometimes our enthusiasm overshadows reality. For example, a family thinks they want a young dog, having forgotten just how much energy, attention and time raising a young dog properly takes. We place a young dog with that family because they are sure they are ready for one and know what to do. Then, a day or a week or two weeks later, the family calls us and says the dog is "too much" for them to handle. We will place another, older dog with such a family when an appropriate one comes into Rescue.

Some adopters spend too much time comparing their former dog with the one we place with them. This is not healthy either for the family or for the rescued dog. The rescued dog is going to have some adjustment issues no matter what the personality and history, and it will have some behavior patterns that are not like those

of someone's former dog. It will take time – longer for some dogs than for others – and patience on the part of the adopter for the dog to become part of the family. Just this morning (April 9th), I had an adopter say to me, "This dog is finally MY dog. Just in the last two weeks I've noticed changes in his behavior. He now greets me at the door, talks to me, sleeps on the bed with me, etc." This dog, an only dog in a single, retired person's home (so no competition for attention and affection), was adopted early last November!

The business of rescuing Goldens in Arizona is not inexpensive, and our adoption fees do not, on average, cover the cost of many dogs we rescue. Too many of our rescues are not spayed or neutered. Too many have valley fever and/or tick fever. Too many have hip or elbow dysplasia. Too many have severe ear or skin infections. Many are hypothyroid. Some have terrible allergies. One is blind. One had degenerative kidney disease. Some have had cancer. Some have been strays, filthy, matted and covered with ticks. Some have had huge cysts on their bodies. Some have been abused and cower at the sight of a baseball cap, a raised hand, a broomstick, or a rolled up newspaper. Some are afraid of thunder or other loud noises. Some have separation anxiety. Almost all have some kind of "baggage." All have been unwanted for the remaining part of their lives, whether they are 10 weeks old or 12 years old.

In order to raise money so we can rescue more Goldens and pay for whatever they need in the way of rehabilitation, we do many fundraisers. Our recent garage sale chaired by Beverly Ruth was truly a trash-to-treasures event! We made over \$3500 in two days! That will go a long way toward helping with the medical expenses of future rescued dogs. Thank you, Beverly, for your time and dedication. We have more fundraisers planned – please participate in some way when you can.

Our rescued dogs are treasures; our adopters are treasures – what a rich organization we have! Thank you for caring and for helping us help more of these wonderful dogs.

The Information Highway

AGR continues to grow in so many ways that it is a constant responsibility to keep up with everything. As of April 24th, we have done 45 intakes, which is by far more than the number of intakes that we had at this time last year. Our membership base continues to grow, and the way that we manage all of this information continues to grow and change every day.

In several of the previous newsletters, you have read that we have a database being programmed for us and that it should be available soon. Now, a year after I started in the position of Director of Information Management, we have finally switched over from many of our other numerous ways of storing data and have transferred over to the new database. We are in the process of training everyone who needs to access the database on how to use their portions of it; we are also requesting them to recommend changes that might be needed to the database. There are still some additions to be made which will enhance even more the usability of the database.

The website is also going through some changes. We are in the process of creating a new website with many new security enhancements and features. As the database and the new website evolve, they will be able to exchange data that will streamline many of the processes we now duplicate. Areas such as membership renewals, adoption applications and home evaluations will utilize the interchangeability of data between the two systems.

The AGR-eMall is operational and it includes the following items:

- *GoodSearch* is an Internet search engine powered by Yahoo that generates donations for *AGR* when you use it as your default search engine. In most cases *AGR* receives a penny per Internet search.
- GoodShop Shop online at GoodShop and a percentage of each purchase will be donated to Arizona Golden Rescue! More than 2,500 top stores are participating, including Target, Staples, Best Buy and more! You pay no more to shop online at the different stores, but by using our interface the stores pays AGR a percentage of the sale through GoodShop.
- *GoodCoupons* Part of the *GoodShop* shopping experience is the availability of coupons from the store that you shop in, which reduces the price that you have to pay for certain purchases.
- GoodDining You love to dine out. You may even do
 it several times a week. So, why not earn donations for *Arizona Golden Rescue* every time? As a member of *GoodDining*, you can earn donations by going to your
 choice of thousands of participating restaurants, bars and
 clubs, including many of your favorites. It's an easy-touse program that's totally discreet and allows members
 to earn donations coast-to-coast when they visit participating restaurants, bars and clubs.
- *GoodApp* (formerly known as *GoodToolbar*) is a toolbar for Internet Explorer and Firefox which combines all the above *Good Applications* into one toolbar making it simple to use. The toolbar includes *GoodSearch* and *GoodShop* with the addition of *GoodCoupons*; once you register *AGR* as your default location for donations, the toolbar will keep you informed as to the money that you have earned for searches and the amount *AGR* has raised through the program.

