



# Wags and Woofs

Six months in operation. An approved 501 (c) (3). Two hundred members. Thirty-five dogs rescued. Over \$80,000 raised. Over \$21,000 spent on veterinary care. Eighteen (nine dates at each of two different stores) Meet-&-Greets at *PetSmart* stores and twelve at *Choice Pet Market*, four TV appearances by one of our rescues, two book signings, two gigs at Diamondbacks games at Chase Field's Community Corner, four membership meetings, several fundraising events – *Ben & Jerry's Free Cone Day, Big Boys & Their Toys, Bowl-a-Rama, Phoenix Mercury Dog Days of Summer*, and the *Fore! Paws Golf Tournament* – and walking in the *Glendale Firemen's Parade*. And we've only just begun!

Normally, the focus of this newsletter will be on rescued dogs and dog-related articles of interest. However, this, our first issue, necessarily must feature our volunteers, because without them we wouldn't have an organization that is rescuing Golden Retrievers and Golden mixes. The cooperation and enthusiasm among Board members and Team Managers have been wonderful; volunteers at all our various events have been phenomenal; donors have been incredibly generous; our adopters, FWITAs, and fosters are the best there are. We thank each and every one of you so very much for your support. Even if you have done nothing more so far than to purchase a membership, you have been an integral part of helping to get *Arizona Golden Rescue* up and running.

Special thanks go first to all the Board members. Debbe Begley has coordinated every fund raising effort and has done a spectacular job. Yes, it IS her job, but she does it from her heart and with extreme competence. She can always use help, though. Fundraising is a huge but necessary and <u>ongoing</u> chore for an animal rescue group – we have to maintain the effort year round. Just because it seems like we have a little extra cash at the moment does not mean we can coast – we may have 5 dogs come in next week that are all sick, have bad hips, have broken legs, have valley fever, or have any of many other medically expensive conditions that could wipe out our cushion faster than Debbe's dogs can bark when "Who Let The Dogs Out?" comes on the radio. Please offer to assist at our public events whenever possible. Please consider sending *AGR* a donation as a holiday gift – all donations are tax deductible.

Liz Tataseo, as Director of Dog Care, has done an incredible job, too. She coordinates all aspects of dog care management and fi-

nalizes all adoptions. In addition, she is our Vet Records Administrator and keeps our Googledocs files on each dog updated. She also keeps track of our Avid microchip and Heartgard supplies and makes sure our participating vets have enough of both. She could use some help with these latter two jobs - neither takes much time and would not require someone being home during the day. Liz oversees Intake, Home Evaluations, Transport and Placement, as well as Health Care, which includes Behavior. All of these areas could use more volunteers. Michele Wehry, our Intake Manager, now has a rotating team of three volunteers, each "on" for one week. Michele is also trying to gather a team to rotate on Placement. You would have one week "on" and, hopefully, two to four weeks off, depending on how many volunteers offer to help. Our Home Evaluations group, managed by Sheila Joyce, has quite a few volunteers, but we can always use more, especially outside the Phoenix Metro area. Fred Brown is now ably handling the management of transports. Our Health Care Team just had another volunteer join their team. Teri Guilbault is our Health Care Manager. She, Liz Sawtschenko and now Beverly Ruth will be able to keep up with the three vet practices that work with us (oops, we just added a fourth in Tucson). Teryl Hall is our Behavior Consultant. Teryl worked extensively with Andrew Sherwood, one of the best dog trainers I've known in my 30 years of dog training experience, before he left to attend law school in Florida. If there is a behavior problem that Teryl cannot handle, she will not hesitate to contact Andrew for his advice, as he has offered to give it any time we need it. We are also fortunate to be able to tap the services of Brad Jaffe of Team Canine in Scottsdale and Partners Animal Training in Cave Creek if we need input or help with a training or behavior issue. Mentors on each of our dog care teams will provide training for new volunteers, so please consider offering your help.

Debbie Ball is our terrific Director of Information Management. She is responsible for overseeing the development and administration of our website and database (when we finally have one), as well as public relations. Erin Orwig got the initial version of our website up and running, and we thank her for her efforts. However, Erin knew her own limits and told us the website needed the attention of someone who has more experience with website design. Fortunately, Debbe Begley works with someone who has such experience, Ryan Englin. Ryan has volunteered many, many hours of his spare time working with Debbie Ball to upgrade and improve the appearance and usability of our website. We appreciate everyone's attention and contribution to the development of our website and would especially like to commend Debbie Ball for her diligence and persistence to get us recognized by Google, Yahoo, GoodSearch and many other search engines (you wouldn't believe how many different ones are out there on the Internet).

Louise Carter Carreiro has also done a marvelous job as our Human Resources Director. Working closely with Kathy Blue, our Membership Manager, who keeps our membership roster up to date, Louise has welcomed new members and made sure that each has received information about what the organization is doing. Connie McCabe has also helped with membership by designing our membership cards, which Louise then printed and laminated. If you do not have yours yet, it will be mailed to you soon along with a name badge for you to wear when you come to help at a public event. Louise is one of the most personable people I know and is a great first contact for new members. She is knowledgeable about all aspects of our organization and will help put new volunteers to work in areas that suit their time and talents.

In addition to serving as our Health Care Manager, Teri Guilbault is our fantastic Organization Secretary. She attends all Board and Membership Meetings and takes very thorough Minutes, which she sends to the Board in a very timely manner. Any member is welcome to sit in on Board meetings at any time or to request a copy of the Board Meeting Minutes.

Our fantastic Organization Accountant is Cindy Tigges. She set up our online Quickbooks account and keeps it as up to date as possible with feedback from me on deposits and credit card processing. Grateful thanks to both women for their efforts!

Another important job being handled with diligence by one of our members is that of checking the telephone messages that are left on our WAGSline. Yes, the last four digits of our phone number, 9247, spell WAGS! Larry Jessup checks the line twice a day and then calls whichever member the message is for to let them know the message has been saved for them. Larry even keeps a log of all messages just in case one gets accidentally deleted.

Other volunteers who deserve specific mention are Connie Mc-Cabe, Rich Calta and Teri Turner. Connie has done so much for AGR. She designed our classy logo after her husband, Nick Dodson, gave us our name (thanks, Nick!); she has also designed all of the graphics for our golf tournament, taken hundreds of photos of our rescued dogs, recently completed the layout of our 2010 calendar, A Touch of Gold, and chairs everything that has anything to do with **PetSmart**. For the latter, at her own expense, she sends out paperwork to all new adopters. Once the paperwork is filled out by the adopter and returned to Connie in the envelope she provides, she takes it to one of our local PetSmart stores, gets it scanned and receives a fistful of coupons which she then sends to the adopter. In addition, the scanned paperwork generates a \$15 donation to AGR for every adoption. However, we do not get the donation unless the paperwork comes back to Connie. So, please, if you are one of our adopters, send that paperwork back as soon after you receive it as possible - it is worth money to AGR and great deals from **PetSmart** for you! Connie will also be handling Photos with Santa at PetSmart during the holiday season. We will get a \$5 donation from *PetSmart* for every photo Connie takes, so plan to bring your dog(s) for a photo session. She already has enough volunteers for all dates and times, so if you aren't on her roster and would like to volunteer with *AGR* during the holiday season, please offer to help at one or more of the *Barnes & Noble* gift wrap gigs instead – check the website for locations and times.

Rich Calta and Teri Turner did a spectacular job co-chairing our *Fore! Paws Golf Tournament*. We thank them so much for all their time and efforts. It was a fabulous tournament, and we got some very nice compliments from the golfers. For more about the golf tournament, see the wrap-up article on pages 24 - 28.

Special mention needs to be made of Kathi and Bob Youhas. This couple drove back east to Lakewood, PA, to represent *Arizona Golden Rescue* at the annual Goldstock event held at Camp Weequahic in the Poconos over Labor Day weekend. The Youhases sold our merchandise and handled both silent and live auction items, bringing back over \$1400! When they are at home in Surprise, we can count on their help at every public event. In addition, Kathi has spent many hours in front of her sewing machine creating business card holders, checkbook covers, luggage tags, blankets and throws for us to sell, and, more recently, slings to help the families of dogs needing orthopedic repair work. The business card holders, checkbook covers and luggage tags would make great stocking stuffers, so be sure to look at our inventory when we have it at our Membership Meetings or some of our public events.

Fall events and the holiday season are fast approaching. We will need your help more than ever during this busy time. Now that we have some financial breathing room, increasing public awareness about our organization is our number one task. Dogs will continue to come into our rescue program, but we need fosters and potential adopters for these dogs. Public awareness is the key to success, and that means being in as many places on as many dates as possible. There will be numerous upcoming opportunities where you can help. Please regularly check the events calendar on our website – www.arizonagoldenrescue.org – to see when and where you might be able to assist.

During the last seven months, I have sent out by email at least one message per month to all of our members. Those who do not have email have been sent hard copies by US mail. # Second Time Around

#### Our Participating Veterinarians

Welcome to the first edition of the AGR newsletter known as *The Golden Paw*. We will, indeed, reach out to you with information and stories that we hope you will find interesting. As the Director of Dog Care, I am responsible for overseeing all dogoriented teams of Rescue including Intake, Placement, Adoptions, Transport, Shelter Walkers, Health Care, Behavior and Followup – in other words, working directly with the wonderful Golden Retrievers and Golden mixes that AGR takes in and finds homes for so they can live happy and healthy lives. Fortunately, I also get to work with wonderful people who volunteer as managers and team members. We are still putting together all the teams – if you want to volunteer and help all the wonderful dogs and work with great people, just let me know.

One of the most important aspects of rescuing Goldens is the health care that *AGR* provides for all of the dogs when they first come into Rescue. *AGR* wants to ensure that all our rescued dogs go to their new homes healthy and happy. We are fortunate to have established partnerships with several wonderful veterinarians and veterinary hospitals throughout the Valley and state. The following groups have all agreed to work with *AGR* and provide reduced fees for vet work: *Four Legged Friends Animal Hospital* with Dr. Valerie Ferguson and her staff, *Animal Medical & Surgical Center* with Dr. Pullen and his staff, *Kennel Care Veterinary Clinic* with Dr. Hudman and his staff, *Companion Pet Clinic* in Gold Canyon, and *VCA Animal Medical Center of Tucson*.