- Smart Betty We are very proud to say that we have partnered with one of the fastest growing social shopping companies anywhere, Smart Betty. Basically, each day you will be notified by email of different discounts from local merchants that you will be able to take advantage of – all you do is go online and purchase the voucher for the product or service and then redeem it at your convenience! The benefit to you is obvious: great deals on products and services that you already purchase! Another benefit is that Smart Betty understands the importance of charitable donations. So, for every dollar you spend purchasing Smart Betty vouchers, Smart Betty will give 10% of their earnings back to our organization.
- *Arizona Golden Rescue* Embroidered Clothing. Here, members can order their shirts, jackets, hats with the *AGR* logo on them and other articles to come online. Once you place your order you will be notified via email asking how you would like to pay for your order. You can use a credit card or online checking, or you can mail a check. You can pick up your merchandise at an *AGR* Event or you can have your order shipped.
- Benefit Wines Our newest adventure is described on page 3. Please check out the AGR-eMall page for the types of wines available. Because of the cost of shipping alcohol and the need for an adult signature, it is recommended for shipping savings to order multiple bottles. One way is to coordinate with a friend to order together. We are trying to put together an introductory way to have an order sent through AGR to a central shipping location. More details will follow with this option.

We are far from done trying to make our systems the most efficient possible and to make the shopping experience attractive to all. More information will come out in emails as we get it.

A little personal note that I would like to add: everything that we do, including all that I have mentioned here, is all for the dogs. They are all our treasures. I do a lot more than just the Director's position because I find it so rewarding to work for these dogs and the pleasure that it brings when we are able to improve their lives with great new homes. Try using the *AGR*-eMall, and please let your friends know about it also. You don't have to be a Golden Retriever owner or a dog owner at all. To new as well as long-standing members, please consider attending a Meet-and-Greet to meet other members and their dogs and to help spread the word that *AGR* is here. We have many locations now in both the East and West Valley areas and all are listed in the events calendar. Let all of our dogs become your "treasures," too! As I put on the bottom of all our Membership renewals... "For the love of our Goldens!"

Health and Safety

Bloat

Bloat is a very serious health risk for many dogs, yet many dog owners know very little about it. Research has shown that after cancer, it is the second leading killer of dogs, and Golden Retrievers are high on the list for being susceptible to this condition. Recently, one of our beloved rescues went to the Bridge as an unfortunate casualty of this condition.

The technical name for bloat is "Gastric Dilatation-Volvulus" ("GDV"). Bloating of the stomach is often related to swallowed air (although food and fluid can also be present). It usually happens when there's an abnormal accumulation of air, fluid, and/ or foam in the stomach ("gastric dilatation"). Stress can be a significant contributing factor also. Bloat can occur with or without the stomach twisting. As the stomach swells, it may rotate 90° to 360° , twisting between its attachments at the esophagus and at the upper intestine. The twisting stomach traps air, food, and water in the stomach. The bloated stomach obstructs veins in the abdomen, leading to low blood pressure, shock, and damage to internal organs. The combined effect can quickly kill a dog. Be prepared! Know in advance what you would do if your dog bloated.

Typical symptoms often include some of the following. Unfortunately, from the onset of the first symptoms there is very little time to get immediate medical attention. Best rule of thumb for this, and any other medical condition, is: Know your dog and know when it's not acting right.

- Attempts to vomit that are unsuccessful.
- Dog does not act like its usual self, a very early warning sign and the only sign that almost always occurs.
- Significant anxiety and restlessness.
- Hunched up appearance.
- Lack of normal gurgling and digestive sounds in the tummy.
- Bloated abdomen that may feel tight.
- Pale or off color gums.
- Excessive drooling.
- Coughing.
- Foamy mucus around the mouth.
- Unproductive efforts to pass stool.
- Pacing and whining.
- Heavy or rapid panting, or shallow breathing.
- Unable to stand, or collapses.
- Accelerated heartbeat.

If you believe your dog is experiencing bloat, please get your dog to a veterinarian immediately! Bloat can kill in less than an hour, so time is of the essence. Call your vet to alert them you're on your way with a suspected bloat case. Better to be safe than sorry!

Here is a partial list of things that you can do to reduce the risk of bloat developing in your dog:

- Avoid highly stressful situations or try to minimize stress as much as possible.
- Do not exercise for at least an hour or longer before and especially after eating.
- Discourage rapid eating if your dog "inhales" his or her food, there are specialized bowls that you can purchase that are compartmentalized to make it harder to consume food as quickly.
- Feed two or three meals a day versus just one.
- Allow access to fresh water at all times except for one hour before or after a meal.
- When switching dog food, do it gradually over a period of weeks is suggested.
- Do not feed dry food exclusively, but if you do, avoid foods containing fat as one of the first four ingredients, avoid foods that contain citric acid, and select a food that includes rendered meat meal with bone product among the first four ingredients.
- Do not promote rapid or excessive drinking.
- Use of an elevated food bowl has been debated by many well-known veterinarians some recommend only bowls that are elevated, and some say not to use them.

A couple tips which are always a good rule of thumb:

- If your regular vet doesn't have 24-hour emergency service, know which nearby vet you would use - keep the phone number handy.
- Always keep a product with simethicone on hand (Mylanta Gas (not regular Mylanta), Gas-X, etc.) in case your dog has gas. If you can reduce or slow the gas, you've probably bought yourself a little more time to get to a vet if your dog is bloating.

There are many very useful articles on the Internet with suggestions on how to help your dog avoid this condition or how to recognize this condition if it happens. Suggestions in this article were taken from http://www.globalspan.net/bloat.htm

To demonstrate just how fast our cash reserves can be depleted by vet costs, I direct your attention to the Total Assets as of April 2, 2012 in the box to the right. The figure looks great, doesn't it? Today, April 15th, only thirteen days after I prepared that table, our total assets are down to \$107,639.03, and we have an outstanding credit card balance (due to be paid on May 6, 2012, so it will be higher by then) of \$18,116.73.

Recently, we have dealt with three medically expensive dogs: 11-061 Maxx, who had his second hip surgery in February; 12-015 Abby, who had a huge diaphragmatic hernia that had to be repaired and then developed pancreatitis on top of the megaesophagus condition that manifested after her diaphragm was repaired and her liver, kidneys and intestines were pushed down into her abdomen where they belonged; and then 12-032 Rayce, who will need surgery to repair both of his bad hips.

All three of these dogs are young dogs, each only about a year old. We never had any question about doing whatever was necessary to ensure that each will have a long and pain-free life. But, we need your help with our fundraisers and with donations. Please, send what you can - if each of us AGR members gave just \$10 (\$20 for a couple), that would amount to almost \$4500! If you would like to specify your donation for a particular dog, you will be listed as a Diamond Donor for that dog in the next newsletter. Follow the Children

A few weeks ago, my husband and I started out on a long-planned visit to Washington, D.C. As awesome as it was, I'd never have gotten through the fast pace and the massive crowds if it hadn't been for my service/guide dog, Sophie. She worked tirelessly keeping me safe from falling, supporting me when I faltered, and leading me through the streets and subways where there was either too much light for my sensitive eyes to handle, or not enough of it. At the expense of her own comfort, Sophie worked harder than she ever had before in her life, or ever will again. As important and impressive as that was to me, it isn't exactly what I'm writing about.