When a dog comes into rescue, the standard procedures for health care involve the following:

- ✓ Physical exam
- $\checkmark$  DHPP vaccine, unless the dog is up to date
- $\checkmark$  Rabies vaccine, unless the dog is up to date
- ✓ Valley fever test, completed for every AGR dog
- ✓ Microchip the dog with an AGR AVID microchip
- ✓ Fecal exam, if recommended
- ✓ Bordatella, if required for boarding
- $\checkmark$  Treat ear infections or other minor injuries
- $\checkmark$  Spay or neuter the dog, if not already done
- ✓ Heartworm test

If the dog is ill or needs surgery, once an estimate is approved, the dog is treated for all those conditions.

Our vets work closely with the Health Management Team to ensure that all these procedures are completed and follow-up care is done. So far this year, our vets have treated ear hematomas, serious dental problems, tumors, ligament damage, spinal damage, bullet wounds, tick fever and heartworm disease.

We are fortunate to work with these outstanding vets and their staffs who give our dogs such love and care. Here is just a snippet of what has been done for our dogs.

*Four Legged Friends Animal Hospital*, <sup>3131</sup> E. Thunderbird Rd., Phoenix: Dr. Ferguson has long worked with Rescues in the Valley and has always gone above and beyond to help the dogs. She and her staff are always ready to treat dogs who need that extra tender loving care. Rescued dogs need this special attention, since so many of them are often confused and unsure because they have suddenly lost their home and don't know why. The team of vets at *FLF* has, in addition to standard procedures, performed surgery for ear hematomas, spays and neuters, treated old wounds and completed x-rays for diagnosis of more severe problems. Dr. Ferguson has also diagnosed and is treating one of our dogs for valley fever. *FLF* has provided a safe place to stay for dogs that can't go to a home immediately and always treats them with great compassion.

**Animal Medical & Surgical Center**, <sup>17477</sup> N. <sup>82nd</sup> St., Scottsdale: Dr. Pullen and his associates are an incredible resource for dogs that need intricate surgeries or special treatment. All of our orthopedic surgeries have been done by Dr. Pullen with great success including the newest type of treatment called Biogel for osteoarthritis problems. In addition, the staff at *AMSC* is always ready to welcome a dog on short notice when an emergency intake occurs. Aside from the standard intake procedures, *AMSC* has treated our dogs for tick fever and heartworm disease, done spinal, ligament and tumor surgery, and, while treating a shelter dog for a vaginal tumor, discovered three bullets in the poor dog! The staff has always been especially helpful with questions and follow-up care for our dogs.

**Kennel Care**, <sup>6277</sup> W. Chandler Blvd., Chandler, came to us on the recommendation of two current clients who have adopted *AGR* dogs. Dr. Hudman and his staff, especially Nathan, have made a wonderful addition to our list of participating vets. They have treated our dogs for dental and gum issues and other problems. We know we will get great treatment for any of our dogs in the Chandler/Gilbert area as adoptions increase on the East Side.

<u>*VCA Animal Medical Center of Tucson*</u>, <sup>2661</sup> N. <sup>1st</sup> Ave., Tucson, has been of great help to one of our dogs adopted in Tucson and who needed follow-up treatment after her tumor removal. They

have stepped up to give her the special care that she needs.

As we have yet to have any rescued dogs fostered by families living in the North Valley, we have not had the need to engage the services of <u>Anthem Pet Medical Center</u>, <sup>42105</sup> N. <sup>41st</sup> Drive, Suite <sup>148</sup>, Phoenix. However, they are on board as one of our participating vets. Also, in the far East Valley, <u>Companion Pet</u> <u>Clinic</u>, <sup>5331</sup> S. Superstition Mountain Dr., Suite C-<sup>102</sup>, Gold Canyon, has also agreed to help us with any animals that are fostered way out east.

As more dogs get adopted all over the Valley and state, all of our vets will be ready to provide care for our Goldens when they come in, whether it is only the standard care needed or specialized treatment. Even with the generous discounts given by our participating vets, several of these surgeries and treatments have cost AGR thousands of dollars. All the fundraising events staffed by our volunteers and donations made by members allow AGR to ensure that all of our rescued dogs are in the best health possible.

To see a dog free of pain and able to walk without struggling, to know that a Golden has been saved from a life-threatening disease, we give thanks to all of our wonderful veterinarians and their staffs for giving one more dog a chance at a long, healthy life in its forever home.

*Arizona Golden Rescue's* website address is www. arizonagoldenrescue.org The website, which was quickly launched by Erin Orwig so that we would have something about AGR at the address, was completely redesigned by Ryan Englin in early July for a new look! The website and corresponding email addresses have been generating much interest and increasing our exposure in cyberspace. There is an Events page showing all the dates, times and places of various fundraising opportunities, as well as a link to the most current events on the main Home page. Adoption application forms are available on the website along with links to the available dogs, as well as "Success Stories" of those dogs already adopted. Links have been established with various rescue sites, no-kill shelters, etc. Additional plans for website enhancement include more education articles, posting pictures after events, and a link to a shopping page where merchandise may be purchased.

Currently, our records for dogs, adoptions, and memberships are being kept in various spreadsheets and Word files. Investigative work continues toward moving these records into a more substantial supporting database.