As often as it happens, I never get used to it... people reaching out to pet and distract my dog. Adults, who should know better, were not only speaking to her but actually calling her to them! While Sophie did her best to ignore them, it was unrealistic to expect her not to respond to them at all. She's not a robot or a machine; even a service dog is exactly that... a dog. I lost count of how many times I was pulled off balance by someone distracting my dog.

Now, here's the amazing part. The children got it right! With the exception of only one little one out of several dozen, every single child asked first before petting Sophie! The message is actually getting out there. It's being taught in schools. Parents are teaching their children to ask before petting a working dog. And to perpetuate the message, I make an effort to thank each child for asking first.

So follow the children! Never call the dog to you, and ask before petting any variety of working dog. If the dog isn't actively engaged in a particular task, more than likely the answer will be yes, but certainly don't be offended or take it personally if it's no.

 \mathcal{M} agic \mathcal{M} oments... when a stray Golden Retriever or Golden mix is spotted in a shelter kennel and does a happy dance when taken out; when a neglected backyard dog is surrendered by its owner to a member of our Transport Team and is delivered to a foster family that shows the dog love, comfort, toys and good-quality food for, perhaps, the first time in the dog's life; and the most magical of all... when a rescued dog meets his or her forever family and we see the dog's excitement and the sparkle in the family's eyes. As rescuers, we are privileged to share in these Magic Moments. Below are stories of Arizona Golden Rescue's Magic Moments from January 16, 2012 through April 10, 2012. All adoptions finalized after April 10th will be in the next issue.



10-045 Ricky and his sister **10-046 Lucy** came in way back in May of 2010. At that time he was about 9, so he's almost 11 years old now. He and **Lucy**, while both sweet and spry, had multiple medical problems but that didn't stop them from participating in numerous parades and Meet-and-Greets – foster Mom Susan brought Drummond, so as a compromise I pick hard-to-spell Gaelic names. Aengus happened to be the name this skinny white Golden answered to, so Aengus it was. Unfortunately, Aengus didn't get along with my Goldens, so after a month in Yuma, he moved north to Phoenix where he spent some time with Raeann before meeting the love of his life, her brother-in-law Jeff. In December 2011, the *AGR* Board adopted the *Gentle Paws Hospice Adoption* program. This program allows the caring fosters who take chronically ill and/or very senior dogs (over age 12) or dogs with very special needs into their hearts and homes to adopt the dogs for \$1. As we do when any dog is in foster care, *AGR* will continue to pay for the dog's medical expenses until the dog passes away, unless the adopter can do so, but usually the medical expenses are prohibitive. *AGR's* primary goal is and always has been to keep the health and well being of the dog as our #1 priority. We want our old, physically-ailing dogs or dogs with other special needs to be cared for in the best possible way for their remaining days. We all feel that this program offers the best opportunity for this to happen. Each potential *Gentle Paws Hospice Adoption* will be decided on a case-by-case basis and must be approved by a Board vote.

a nationwide shortage of the medication used to treat heartworm disease, the vet decided to administer the two requisite doses in three treatments, one in February and two 24-hours apart a month later. She is very comfortable with the crate and goes in well with a cookie. We hope that we are keeping her quiet enough for good healing. She is very loving and has definitely become Ted's dog, for she looks for him immediately. After loving from him, she will come to me for a double dose. She is very wellmannered; I can't believe that she has touched little to nothing around the house. Someone trained her well and I hope that they sense that Maddy has found a good home. AGR knows she has!

12-012 Razzy is an adorable Golden-mix puppy found in the alley behind the *Razmataz Outlet* store in Glendale. *AGR* just happened to have a Meet-and-Greet at a nearby *PetSmart*. Deb and Teryl were there and went to the store to pick him up. That

All of the dogs who are rescued by AGR are tested for valley fever, as this disease, while treatable in its early stages, can be fatal if left untreated. It can cause severe lung disease, liver disease, and can spread to the bones and cause lameness. Once it has disseminated, or spread throughout the body, it is usually almost impossible to treat. Amika's valley fever titer was 1:64 which, while not low, was not exceedingly high. Her new parents, Diane and Michael in Phoenix, are giving her fluconazole twice a day, and the vet will recheck her titer in three months. She may need to continue on several more months of fluconazole, but that's a small price to pay for getting the valley fever under control. Amika is adjusting well to her new home despite having to take bad-tasting pills, and is enjoying long walks when it's cooler than 95 degrees outside.

12-018 Goldie, who is more red than gold, came back to us, as new dogs added as a result of a marriage in her original adopter's home were not getting along with her. She was more than happy to see us and meet a new family. We were able to place her with Richard and Nancy in Goodyear. They haven't had a dog in their home for over 20 years and were ready to add a canine



companion. Nancy had toys, bowls, and a new bed all ready for **Goldie** to pick and choose which ones she'd like. **Goldie** will also get to enjoy daily hikes with Nancy, so they'll get their exercise together!

12-022 Baby Oso (for Oh So cute) is one of the other color of dogs in the litter – he happens to be black with long hair. He also happens to be the smallest, weighing in at only 50 lbs, while his siblings are all 70 lbs or more. He was really not a fan of the drive up from Tucson and christened his crate with doggy vomit. Deb and Tony thought it was very kind of him to share his predigested

Diamonds in the Ruff By Deb Orwig

Diamonds in the Ruff are rescued dogs that require *AGR* to spend at least \$1000 on their health care. In our February issue, we featured one-year-old **11-079 Magic**, now called **Jackson**, and four-year-old **12-008 Summer**. **Jackson** has completely recovered from his bout with parvovirus and the complication of intussusception. **Summer** has healed from the surgery to remove a suspicious lump on her side. Thankfully it was a benign mass that the vet thought had developed as a result of trauma (perhaps being kicked).

Fortunately, there were only three dogs that had significant medical costs during the past quarter: **11-061 Maxx**, who had his second hip surgery; **12-015 Abby**, who had multiple problems resulting from a large diaphragmatic hernia; and **12-032 Rayce** (now **Luke**), who had his first hip surgery. At about \$8100 for his vet care, **Jackson** was one of our three most expensive dogs until



Abby, whose bill came to over **\$11,400**. Yes, yikes! Is it worth spending that much money on one dog? Absolutely and emphatically yes! **Abby** is only a year old. When her condition was discovered, she was already a well-loved member of a FWITA family and had already attended a couple of our events as an ambassadog. She had been panting excessively even after slight exercise, so we had a chest X-ray done. It revealed the hernia. What it didn't reveal and what Dr. Pullen at *AMSC* found when he opened her up was that most of the organs

that should have been in her abdomen - liver, kidneys and much of her intestine – were up in her chest cavity compressing her lungs. It was truly amazing that she could breathe at all with such a large hernia and such reduced lung capacity. Dr. Pullen managed to relocate all the organs to their proper place in the abdomen and repair the hernia. However, once that was done, he discovered that Abby had megaesophagus, which had been eclipsed until her chest cavity had been cleared out of everything that didn't belong in it. Dr. Pullen had to insert an esophageal feeding tube; Abby will have this in place for several more weeks. As if this wasn't enough, Abby developed pancreatitis due to the trauma she was experiencing. After everything settled down, she was discharged to her FWITAs. Fortunately, her human mom is a critical care nurse - who would have known her skills would be so important in helping with the rehabilitation of our little Abby? We do not have any major fundraisers on the schedule until the Bowl-a-Rama on August 4th, the funds raised from which will be dedicated to Abby. Please help us pay this large bill of hers by sending whatever you can. Thank you in advance for caring.

The following was written by David Jewett about his *AGR*-adopted puppy, **11-091 Matt**, now called **Keller** in honor of Helen Keller.

It is amazing that **Keller** is turning 6 months of age this week! It seems like only yesterday we brought him home. He was about $2\frac{1}{2}$ months old, weighed about ten pounds and fit nicely in our



arms. Now, it's not quite so easy to pick him up, although our laps remain his preferred place. His current weight is approaching 50 lbs and can it be far off that he looks us directly in the eye? His paw size suggests that larger is clearly in his future.