*AGR* is established with www.goodsearch.com as a search engine! GoodSearch.com is a new Yahoo-powered search engine that donates half its advertising revenue, about a penny per search, to the charities its users designate. 
With the holidays approaching, it's a great time to participate! I guarantee you will leave any of our events with pride for our organization and a smile on your face.

# Health and Safety

#### Porcupine Quills?

Check your dog's pads. Are there growths on the pads that look

like miniature porcupine quills? Debbe Begley recently noticed such growths on the bottoms of her dog **Khaki's** feet. As she had never seen anything like this before and was worried about what it might be, she took **Khaki** to see our vet Dr. Ferguson. Dr. F. immediately said "Arthritis." Whaaat? How could <u>that</u> be arthritis? Well, it isn't arthritis *per se*, but it is a result of a combination of things: arthritis in the legs



causing the dog to favor her feet and to not want to walk very much, and foot fur and toenails that are allowed to get too long, preventing the normal scouring and wearing away of the footpad material.



What happens under these conditions is that the footpad material itself grows. In itself, it is apparently not painful to the dog, but it sure looks ugly and could eventually hamper movement even more. So, check your dog's feet, keep the fur trimmed back and the toenails clipped as short as possible so the dog is walking on the pads, and you won't have to wonder where those "porcupine

quills" or that "fungus" came from!

#### Toxic For Dogs!

 $\mathcal{P}_{\text{lease}}$  do not give your dog(s) chocolate, onions, grapes, raisins, or chewing gum (especially sugarless varieties that contains xylitol). Each of these foods contains chemicals that are toxic to dogs. As few as seven grapes have been reported to cause death in some dogs.

Keep all medications out of your dog's reach and NEVER give

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your dog any medication without first consulting your veterinarian. Medications that should not be given to dogs include aspirin, acetomeniphen, and ibuprofen. Aspirin toxicity may cause gastrointestinal problems, respiratory difficulties, neurological problems, bleeding disorders and kidney failure. In addition to bleeding ulcers, increasing doses of ibuprofen eventually lead to kidney failure - and, if left untreated, this can be fatal. Symptoms include poor appetite, vomiting, black tarry stools, vomiting blood, abdominal pain, weakness and lethargy. Dogs are less sensitive to acetaminophen than cats are. A 50-pound dog would need to ingest more than seven 500 mg tablets to suffer toxic effects. If you ever suspect that your dog has ingested any amount of these medications (or any other human meds), please contact your family veterinarian or local veterinary emergency facility immediately. To ensure the safety of your dog, give him only medications prescribed by your veterinarian and only in the dosage prescribed.

# One for One

As rescuers, we save one dog at a time. We do what we can to ensure that the dog is as healthy as possible, so that he or she can live as long and happy a life as possible. Sometimes we have to do very little, like a heartworm test, a valley fever test and a microchip. Sometimes we have to do a lot – read **Big's** story on page <sup>10</sup> and also the stories on pages <sup>14</sup> - <sup>15</sup> – but dogs with serious medical issues almost always also need the little things.

The standard "little things" we do for rescued dogs add up. These are average costs among our participating vets:

Rabies vaccine:	\$ <sup>10</sup>
DHPP vaccine:	\$ <sup>20</sup>
Heartworm test:	\$ <sup>20</sup>
Valley fever test:	\$ <sup>58</sup>
Microchip:	\$ <sup>10</sup>

To the health of our rescued dogs, though, little things mean a lot. Magic Moments... when a stray Golden Retriever or Golden mix is spotted in a shelter kennel and does a happy dance when taken out; when a neglected backyard dog is surrendered by its owner to a member of our Transport Team and is delivered to a foster family that shows the dog love, comfort, toys and goodquality food for, perhaps, the first time in the dog's life; and the most magical of all... when a rescued dog meets his or her forever family and we see the dog's excitement and the sparkle in the family's eyes. As rescuers, we are privileged to share in these Magic Moments. Below are stories of Arizona Golden Rescue's Magic Moments from March 2009 through October 31, 2009.



**<sup>09</sup>-<sup>001</sup> Aspen** was the very first dog rescued by *Arizona Golden Rescue*, and what a gift she was to our organization! Who could ask for anything more for a first rescue than a <sup>16</sup>-month-old beautiful blond female Golden that had been raised with <sup>5</sup> children in a family environment? Unfortunately, due to the economic recession, the mother of the family had to go back to work, so the family no longer had time for **Aspen**; she was relegated to

the back yard when no one was home. They knew this was not the kind of life Aspen deserved. One of our members, Cynthia Wenström, who knew someone who knew this family suggested that the family surrender the dog to AGR. As soon as we had a functioning website and a space on Petfinder.com, Aspen generated nine adoption applications, so Placement had a great selection of wonderful families from which to choose Aspen's forever home. After foster care at Deb's house, during which time she got used to being around other dogs, learned how to participate in "dog play," was spayed, had an umbilical hernia repaired, and was brought up to date on all her vaccinations, Aspen was placed in Paradise Valley with Gwen, a stay-at-home mom, Doug, two children and a house bunny. They had wanted a dog for a while and were thrilled when they were chosen for Aspen. After some serious deliberation, they renamed her Jessie – a new name for a new life. Since her adoption, Jessie has learned to swim and has enjoyed camping with the family in the cool northern parts of the state. She loves everyone she meets and everyone loves her. Happy new life, Jessie!