Keller's route to us was interesting at best. Having only recently decided it was time for our family to expand, we contacted *AGR* about rescue. We had been blessed with **Maggie** (a beautiful and loving German Wirehair) for 15 years. Following her passing, we were unsure if we would ever be ready for another dog. Clearly, something was missing in our home, however, and after approximately a year since her passing, we decided it was time to admit that we needed another dog. I was retiring at the end of December and my wife thought I needed companionship while she was at work. Sharla happens to work with Teri [Guilbault] who provided us with wonderful mentoring regarding rescue and *AGR*. So, with some fear and trepidation, but mostly youthful enthusiasm, we requested a dog. After careful deliberation, we determined that a young adult female, between 2-5 years of age with no special needs, would be perfect.

Assuming adoption would be forthcoming immediately was our first mistaken perception. Days became weeks and to say we were discouraged was an understatement. Dogs we thought would be

perfect were already placed. Then one evening in December, just before Christmas, Michele [Wehry] called and had a dog that needed a home. It was a male puppy and "delightful!" Then... the rest of the story followed. I think her words were something about raising him would be a "project." He was

blind. Would we be interested? While not what we requested, she just had a feeling we might be the right home, especially because I would be home daily. It took us only a matter of minutes to decide that we should try. So, the next day, **Keller** joined our family and the adventure began!

Yes, he is named after Helen Keller, a wonderful woman who

helped the world view disabilities through a different lens. It seemed only fitting that he, who we recognized as special from the moment we saw him, should be named after someone so special. While our journey with **Keller** has only just begun, we have already experienced more joy than

words can describe. Can it be bumpy having a blind dog? Of course! A better question might be what **Keller** thinks about being a blind dog living with us, however.

First, let us clarify something... Keller sees, just not with his eyes.



It seems Keller is the one in the driver's seat whether he's sitting in his new Jeep or not!

Although, upon initial introduction to him, people are often fooled, as he appears to have sight. What first is noticed is his unbridled enthusiasm and genuine love for people. He greets everyone as if they were his favorite... a trait we should all embrace. You see, he always leaves people feeling better! He is, without a doubt, the best known dog

in the community. Many people will greet us having already heard about him. Questions such as "Is he the blind dog?" were common. Now he's just **Keller** to everyone, the happy dog who loves people. One couple (also dog people) shared that they've never known a dog that smiles so much! While sight may be lacking, insight certainly isn't. He already knows that physical touch and love are much more important than sight.

Clearly, his other senses are heightened by the absence of sight. Our walks (and I use the term loosely) are filled with many stops. We listen to (and regularly chase) leaves, fountains, birds and especially footsteps, because that means friends must be close. His favorites are friends with other dogs. Watching him



"look" with his ears is one of our truly favorite images. Naturally, all walks with dogs are interrupted by "sniffing", but this remains more frequent and lengthier, again, because he "sees" differently. So, walks are both physical exercise and an opportunity for brain growth.

His ability to adapt is truly amazing! In addition, his tolerance of us, who sometimes forget about his lack of vision, is also commendable. Keller quickly learns where things are and appears to have little trouble remembering surroundings. He zigs and zags throughout the house with little difficulty. We sometimes believe he must have an internal radar system. Will he crash? Sure, but rarely twice in the same place. The greatest challenge for us is, and always has been, to "prepare" him adequately. Advice we received early on, was to try to keep his environment stable (e.g., things in the same place). While it would be nice if things never changed, that isn't reality. Reality is, change is ever present, whether in a home, in a neighborhood, in a vehicle, or anywhere in the community. We just try to remember to alert him to change. As an example, when we are walking across a street, sometimes there is a curb and sometimes it's ramped. We try to alert him when there is a raised step using the word "up." Stability is best and certainly a goal, but not always possible, and he can't live in a bubble. So rather than stressing about change, we focus on trying to be good at helping him deal with some change.

Another essential word is "bonk." From the beginning we would preface an upcoming obstacle with such a prompt. He now knows when he hears that word that he is about to bump into something and can change course if he chooses.

Keller is often described as a "special needs dog" by those who don't know him. Once people get to know him, they forget the middle word and understand that he is just a "special dog." People have said he was lucky to have us adopt him, when in truth, it was us who were lucky. Please know that it was a little intimidating at first to consider adopting a dog without sight. We had serious doubts as to whether we could provide what he needed. That was when we perceived him as a blind dog. Once we adjusted our thinking of him as a dog with sight challenges, we realized we were exactly what he needed, a home full of love. There is nothing more special or more therapeutic than love and we knew that while others may know more about dogs with special needs, no one would love him more. So the only challenge was finding alternatives to perceived barriers. We like to think of it as eliminating the apostrophe t in "can't." So problem solving starts with remembering he's a puppy first and then we address the vision issues. Then we wrap a lot of love (often followed by a lot of laughter) into whatever we try. Fortunately for us, he tolerates our mistakes and still loves us back unconditionally (something else we all could learn to be better at). He follows us everywhere and is always the first to greet someone at the door. When either of us is gone, he makes sure we are happy to be home by giving us that special 1:1 time with him.

So, we feel truly blessed. Thank you *AGR* for being there for **Keller** and all the other dogs that you have rescued and found forever homes. Thank you also for all the guidance, support and mentoring, as well. Most of all, thank you for finding **Keller**, our "special" dog who has so enriched our lives. To everyone who thinks of adoption

but may be hesitant when it comes to special needs issues, I hope **Keller's** story will help alleviate some of those concerns. The only real prerequisite is love, and if you are even thinking of adoption you must already meet that requirement.



With that being said, it is time to return to the adventure. **Keller** has beckoned and my job is to open the door and come outside and play... enjoy!

State of the Organization By Deb Orwig, President

When Debbe Begley and I stood before a group of 30 of you on March 14, 2009, what we were able to tell you was this:

We had incorporated a new rescue group on March 11, 2009, exactly three years ago today! Thanks to Nick Dodson, we had a name: *Arizona Golden Rescue*. We had an address, which had to be changed after a year because the mail box facility closed down. We had a phone number with a catchy name: 623-566-WAGS (9247). Connie McCabe had designed a gorgeous logo and had chosen our colors of rust, gold and cream to symbolize the spectrum of colors of Golden Retrievers. We had written By-laws and were working on a *Policies and Procedures Handbook*.

On March 14, 2009, those in attendance at our first membership meeting paid dues and elected officers: a President; a Director of Operations; a Director of Dog Care; a Director of Information Management; and a Human Resources Director. The only title you were familiar with then was President; the rest sounded kind of weird. No Secretary on the Board? No Treasurer on the Board? No, but the Board then appointed Teri Guilbault as Secretary; a short time later, Cindy Tigges offered to be our Organization Accountant and her appointment was made by the Board. We have found this arrangement to work extremely well.

So, we were off and running. Only about two weeks later by the end of March 2009, we had 121 members in 77 families; we had an Intake and Placement Man ager, a Home Evaluations Manager, a Health Care Manager, a Membership Manager, a Merchandise Manager, a Transport Manager and a member checking our telephone voicemail calls; we had an operational website; we had taken in \$4,189.00; we had even rescued our first dog, thanks to a connection made by Cynthia Wenström.

NOW, today, March 11, 2012...

We have 454 members in 306 families, including 11 out of state: 2 in CA, 2 in CO, 2 in PA, 2 in TX and three in Japan! There are an additional 45 nonvoting spouses or significant others whose names were on applications for Single Memberships – we hope you all will consider upgrading to at least a Household Membership.

We raised \$110,808 in nine months in 2009; \$162,610 in 2010; and \$162,261 in 2011, for a total earned income in 33 months of \$435,679! After just paying a credit card bill of \$8,947, our bank account today holds \$36,561 in checking, \$61,872 in savings and \$10,547 in the Debbe Begley Memorial Fund for a total of \$108,980! Yes, it sounds like we're flush. However, if we take in 98 dogs in 2012 as we did in 2011, we will need an estimated \$91,623 to take care of them all – and we expect to rescue more than 98 dogs. We have already taken in 29; at a rate of 29 in a little over two months, that will amount to at least 150 dogs for this year! We have rescued 246 dogs in three years. We have spent \$231,854 on those dogs – that averages about \$946 per dog.

Our website is terrific and getting better all the time. Our database is functional. We have a live person answering our WAGS line from 8 AM – 8 PM. We are on Facebook, Twitter, and GoodSearch and have numerous other Internet connections.