**object Goldie's** owners were moving and had to give her up because the places they looked at to live wouldn't allow pets. They told us that **Goldie** is an eight-yearold Golden Retriever mix with a loving disposition and gentle mouth, a puppy at heart really. The owner had told us, *She loves children, is housebroken, will bark when people come to the door but will*

**<sup>09</sup>-**<sup>004</sup> **Chance** is a <sup>3-4</sup>-year-old Golden mix who was abandoned near the east entrance of the Grand Canyon. There's not much there except wilderness and reservation, so he may actually have been a reservation dog that wandered off. He was picked up by the Grand Canyon Rescue Shelter people, who attempted to locate his owner to no avail. The

shelter manager, Karin, originally called another rescue to ask if they would take **Chance**; they refused since **Chance** is a mix but they referred Karin to *AGR*. Dr. Bush at *Flagstaff Animal Hospital* regularly goes up to the GC shelter to vaccinate the animals there. He graciously agreed to transport **Chance** to his clinic, neuter him, and board him until *AGR* could pick him up. Deb drove up to Flagstaff thinking she was going to bring home a mostly-Golden mix. She was somewhat taken aback when **Chance** was brought into the waiting room, as he is a mostly-<u>not</u>-Golden mix. But no matter. He has a little Golden in him and he needed a new home, so we took him. He fostered at Deb's, then for a week with

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another foster family during Deb's vacation, and was great with all the resident dogs. She brought him to our June Membership Meeting. Two of our members, Kay and Michelle, who live in Maricopa and drove into Phoenix to attend that meeting, were very attracted to Chance and decided to apply to adopt him. They had recently lost a Golden. They and the two canine members of their household were all feeling the loss, so they wanted to add another dog. Their rescued Golden, Tumbleweed, accepted Chance as her new playmate right away, but it took their rescued German Shepherd, Sadie, quite some time to come around. About <sup>3</sup> weeks later, Deb got this message from Kay: Chance and Sa*die* have started playing and interacting together! To the best of our knowledge it started Saturday morning around <sup>4</sup> AM. Sadie shot through the doggie door with **Chance** hot on her heels and they charged into the family room with toys in mouths. Later in the morning I peeked into the family room and there they were with their respective toys. Sadie of course was startled that we had caught her playing with any toys and quickly ditched hers. Anyway, the good news is they have acclimated to one another and the group is now complete with everyone playing together. Chance is a very smart boy! He took his time and let Sadie slowly warm up to him and didn't push things with her until she was ready, and now they are doing great together. Sadie has become very attached to Chance. When Chance had to have surgery to remove bone spurs in both his elbows and had to be crated when Kay and Michelle were not home, Sadie became destructive - she wanted Chance out of that crate! All's well that ends well, though. Chance has healed from his surgery, is back to being his spunky, adorable self, and will have a wonderful new life.



**op-005 Bagel** was the first dog *AGR* received from *Golden Retriever Rescue of El Paso (GRREP)*. He is a 9-year-old, very tall male, who was reported to be a great walking partner, loves kids, gets along with other dogs, sweet, loving, and very laid back with a wonderful spirit. The surrendering owner had **Bagel** since he was a puppy. He was an in-

side pet for <sup>5</sup> years until she remarried, and then he was housed outside. The owner was forced to move due to a domestic violence situation and needed to surrender **Bagel**. He had been a very good foster for two families in the <sup>2</sup>  $\frac{1}{2}$  months that **GRREP** had him. When **Bagel** came to **AGR**, we discovered many problems that were causing him a great deal of pain. **Bagel** had to have surgery to cure an ear hematoma and to remove a large tumor from between his shoulders. He also had a large lick granuloma on his front leg that caused him a lot of discomfort, so he had to be outfitted with a full leg cast. In addition, he had hip pain due to a disc compressing the cauda equine, a nerve bundle in his lower back, and was unable to sit. **AGR** had surgery done to repair the disc problem with some screws and bone fusion. **Bagel** still has to wear a cone and be confined as he recovers from all his various treatments. Fortunately, he is now in his forever home with one of our Board members, Louise, and her husband John, and is living the good life with his Golden sister **Lily** and getting better every day. He can move better, get up and down without discomfort and play with **Lily** or just lie around on the cool tile in his new home. In explaining his new name, **Big**, Louise said, **Bagel** *is from Texas and the first time John and I saw him at his foster home we both said "he is really big." People give us a funny look when we tell them his name is* **Big**. I like to tell the story that **Big** is from Texas and everything everything in Texas is Big! You can see a picture of **Big** in the **Arizona Golden Rescue** <sup>2010</sup> calendar. John and Louise refer to him as "Mr. December!"



**09-006 Roxy** is <sup>1</sup> <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>, a small Golden mix that had been living with a temporary foster before coming into Rescue. The foster received **Roxy** from a young couple who were getting married and had no time for a dog. She thinks the man obtained **Roxy** as a Valentine present for his girlfriend, but they had not trained **Roxy** at all and left her outside most of the time. **Roxy** 

needed all her vet work including spaying, but this had to wait through her heat cycle. **Roxy** went to live with one of *AGR's* great fosters for a short while but soon found her new family. **Roxy** is now in her forever home with Linda and Tom in Glendale. She has a new name, **Daisy**, and a Golden sister who is <sup>8</sup> years old but loves to play. **Daisy** and the resident Golden are like a match made in heaven. **Daisy** now goes for long walks with Mom and sleeps on the bed at night. The family loves her and thinks she is wonderful, and she is great with their granddaughter.

**09-007 Sandy,** age 2 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>, is a blond female Golden Retriever that came in from *Golden Retriever Rescue of El Paso* with her buddy **Fargo**. We were told that she was very submissive, liked to jump on people but had a very sweet disposition, lived outside with **Fargo** and was only brought inside during the winter. Her new mom, Barbara in Scottsdale, has renamed her **Sammie** and is thrilled



with her. Sammie is a sweetheart and she has adjusted to her new home very easily. She has a brother whose name is Howie, who is an 85-lb Golden Retriever. He is 3 months younger than Sammie. She loves him! They are best buddies and she follows him all over. They sleep next to each other; sometimes tail to tail. They really are a perfect match and we are so glad we have her. It's like she's always been here. Neither one likes the pool! They won't go in. That amazes us. She is just a sweet dog and we love her."



**09-008 Fargo** is a very handsome, very curly and very large 3 ½-year-old male Golden who came to *AGR* with the group that was transported from El Paso. The couple who had owned **Fargo** and his housemate, **Sandy**, were divorcing and moving to apartments where neither could take a dog, so they surrendered both to *GRREP*. Deb, who fostered **Fargo**, found that

he was sweet and gentle and interacted well with her resident dogs. A Gilbert family with three children and a little poodle had lost their other dog. The middle child, a son, wanted "a real dog" for a playmate. The family had friends who had Goldens, so they started looking on the Internet for a Golden and found *AGR*. Sean, Carrie and kids are the perfect family for **Fargo**, and he is the perfect dog for them. He loves to swim and play ball and spends his nights curled up on his boy's bed. What a great new life for **Fargo**!

**objobjSandy/Holly/Molly**, <sup>4</sup> <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>, was originally named **Sandy** since she was found in the desert. The Texas/Mexico Border Patrol discovered her caught between two fences. She was dirty and matted, very thin, infested with ticks, and dehydrated. She had barely enough energy to lift her head and lick the hand reaching out to her. It was amazing that she was still alive. The Border Patrol



took her to the facility where they house patrol dogs that are not working, a nice place in east El Paso, TX. The facility's owner, Freddy, saw a beautiful Golden Retriever under all the filth, so he immediately called El Paso Golden Retriever Rescue (GRREP). He had boarded some of their rescues and knew the organization would properly care for this dog. They took Sandy to their vet, who shaved her down, cleaned her up, and had to dip her twice in tick dip to kill all the ticks. It was no surprise that she tested positive for tick fever, so she was started on a <sup>30</sup>-day regimen of doxycycline, the antibiotic of choice to combat this disease. She also tested positive for the dreaded heartworm disease. When the Rescue members were told Sandy had heartworm and that the treatment would cost about \$1000, they knew their fledgling organization would not be able to afford the treatment, so they called Arizona Golden Rescue. AGR is also a new rescue organization, but our support base is considerably larger than that of the El Paso group. AGR agreed to take Sandy. Deb Orwig and Bob Youhas drove to El Paso and transported Sandy back to Phoenix along with four other GRREP rescues. Sandy was placed with a long-term foster family that was familiar with the ramifications of heartworm treatment. Her heartworm treatment has now been successfully completed. However, once the heartworms are killed, pieces may slough off and can cause emboli in the lungs and/or arteries, so Sandy must still be kept quiet - crated when not being

taken outside on leash to do her business and not allowed to get excited – for another three months. Her coat is slowly growing back. She is now a beautiful, happy, healthy Golden girl who is lighting up the life of her new adoptive family, Joan and Bob in Chandler, with her shining personality and lovely smile. They have even given her a new name, **Molly**, to go along with her new life.

**09-010 Wendy**, now **Emma**, came into *AGR* from *Golden Retriever Rescue of El Paso* as a beautiful 11-monthold white Golden with a great disposition. Her foster mother reported that she is a wonderful dog, plays all day long with her 6-month and 2-year-old Aussies and she's obedient, eager to learn and loves to walk. **Emma** was already housebroken and knew how to use a doggie door.



Even though she loves to play and snuggle, her foster mom said she is a couch potato and likes to watch TV. Her new family, Sanja and Admir of Phoenix, says: We are totally in love with **Emma**, our beautiful Golden Retriever. **Emma** stole our hearts the very first second we met her. She just turned one and she is as curious as a puppy can be, but she has the gentleness of a more mature dog. It is amazing to see **Emma's** transformation from shy and frightened to a happy, willing-to-learn and trusting girl. She loves to play with her Golden sister **Sandy** and enjoys daily walks around the neighborhood. It is hard to believe that anyone would give her up, but we sure are lucky and grateful to have her in our lives.