In the past 3 years, we have done 107 Meet-and-Greets at 6 different *PetSmart* stores and 60 at 4 *Choice Pet Market* Locations and 13 PACC911 events including the *Bowl-a-Rama*, *Franciscan Renewal Center* in October and March, and the *Adoptathon at Anthem* in January; we had a booth at the *Glendale Firemen's Parade* and walked in that parade in 2009 and 2011; we walked in the Parada del Sol in 2010, 2011 and 2012 and had a booth at their Trails End event all three years. During the holidays, we took Photos with Santa at 2 different *PetSmart* stores, did gift wrapping at 3 different *Barnes & Noble* bookstores, and participated in the *Holiday Pet Festival* at *WestWorld* and the Grand Opening of the newest *Choice Pet Market* in Chandler; we have provided stressrelief furapy for the students at *Grand Canyon University* during their midterm and finals weeks in 2011 and 2012; we have sponsored three *Fore! Paws Golf Tournaments* in August 2009 and 2010 and in September 2011, participated in the *People Saving Pets PetWalk* in February for 3 years, and held our first *Golden Paw Saloon* & *Gambling Hall Casino Night* in June 2010; we have also had a booth at the spectacular *Phoenix Pet Expo* for two years and will do so again at the end of April this year. We are Adoption Partners with *PetSmart*, Community Partners with *PACC 911*, Charitable Partners with *People Saving Pets* and are sponsored by *Choice Pet Market*; we have rewards programs set up with numerous businesses whereby if one of our members uses the business or makes a purchase from it, *AGR* gets what amounts to a commission; we are an accepted beneficiary of donations through *American Express Employee Giving Program, Avnet, Bank of America Employee Giving Program, United Health Care Employee Giving Program* and Valley of the Sun *United Way*

I would like to thank all 195 of you who volunteered for one thing or another during 2011, many of you for many things, and I would like to encourage the rest of you to get involved.

In particular, I would like to thank the 2011-2012 Board Members: Teri Guilbault as Director of Operations, Liz Tataseo as Director of Dog Care, Dana Haywood as Director of Information Management, and Katie Donahue as Human Resources Director and when Katie found she could not continue a couple months ago, Connie McCabe stepped in.

Also, we have a fantastic group of team managers: Michele Wehry as Intake and Placement Manager with assistance with Intake for most of last year from Kathy Blue and Judy Petitto; Sheila Joyce as Home Evaluations Manager; Gail Haywood as Transport Manager; and Teri Guilbault as Health Care Manager. Karin Forsythe is our Organization Secretary and Cindy Tigges is our Organization Accountant. We have a fantastic team of home evaluators, a very active team of transport volunteers, and some terrific help in the health care area from Mary Lynn Ament and Beverly Ruth. Mary Jo Courtney handled the writing of most of the donation thank you letters last year.

Does this sound like we have all our bases covered? Yes, we do, but we can always use more help especially with home evaluations – between February 7th and March 10th, we have had 55 applications to adopt submitted and they all have to have home evaluations done. We can also use more help on the Health Care Team, with transports and such things as data entry into our new database. We need help with planning and executing future fundraising events. In other words, if you want to get involved, we can find something for you to do! We hope you will.

BULK RATE MAIL

You will notice that your address label on the back cover contains the verbiage "OR CURRENT RESIDENT." The U.S. Postal Service now requires that verbiage on anything sent out by bulk rate mail. We qualify to use bulk rate mail because of our nonprofit status and because we send out more than 225 identical pieces of mail in each mailing. It is very cost effective for us to use bulk rate mail – the November issue of *The Golden Paw* cost about 33¢ each, as opposed to the \$1.68 it cost to send one copy by first class mail. However, there are some drawbacks to using bulk rate mail. First, sometimes copies do not get delivered at all (who knows why?), or they may take a week or more (especially to out-of-state recipients) to get to their destinations. Bulk rate mail is not forwarded, nor is it returned to the sender if the intended recipient no longer resides at the address on the label, which is why it is so important for you to notify us if you move.

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