**09-011 Mojo** was the last dog in the van from the El Paso Rescue this year but was first in the hearts of his new family. **Mojo**, although only two years old, was a mellow, sweet boy who tried in vain to get his foster brothers to play to no avail. Fortunately for him, he went on to a great home with Diane and Jim in Gilbert. His new family

writes: After having to put our beloved 14-year-old Golden down (who we adopted through rescue 12 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> years ago), we felt the emptiness in our home. Everywhere we looked we saw where he would have been at that particular moment had he still been with us. He has even located some we didn't know we had. While his ear infections and neuter stitches are healing, there is nothing wrong with his eves. He has located stuffed doggies on high shelves and round objects on hidden platforms. As he was eyeing a baseball-sized round candle in the bathroom, it had to be put away. Though it was new to him and a challenge, **Benji** mastered the doggie door in just a couple of days with the help of Mom, Dad, and Golden Girl Ginger, who led the way through it many times to show him how. Duke's potential adopter, Sandra, who lives in Phoenix, saw a group of AGR members at Choice Pet Market in Glendale. Duke was there with his foster mom, Deb, and Sandra met him. So, we asked our Behavior Consultant, Teryl, to work with Sandra and Duke, and we asked Sandra to have patience. After about 6 weeks as a FWITA, Sandra requested that we finalize the adoption, as the cats and the dog have come to terms with each other. Happy new life, Duke!

**09-019 Dylan's** owner had lost his job a few years ago, then lost his car, and finally faced foreclosure on his home. He was invited by his sister to come live with her in the Midwest, but she would welcome only one dog and he had two. It was an extremely difficult decision for him to relinquish 5-year-old **Dylan**, whom he had had as a companion since the dog was about 8 months

Littermates **09-021 Prince** and **09-022 Princess** were obtained from a "breeder." The owner, who lived in Flagstaff, kept them chained up outside all the time and had to be convinced by a friend to find them a new home. One day they got loose and



killed a chicken in a neighbor's yard. The neighbor just happened to work with the Sheriff's Department, and he said if they came back he would shoot them. So, the owner agreed to surrender them to a friend who called *AGR*. **Prince**, renamed **Presley**, went to live with foster Teryl until he could be vetted. **Presley** is a big, handsome, creamcolored boy and at 10 months weighed

Diamonds in the Ruff



His owner had been told by his vet that it was cancerous and would cost \$1000 to have it removed. Maybe that was why Jake was surrendered to AGR, not because he was a bulky floor rug. When Deb gave him a bath the day before he was to go in for the eve surgery, she discovered a walnut-size lump in his throat area, so we had that removed as well. Fortunately, both tumors were benign hemangiomas, but yes, the bill was about \$1000. Then we had to turn some attention to Jake's hips. He



<sup>(109</sup> lbs) up off the floor and walked with a noticeable limp. We put him on the green bean diet and had his hips and legs x-rayed and found that he had significant dysplasia in both hips. The vet determined Jake to be a good candidate for biogel injections into the hips, so we had that done, to the tune of

\$<sup>1800</sup> another Jake always has a happy face even when having to wear an E-collar The vet also discovered that Jake's left hind leg cruciate ligament was ruptured. After Jake had a couple weeks to heal from the biogel treatment, he had his cruciate ligament repaired - another \$2800. Jake's leg rehabilitation has been handled admirably by Jackie and Dave in Chandler, his potential adopters. They agree with Deb that Jake is Mr. Per- Bandage on Jake's leg after sonality and just love him to pieces.

09-020 Libby, now called Halo by her potential adopters because they think she is an absolute angel, is a Golden mix who was rescued from the euthanasia list at the Eastside Maricopa County Animal Care and Control Services (MCACCS) shelter. The vet first thought she had a prolapsed uterus and needed to be spayed, but after further examination,

the diagnosis was changed to transmissible venereal tumor. Halo also had infected ears, infected gums and a ruptured right cranial cruciate ligament which made her limp. In addition, the vet discovered three bullets in her! AGR paid for surgery to remove the tumor and bullets and for 6 follow-up vincristine treatments to ensure that the tumor would not recur. While she was under anesthesia for the surgery, we also had her ears flushed and a dental done. On

November 12, she will have surgery to repair her hind leg. Since she is only about 5 years old, she will have a procedure called TPLO, or Tibial Plateau Leveling Osteotomy. For those of you who are interested in an explanation of this procedure, visit: http://vetsurgerycentral.com/tplo.htm This type of surgery has been determined to be the best to use for Halo to restore complete range of motion without pain. When all is said and done, we expect Halo's medical costs to amount to more than \$5,000.

We had crammed <sup>1</sup> large crate and <sup>3</sup> medium-sized ones in the back of the van in preparation for transporting five dogs, although who the <sup>sth</sup> one would be (Mojo) was not confirmed until we were about an hour west of El Paso.

It was an uneventful trip, although we did hit a



passing squall on the way back somewhere around the NM/AZ border. Once in El Paso, we found Pet Paradise Kennels where the dogs were being boarded - it was about <sup>50</sup> minutes east of I-<sup>10</sup>, rather a surprise to us that it was so far out in the country. The


There is only one thing missing. They are not with their special person who loved them on Earth.







Since we incorporated Arizona Golden Rescue on March 11, <sup>2009</sup>, we have had four general membership meetings. 

Carol Allen, Chairman of the NRC, said, "Everyone nominated is a winner, as are the Golden Retrievers they serve."

#### PROGRAM WINNER: *Homeward Bound Golden Retriever Rescue and Sanctuary*

Since <sup>1998</sup>, *Homeward Bound* has been rescuing Golden Retrievers and Golden mixes in the Sacramento and Northern California area and also accepts dogs from across the United States. They take dogs in need and show them perhaps the first kindness and love they have known. Last year, <sup>2008</sup>, *Homeward Bound* rescued <sup>810</sup> dogs. *Homeward Bound* also runs one of the few sanctuaries in the country where Goldens and Golden mixes can live out their lives if not adopted.

#### INDIVIDUAL WINNERS:

#### Susan Sampson – *Fairbanks Golden Retriever Rescue*

Since before the founding of *Fairbanks Golden Retriever Rescue*, Susan Sampson has been taking in and saving Golden Retrievers in Alaska. Alaska is a huge state with a limited road system and small population. *GRRF* is the only Golden Retriever Rescue in more than 570,000 square miles. Susan has never taken a break from vol-

unteering, and works extremely hard. She always has room for one more dog, and sometimes travels <sup>600</sup> miles to promote the cause of Golden Rescue or pick up a dog. Susan is the vice-president, adoption coordinator, webmaster, volunteer coordinator, intake co-ordinator, bookkeeper and public relations – she does it all. *GRRF* rescues <sup>90</sup>-<sup>100</sup> dogs each year, and Susan is personally involved with every dog. Susan has an outstanding relationship with shelters, and the *Midnight Sun Golden Retriever Club* in Anchorage. Susan Sampson is the face of Golden Retriever Rescue in Alaska.

Deborah Nicolle – *Southern California Golden Retriever Rescue* Within its founding year of <sup>2008</sup>, *SCGRR* saved over <sup>300</sup> Golden Retrievers. This was done in large part by the efforts of Deborah Nicolle. When there is a dog that her group cannot rehome, Deborah makes the <sup>7</sup>-hour-one-way drive to *Homeward Bound* to see that the dogs have a chance at a new life. She sometimes makes the drive several times a week, in addition to all the driving in S. Cal. to pick up dogs. She spends the better part of each day driving to all the shelters in the area. Deborah is always "on call." Deborah's dream is to have a sanctuary for Golden Retrievers in Southern California, and with Deborah's efforts, it will become a reality.

> *Book Review* By Jude Fulghum

*Around the Next Corner* by Elizabeth Wrenn, ISBN:<sup>0\_451\_21842\_6</sup>

Ever thought about getting and raising a Guide Dog puppy? This is one of the major plots in this book, although the main theme deals more with a midlife crisis ordeal for the <sup>50</sup>-year-old housewife who decides to do it. After being a dedicated stay-at-home mom for her two children and doctor husband, she starts to question what she's made of her life. Raising the puppy becomes the impetus for her meeting new people and taking new directions with a newfound feeling of independence and accomplishment. Going from a position of "Can I do this?" to "Of course I can" is a story familiar to many foster families and others who take on new challenges.

Although this is a "chick flick" story, I found the observations made about midlife to be believable and worthy of thought and consideration. The antics of a young dog and the problems and challenges of raising it do make for some hilarious moments. There are also enough references to a woman's life at <sup>50</sup> to make those of us who've been there laugh out loud. The book is well written, moves along well and the characters are people the reader comes to care about. It is a book about growing and changing. This is the author's first book and is a good and satisfying read.

## *Book Review* By Jude Fulghum

*Merle's Door – Lessons from a Freethinking Dog* by Ted Kerasote, ISBN <sup>978\_0\_15\_101270\_1</sup>

While out on a river run down the San Juan river in Utah, the author finds (or is found by) an obviously lost/abandoned large golden dog who is coaxed into the raft for the remainder of the voyage. At the end of the trip, the dog (now named Merle) is invited through the door of Kerasote's truck and an uncanny relationship begins. This is perhaps the best, or one of the best, authored tale of someone's bond with their dog I have ever read.

The author is a writer in Wyoming (a winner of the National Outdoor Book Award), and lives near the Yellowstone/ Tetons area in a very small town. Kerasote and his friends are the epitome of outdoorsmen, and Merle happily leaps right into the lifestyle, bagging mountain peaks, skiing down diamond (or backcountry) slopes, becoming an integral part of elk hunting, and a bored but willing fishing companion. Part of Merle's daily life includes visiting among the other dogs and people of the small town, as dogs are not fenced or kept indoors by apparently any of the townspeople. At one point, Merle even becomes the unofficial town mayor.

This is a wonderfully descriptive book of the author and his relationship with his dog. The words he speaks to Merle (and Merle's "responses") are priceless. Every dog owner will recognize the bond.

My issues with the way Merle lived is that the author decided early on that Merle was to be a "free spirit" – no collars (except when hunting), no leashes, no fences. The author also made a couple of comments leading me to believe that he would have bred Merle, had Merle not arrived neutered. I realize that Merle lived in a very rural area, but I am not a fan of loose dogs and especially am not a fan of no collars. I even wrote to Kerasote after I finished the book giving him my history of agonizing over losing my dog that was collarless. He did write back and thanked me for the insight saying he would remember my story when he gets another dog. Perhaps others have written him about the folly of letting dogs run free! Apart from these issues, I truly loved this book.

Rescue is not about finding perfect dogs to adopt. Rescue is about helping loving dogs in need.
